Lud was a learned man and he believed that if you join an organization you should become active and receive all you can from it.

Lud led by example encouraging all CHF board members to proudly wear their kroje to Czech functions.

He was instrumental in supporting the CHF tradition of



award-winning floats. Under Lud's leadership, CHF constructed a float to take "on the road" to out-of-town parades. Proudly pulling the float full of young CHF royalty he always said, "The kids in their kroje

are what make the float!"

Lud kept extremely busy throughout his life volunteering in many other organizations as well. Lud was a people person and enjoyed working with his wife Loreen.

He and Loreen did everything together as members and officers of these organizations: Boy Scouts, Sunday School, Rodeo organizations, Fraternal Order of Eagles, Red Cedar Leather Crafters, Benton County Pork Producers, Fairfax Senior Club, Farm Bureau, Fairfax Pekomy American Legion, St. Patrick's Parish in Fairfax, and Knights of Columbus.

Lud is survived by his wife Loreen, five children, nine grandchildren, three great-grandchildren and six siblings.

He was preceded in death by his parents Paul and Albia Svoboda.

Budweiser Clydesdales visit Village on way to promote Capone's Restaurant and Hideaway Bar


