OUR FOUNDING FIVE

SYLVIA ROHLENA

This is the second in a series of articles profiling the Guild's five founders and original charter members, whose time and effort made the Museum Guild of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library a reality, and to whom we owe a deep debt of gratitude.

GENUINE ENTHUSIAST — upon meeting Sylvia Rohlena for the first time, this is how she impresses you. She is enthusiastic about her heritage and the Czech culture, and her warmth is all-encompassing. She displays an exuberance for living and learning, for people and for giving — for everything she puts her hand to — and for these reasons she is an authentic "treasure" of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library, and the Guild which she helped to establish.

A Rich Lineage

Sylvia's family history is a rich and fascinating one, her ancestry in this country dating back to the 1850's. Her mother's grandparents. Albert and Marie Kucera Maly (originally Mallie), arrived in New York from Pilzen, Czechoslovakia on Christmas Eve day

in 1854. They ultimately settled on a farm near Solon, Iowa. Her father's father, Alois Blaha, was born near Kutnahora, Czechoslovakia. His vocation was carpentry, and Alois distinguished himself by helping to found the ZCBJ¹ in 1897 and serving as its Charter Secretary. Husband Robert Rohlena's ancestors were among the original six Czech families to settle in Iowa's Johnson County. A stone mason, Emmanuel Rohlena and his family immigrated from Chocen, Czechoslovakia in 1851.

Sylvia Blaha Rohlena was born on January 4, 1936 at University Hospital in Iowa City. She was one of two daughters to grace the family of Louis and Bertha Cabalka Blaha. Growing up in Cedar Rapids. Sylvia and sister, Evelyn, were raised in a loving environment of strict discipline, hard work and quality learning experiences. Her father owned a business. Linwood Grocery, where both parents worked daily, and the Blaha sisters learned responsibility early on as they helped out in their free time, dusting and stocking shelves. Sylvia has a wealth of fond memories of her

childhood years, including family trips to Chicago and St. Louis, where she attended concerts and museums. Thus, an abiding appreciation and love of the arts and music was initiated at an earage.

"Music was the main emphasis of my young life," Sylvia recalls. Her family regularly attended symphony concerts, and music contests and recitals became an annual affair as both girls discovered their enjoyment of music. While attending Lincoln Elementary School, Sylvia began studying the violin at age six. progressing to the cello by the time she was nine. She was deeply committed to her music at a young age, riding the trolley to Iowa City for private instruction at the University. By the time she was attending Wilson High School, she had achieved a level of accomplishment that enabled her to join the Cedar Rapids Symphony. She was excelling in music, as evidenced by her election to both Iowa's All State Orchestra (cello) and All State Band (oboe). She continued to perform with the Cedar Rapids Symphony for thirteen years, and today still regards listening to classical music as one of the great pleasures of her life.

Babi and Her Gifts

A profoundly integral component of Sylvia's childhood was her relationship with her "Babi" (grandmother). Babi lived with the Blaha family and spoke Czech with Sylvia's parents, something most children today don't have the opportunity to experience. While her parents worked long hours in the store, her Babi cooked and cared for the family — she loved to make all of the favorite Czech delicacies. Babi was instrumental in passing on the girls the art of Czech cooking as well as a love of gardening. Sylvia watched her make noodles and kolaches every Saturday, and learned from her as she tended the family's large garden. Through their Babi's influence, the girls were instilled with good



eating habits, as well as a love of discipline, family values . . . and their heritage.

Upon graduation from high school in 1954, Sylvia worked for a time as a bookkeeper at Merchant's National Bank in Cedar Rapids. In 1956 she made the decision to enroll at Coe College in order to pursue a course of study in elementary education. Years later, after her family was primarily raised, she utilized her education by accepting a position as a kindergarten paraprofessional for the College Community School System where, from 1980 to 1987, she enjoyed working with many children.

A City Girl Goes Country

Sylvia likes to refer to the early years of raising her family as a case of "a city girl goes country." Having married Robert Charles Rohlena in December of 1967, the couple purchased and restored a farm house and began cultivating their land. Lacking any prior experience of the lifestyle, Sylvia laughingly recalls that, in those days, she wasn't exactly sure of the difference between straw and hay. One of her first volunteer efforts naturally facilitated her education in the ways of farming. As a 4-H leader for fourteen years, she learned right along with the children all about sheep, pigs and horses — and discovered that hay was the one with the luscious scent! Many rich memories remain of their farming years, during which Sylvia passed to her children the same values and knowledge that her parents had given her.

Sylvia and Robert Rohlena have successfully raised six children together — three boys and three girls. Today they are all thriving young adults with richly diverse vocations, focused lives and good family values. The Rohlenas are blessed with four beautiful grandchildren, one of whom proudly carries the family name (Katherine Mallie Crane).

These days Sylvia works for the ISU Linn County Extension Service, where she functions as a Nutrition Youth Instructor, a position that naturally evolved from her life experiences of farming and raising a large family. The wisdom gained from years of pursuing a healthy lifestyle on a daily basis for herself and her family is now passed on to other young people. She relishes her work, and a multitude of other activities that make for a very active and full life. Among her favorite diversions are traveling, boating and fishing on Lake Michigan, and participating in sports such as field hockey, soccer and running. She still loves to bake all of her family's favorite things — Easter lamb cake, rye bread, kolaches and, of course, apple strudel — when time permits.

Making the Time to Give

Despite raising a large family as well as working outside of the home for many years. Sylvia has always found the time to express her dedication to volunteerism in diverse ways. Over the years she has been actively involved in numerous organizations on many levels. Her work with the Czech Heritage Foundation, the Soroptimists, PEO and American Business Women's

Association illustrates her lifelong desire to have a positive impact on her community. As a member of the First Presbyterian Church in Cedar Rapids, she has worked as a Sunday School teacher and served as a deacon on the Christian Education Board. She has worked extensively with the ISU exchange program along with her husband, who volunteers his time as an interpreter for this worthwhile program.

Cultural exchange is an important facet of Sylvia's appreciation of the diversity of the world in which we live, and she has been instrumental in facilitating this exchange in two ways. Having twice visited the Czech Republic and Slovakia, she has been fortunate to experience her heritage first-hand. "There is so much culture and history," she says of her encounters. "And the people

are open, sincere and friendly." She has made it one of her missions to return that friendship and sincerity to the people of these countries when they visit the United States. She has been involved in organizing host families for Czech and Slovak visitors for over ten years, and she greatly enjoys introducing these visitors to Iowa. She relates her favorite story of an ISU Slovak guest, Pavel Rattaj, who, upon touring the Museum, came upon his grandfather's picture hanging there. It was gratifying to watch as surprise, quickly followed by intense excitement, registered on his face as he gazed up at his ancestor.

Carrying On A Mother's Dream

Sylvia warmly reminisces about the bits and pieces of Czech culture that were woven throughout the tapestry of her childhood: Heirloom garne's from the old country. A beautifully illustrated volume on herbs, written in old Czech script. Needlework passed from generation to generation. Recipes brought from the old country. And most importantly — an idea.

Sylvia's mother had a close friend, Melvina Svec, and she remembers that they often spoke of building a library of books to maintain the Czech culture and heritage in the community. "This idea stayed in my heart," she relates. After many years of family responsibilities, her desire to be a part of this and to carry on their dreams coincided with the realization that many friends and family members also felt a need for the preservation of their culture. Through countless conversations over several years, Sylvia came to comprehend the importance of the idea of "cultural guardianship" to many in the community. Thus, her vision of a Guild that would enhance the awareness of Czech culture in the community through volunteerism was born.

After expressing her thoughts and ideas to several Museum Board members, the steering committee that determined the purpose of the Guild and set the qualifications for membership was established, with Sylvia at the helm as chairperson. With the formation of the new Guild, she was awarded the prestigious honor of the Charter Presidency. Her perseverance has paid off in enormous dividends for all involved in the organization. "If you're excited about an idea, then it will be completed," she says of her positive approach to establishing the Guild, and life in general.

Enrichment and Fulfillment

he beauty of the Guild is two-fold. It is a perfect example of the true meaning of giving and volunteerism at its best. Its main mission of supporting the Museum enriches cultural awareness, but what it has brought to the membership itself may have been an unexpected bonus. Sylvia finds that considerable enrichment is derived from being a part of the Museum with its vast array of artifacts to learn about, as well as its depth of history, both past and that in the making. But on a personal level, she feels that the beautiful and talented people she has become acquainted with have made for a wondrous new experience. Her deepest enjoyment stems from the people, and the anticipation of learning more about her culture through speakers and artifacts showcased at the monthly Guild meetings. For Sylvia, the Guild fulfills many things: her love of people and her appreciation of beauty in the arts, as well as her life's goal of acquiring knowledge daily - and never losing the need.

The scope of Sylvia's vision for the Guild has always extended well beyond her efforts as a driving force in its establishment. She has high hopes for the Guild's future, and envisions growth in membership numbers, as well as a group that will ultimately have integral involvement with all phases of the Museum. Her desire for a close-knit group of people dedicated to the support of the Museum who enjoy the experience of giving — as well as receiving intense personal satisfaction in return — is well on its way to fulfillment. "I strongly feel that the Guild is a solid group because of the commitment of many enthusiastic, responsible people who saw the potential rewards immediately once our mission was determined." she says, with deep pride. "We will continue to grow because of the diverse talents that we have in our organization."

SYLVIA ROHLENA'S BLUE-RIBBON SPONGE CAKE

- 11/4 cups cake flour
- 1½ cups sugar
- · 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 34 cup (6 eggs) whites
- · ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
- ½ cup egg yolks
- ¼ cup cold water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Stir together in a bowl the flour, 1 cup sugar and the baking powder. In another bowl beat the egg whites until frothy. Add the salt and cream of tartar and beat 1 minute. Add ½ cup sugar and beat 1 more minute or until stiff. To sifted ingredients add the egg yolks, water and vanilla and beat until well blended, about 4 minutes. Fold into whites and pour into an ungreased tube pan. Bake at 350° 40 minutes. Remove cake from oven and invert.

Sylvia has been making this recipe she learned from her Babi since she was thirteen. This scrumptious cake won a blue ribbon at the A&-lowa Fair in 1972.

MOM'S KOLACHES (BREAD MACHINE)

PUT IN BREAD MACHINE: ON (MANUAL)

1 T. YEAST 3 1/4 C. FLOUR 1 TEAS. SALT 3/8 C. SUGAR

1/3 C + I T. POWDERED MILK

EGG

1/2 C. SHORTENING 1 1/8 C. WARM WATER

AFTER MIXED, PLACE IN GREASED, COVERED LARGE BOWL, AND LEAVE REFRIGERATED AT LEAST FOUR HOURS OR OVERNIGHT. PUT LOTS OF FLOUR ON BOARD, AND SHAPE INTO BALLS, WALNUT SIZE. SPACE 2" APART ON GREASED COOKIE SHEET. LET RAISE DOUBLE ... INDENT CENTER AND FILL. LET RAISE ABOUT 20 MIN. --- BAKE 375 10 min. USE POPPY SEED (SOLO) FILLING, OR CHERRY PIE FILLING TO WHICH YOU ADD SUGAR TO TASTE, AND ABOUT 1/4 TEAS. ALMOND FLAVORING. ...OR YOU CAN BAKE THESE AS BISCUITS. ...OR YOU CAN KEEP THIS DOUGH IN REFRIGERATOR AND BAKE A FEW AT A TIME.



She attended Hardshell School, Mount Vernon and Cedar Rapids Washington High Schools. She earned a normal training teaching certificate with post graduate work at Washington High School and attended the University of Iowa and Coe College as a non-traditional student.

She taught at Western and Buresh Schools before her marriage. She resumed her teaching career during World War II and taught at several schools in Johnson and Linn County. The last teaching position she held was in the College Community School system. She also taught Czech School and served the school as a board member.

She served as president of the Shueyville High School Band Parents and was the producer for the area WHO Home Talent Show.
