

MEMBERSHIP GROWING. Renewals and new members bring our total enrollment over 1,150 as of mid-February 1986. Donations continue to increase the Memorial Fund, Scholarship Fund and General Fund. Sales of publications continue to add a respectable sum to finances. The ABC's, My Czech Word Book, is approaching 10,000 copies sold. In 1985, packages of publications were mailed to 37 cities in 16 states,

coast to coast and border to border! All of the publications have had 3 to 7 printings! Our members are in 38 states and 230 cities. In out-of-state memberships, California leads, then comes Illinois, a tie for Minnesota-Texas; Michigan; another tie North Dakota-Wisconsin. We have one member each in Canada, Austria, Sweden, Czechoslovakia.

Donations the past year were \$986.50. THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU for your thoughtful financial help. Some 47% of our support comes from the modest dues of \$3.00, some 39% from sale of publications and 14% from donations. Another exciting year is ahead of us.



PRICELESS AUTOGRAPHS. A precious small, brown, leather-bound autograph book was caled to my attention recently. Several treasured signatures are in this guest book. Not just the name but thoughts and sayings are inscribed on some pages. On Nov. 28, 1907, Gabriela Preissova wrote "Oceans can limit boundaries of the world but not a Cech's love of the homeland." Preissova was the author of a novel, "Her Stepdaughter" which was the inspiration for Leos Janacek to compose his finest opera, "JENUFA". You will recall that the opera "The Cunning Little Vixen" was another of Janacek's compositions. Many of you readers attended the performance of that opera at the Hancher Auditorium in Iowa City. Another page has 3 bars of music, the words, "Čechy krasne, Čechy me." with signature of Herman, A Karel Pelant of Cedar Rapids, 2, April 1908 wrote, "I would wish that my homeland had at least one Carnegie fortune."

Visiting in the city, 15, May, 1905 Alice Garrigue Masaryk quoted from beloved poet Havliček, "Moje barva červená a bílá, Moje heslo poctivost a síla." (My colors are red and white, my motto integrity and strength). At that time, red and white were the colors of the Province of Bohemia. On another page: "Unforgetable are my memories which are with you across the ocean even in Čechy among your loved ones and friends. With Thankful and Friendly remembrances".

Praha, 17, Nov. 1907.

Although the book is not even half used, the last page on which inscriptions occur has the signatures of several well-known Cedar Rapidians of the early 1900's:

Joseph Fort Newton, minister of Peoples Church, and Jeanette Mae Newton. During WW I, Dr. Newton was minister at City Temple, London.

E.R.Burkhalter, long-time beloved minister of First Presbyterian Church.

Martha N. Marquis, wife of Dr. Jno. Marquis, President, Coe College.

Prof. Anna Heyberger of Coe, classes in French and Czech.

Jos. Mekota, active Democrat and prominent attorney.

W.F. Severa, owner of wholesale pharmaceutical company.

Rosina Westein -- medical doctor. Josephine Severa, wife of W.F.Severa Date of event, April 26, 1916.

Headlined "Šťastné a veselé přes moře" (Happy and merry overseas)


The report tells of the pleasure the team had in meeting people from their homeland and of their early arrival at the Cedar Rapids airport and effort made by Cedar Rapidians to locate them in Iowa City. They smiled with pleasure to see the 4 visitors dressed in costumes made in Czechoslovakia. They regretted that there was no time for them to visit the Czech Museum in Cedar Rapids. The men were surprised that folks here knew about the Spartakiada (field events) held last June in Praha. They told of their holidays and learned that here the preference for a holiday meal is goose, dumplings and sauerkraut rather than their carp dish. Over there carp is raised in village ponds and not caught in polluted river waters. Mrs. Stejskal (Iowa City) told them how Czechs here hold on to customs of their ancestors.


Evelyn Vecera, Bellaire, Texas.

In the 1930's CZECH CLASSES flourished in high schools in many parts of Texas. Today-few and an effort is being made to have Czech available to students at high school and college levels. The University of Texas at Austin offers on campus as well as correspondence courses. An effort is underway to establish a Chair of Czech Culture Endowment Fund. Such a project would require a start of \$500,000. The location of the project would be in one of the units of the College-University system.



MONARCH BUTTERFLIES wing their way southward in mid-October, passing through Monterey, California. Last fall 600 children "dressed as butterflies or with a big butterfly on their back" celebrated the event.

ROEZLIELLA, an orchid, is named for a Czech botanist, an importer in the 1880's, who lived in Prague. He discovered some 800 new species of orchids in his travels to Central and South America. He was envied but admired by rival collectors. He is described as "imposing and self-assured..... conspicuous for the iron hand he wore in place of a left hand severed in an accident." A statue of Benedikt Roezel stands in Charles Square in Praha. Roezel's nephew, Klabodi, who carried on the search for orchids in Mexico, was killed there.

To reach Charles Square, (Karlovo namesti) walk down hill from the National Museum on Vaclavske namesti, take any one of the 3 streets at your left to Žitna ulice. Turn right and the park will be just ahead of you...OR... if you are at National Theater (Narodni Divadlo) walk south along the bank of the Vltava River to the next bridge, Jiraskuv most, turn left on Resslova ulice, continue some 3 blocks to the Park. The statue is posed with Roezel holding an orchid in his hand.







REPORT from COUNCIL OF HIGHER EDUCATION, Matice Vyššího Vzdělání.

In 83 years of its existence, the Council continues to announce bequests to fund the loan and scholarship programs. In the academic year of 1984-85, loans were made to 54 (30 women, 24 men) of whom 30 were undergraduates and 24 graduate students. Loans ranged from \$400 to \$1000. Scholarships numbered 59 (30 women, 29 men) with 34 graduate students and 25 undergraduates. The scholarships ranged from \$500 to \$1000. It is the income from the ENDOWMENT FUND that makes these programs available to students of Czech and Slovak ancestry after one year in college. The beguest by James and Helen Hovorka was a major sum. Recently, the estate of Dr. Milos S. Bil of New York added \$89,621 to the Fund. He was born at Hradec (1911), Moravia, south of Opava and west of Ostrava. He was educated at Charles University. He and his wife, Dr. Dana Bilova, came to New York after WW II. He was a well known chemist. Family and friends of Mr. Jaromír Špaček made a memorial gift of \$725 to be used for a music student.

CZECH NEWSPAPERS printed in that language still exist in the United States. Among the few are: HOSPODAŘ once in Omaha now in West, Texas; the HLASATEL, Berwyn, Ill., and NASINEC in Granger, Texas.



hings are not as they were once in Granger, Texas. Perhaps the summers are as hot as they were a hundred years ago, the black prairie soil as rich and the cotton bolls just as white

ton bolls just as white, but the small, central Texas town with its wide, empty main street sits in the middle of an ever shrinking circle of farmland. There is still cotton



lining the roadway to town, bolls that have been blown off a passing truck into the dry grass and brittle weeds. And the sour smell of cottonseed oil is carried across the fields by an occasional hot gust of wind, just as it was before the turn of the century. But now, just beyond the horizon, lies Austin with its booming suburbs and high-tech industries, where folks on main street talk about the future of Texas in terms of chips and bytes, not bolls and bales.

Farmers first came to this fertile area northeast of Austin in the LB50s and the town was founded in 1882 when the railroad came through. Immigrants, many of them from what is now modern day Czechoslovakia, had settled in the area and by the turn of the century, Granger was a flourishing community, the center of a busy farm belt. It was King Cotton and the railroad that made Granger what it was. A hundred years later, there are shopping malls with big chain storejust a few miles away in Taylor and Georgetown, subdivisions with swimming pools and hot tubs, offices with mirrored windows and land-scaped parking lots, airports and commuter buses — King Cotton has had his day.

The NASINEC is unique because the paper is not printed on present day machinery. For 71 years the Nasinec continues to be "the life blood" of readers "who regularly write to Joe Vrabel -- owner, typesetter, editor and publisher". The equipment is an "Optimus" press in use since 1939. A staff of three carry on the tradition of the weekly paper. One feature folks enjoy is the story, most likely a novel, that is "continued in next week's issue". In a corner of the shop is a large Babcock "Reliance" press. still in working order. Along one wall are stacked trays with type and some old wooden type in German typeface. The use of this early method requires that the proof reader sees the words upside down, and reads right to left. It takes a real expert to read the copy....but it can be made easier by using a copier machine to proof read the copy before the page goes to the press. . .

BOOKS and AUTHORS "The Cunning Little Vixen" the "classic Czech novel" is now available in an English edition, 1985, 7 3/4 x 9 3/4 inches, drawings by Maurice Sendak, 162 pages of text and an "Afterword"



telling about the author. The drawings are the same as those used in the April 1981 production on stage by the New York City Opera. Author Rudolf Tesnohlidek of Brno wrote a series of stories for the newspaper in 1920. Ever since it has been popular elsewhere and only recently become a part of the repertoire of opera companies.

Many readers will be familiar with stories of Čech settlers in Nebraska, Texas, Kansas and about single settlements as Spillville, Ia. Often the newsletter reports such publications.

JAROSLAV SEIFERT, Nobel Poet Laureate 1984, realized his poetry was difficult for foreigners to appreciate because an "inner rhythm" that could not be translated from the Moravian dialect he used. For 60 years, Seifert had ups and downs with authorities. A heart attack on Jan. 9th brought his death the next day, Friday, 1986, while he slept. Three of his volumes of poetry are now available in English.

"The Casting of the Bells" by Seifert familiar to some of you, is now followed by 2 more books but these are bilingual editions. The left side page is in Czech, the right side page is in English. The translations are by the same two who did "The Casting of the Bells".

MOZART IN PRAGUE has 13 "Rondels". poems of 13 lines with rhyme and rhythm typical of that style of writing.

EIGHT DAYS, an Elegy for Thomas G. Masaryk has a 2 1/2 page Introduction about the poem and Masaryk's ideas and philosophy. Vice President Bush was the commencement speaker at the Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia at the time of the conferring of an Honorary Degree from the college on 5/V/1985. Seifert was not present to receive the honor.



MOZART, 1756-90, as AMADEUS (movie) began music lessons at age 3; age 5 his debut in Munich, fascinating royalty; age 7 in Paris; age 8 in London. Composed festival opera (1790) for the coronation in Prague of Leopold II, king of Bohemia. Composed 40 symphonies, 31 light short numbers, 9 marches, 25 dances and others.



F. PANCNER prominent merchant of Berwyn, Illinois, died Oct. 18, 1985 at the age of 93. He was born in Kyjov, N. W. of Presov and arrived in Chicago at the age of 20 in 1912. He attended a business college and then opened a bookstore in Chicago. Later his store in Berwyn on West Cermak Rd. was well known for imported giftware of all varieties and was said to have the largest best-stocked Czech bookstore in America. Many of you have, no doubt, had a Pancner catalog or sales listing at one time or another.

LEOŠ JANAČEK'S OPERA "JENUFA". The January issue of OPERA NEWS features some 14 pages about Čech operas. The articles include a biography of Janaček, an analysis and interpretation of his finest rated opera, JENUFA, pictures of his studio, of Gabriella Preissova whose novel, "Her Stepdaughter" inspired Janaček to write the opera.

An idea often mentioned in our newsletters is the difficulty to find adequate words in English to convey the depth of meaning of some Čech words. Janáček used his Moravian dialect which has speech rhythms not found in literary Čech but was better adapted to telling the story and fitting the soul of the music to bring out feelings.

In another article the writer emphasizes folk sources being so basic to opera. Since the middle 1800's rural customs preserved so much of the Čech heritage. "Of nearly 30 operas produced by Smetana (8) Dvořák (11) and Janáček (9), more than half are based on folk tales, legends, superstitions and ritual." A double page spread shows stage scenes and close-ups of some actors. The next page has a synopsis of each of the three acts.

Jenufa has become a staple on the European continent as of now and growing in popularity

in England and United States.


The first performances of Jenufa at the Met. were in German (1924-25) season.....starring Marie Jeritza (Jedližka, of Brno, Moravia). Since 1959, Jenufa was back on the American circuit in Chicago, San Francisco, and the Met. 1974. More recently the opera was presented in Čech in San Francisco. In 1981, in Paris, the first performance of Jenufa was exactly as Janaček intended it should be.

HARVARD ENCYCLOPEDIA of AMERICAN ETHNIC GROUPS is a volume of more than 1,050 pages, copyrighted 1980 with a 2nd printing 1981. The price is \$60,00 for the book.

We are so pleased to find that our CZECH HERITAGE FOUNDATION of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, is included in the topic "Ethnic Revival". The information mentions the Museum, The Czech Village altho it is not so-named, our festivals, our publications of Czech-English books for children and the issuance of our newsletter which "prints excerpts from archival holdings". The Czech section covers 12 pages (8 1/2 x 11 inches) using 2 columns per page. Also mentioned is the Matice vyssiho vzdělaní being founded in Cedar Rapids, 1902. It is now located in the Chicago area. You will recall that our newsletter has mentioned that the Council has loans and scholarships which are available to students of Czech descent. Some of our Czech organizations help support the Matice with annual donations.

The volume includes a brief history of the Czechs in the days of the old Empire, the period of the Republic, Immigration, Settlements, Settlers, Education, Religion, Czech Press, Politics, Writers and many other

topics. The volume is printed by the Belknap Press of Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts and London, England. Our THANKS to Robert Kouba for supplying the information.

SHARING IDEAS OF OTHERS. An active growing organization in Texas is CESAT, Czech Ex-Students Association of Texas. President Marvin J. Marek was asked, "What practical value of promoting Czech language in our schools if it is no longer spoken at home"? He thought it over and had this to say: "The major reason that comes to mind is that governments through diplomacy have not solved international disputes without ultimately resorting to war and killing of its citizens. The only alternative to this madness is the understanding of one another at "grassroots" level. In this vein, language for international understanding and its development must continue to be promoted by groups like ours. The world is too small and filled with everpresent threat of holocaust to do otherwise."

Along a similar line of thought is by John Karras, teacher of Czech in the Houston area who says, "Speak softly and carry a big foreign dictionary. Our United States is a Nation of Immigrants and its strength lies in its diversity -- a world of culture melted into one social and political system." He continues his remarks by giving several examples of bad blunders made by companies with foreign trade when translating slogans into other languages. Many of you have seen the same in Czech translations. He then quotes a few proverbs: Nikdo nema patent na rozum a znalosti, vše záleží na píli. (No one has a patent on intellect (sense or wit) and judgment, all depends upon application (zeal)." Taking a thought from Jan Neruda, Czech poet (1834-1891), Karras said, "Budeme-li pevni v rozhodnutí zachovat v Texasu český jazyk, tak naše národní dědictvi nikdo nerozboři." "(If we are firm in our decision to preserve in Texas the Čech language, then our national heritage will never be destroyed)".
