Among these guests was our dear friend Brother Janda, the "Hired Man" with his wife, Sister Janda. Brother Janda gave the highlights and the lowdowns of the C.S.A. Get-together and convention to a large attentive group.

In August at Vassar College in Poughkeepsie, New York, a world youth conference was held. Fifty-seven nations were represented for the purpose of promoting world peace and unity among the youths of the world. Three of the twenty-five Czechoslovakian delegates were present at our meeting; they were Dr. Olga Schiessel, Dr. Geo. Kasparek, and Karel Karasek, accompanied by Otto Safranek of Chicago. Accompanying these youths while in Cedar Rapids, was Theodore Hlubucek, "Ma" Horvert, Miss Jaroslava Holub, Miss Ruth Bartunek, and Mr. Drahos. Although, today the final chapter of the Czechoslovakian crisis is near the end, at the time these visitors were here it was nearing the climax. One of the highlights of Dr. Schissel's speech was, "If a war should break out, it wouldn't be, as people think, between Germany and Czechoslovakia, but instead it would be a fight between democracy and totelarism.

The guests from Czechoslovakia were to leave Sept. 12th, and after a short visit in Chicago go on to New York, where on Sept. 21st., they were to sail, with the other delegates to their homeland. ...




