WFLA - HERITAGE HALL

Thousands to benefit from the work of Western Fraternal Life Association.

Ever since the beginning of the fundraising effort for the new National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library, WFLA has helped in a big way. Ray Miller, National President of this leading fraternal organization, has served on the Capital Campaign Task Force since its formation in April of 1992.

The pledge of support from American fraternalists of Czech and Slovak ancestry nationwide has exceptional. Fraternal organizations assisting in the capital campaign have not only spread the word, but helped in the fundraising effort as well. Two leading fraternal other Catholic organizations are Workman and Czech Catholic Union. Individual lodges from CSA (Czechoslovak Society of America) locally and across the country also are major benefactors.

Due to the fine efforts of Western Fraternal Life Association, over \$100,000 has been generously pledged to build the new National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. WFLA President Miller presented a check for \$60,000 to Museum &

Western Fraternal Life Association will be permanently recognized for its combined contribution by having the beautiful 3,800 sq. ft. rental hall named in its honor.




North East half of Museum & Library Floor Plan

KARLSTEIN CASTLE

He who finds himself in Karlstein valley to the southwest of Prague might think that he is in the fairy-tale world of the brothers Grimm. In front of him there appears, on a rocky headland, a mighty castle of fantastic shapes, a structure such as can be found nowhere else in Europe. What do we actually know about Karlstejn? Why, great persistence, with hundreds of thousands of people stream there every year?

Karlstejn is a castle linked essentially with the personage of its founder, the German Emperor & Bohemian King Charles IV. The period of his reign witnessed the all-around development of the land of the Bohemian crown: a state of calm was installed in the political field, economic relations were improved and strengthened, the domain of the Kingdom was extended, and through its architecture Prague became one of the creative centers of High Gothic mediaeval art.

The prestige of Charles IV as the Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire was firm and great: renowned not only for his ruling abilities, but also for the outstanding characteristics of the new, modern religion which he adopted particularly as the result of his long years of contact with Pierre de Rosiers, originally the Abbot of Fecamp, later the Cardinal of Avigon, and finally Pope Clement VI. Naturally, Charles IV was also influenced to a considerable extent by family traditions, his years of upbringing at the French court, and sojourns in Italy. It is there that we must seek the stimuli which led to the foundation of such an individual,



and his special castle, in accordance with his wishes, Charles' longed-for Karlstejn was to become.

What was it that Charles pined for? Peace and quiet, a place to rest and recuperate, a place where, from time to time, he could escape from the heavy burdens of a sovereign? Perhaps, but the ambitious and tenacious emperor undoubtedly must have moved by additional impulses too. He needed a reliable shelter for the imperial coronation jewels and holy relics. He was well acquainted with the French Gothic which kept spheres of architecture, sculpture, and painting that captivated the contemporary Christian world.

Charles wanted to ensure that his Karlstein was admired as a unique and inimitable symbol of the unity of his spiritual devotion and humility and his imperial power. Everything had to surpass the expectations of Charles' guests: even the seemingly modest and sober exterior of the castle buildings, devoid of sculptural decorations, fully contrasted functionally with the magnificence of the interiors and bearing witness to the will, manifested by God's grace, of Charles, the Emperor of the Holy

Roman Empire and King of Bohemia. Karlstejn castle could boast of five chapels: Chapel of the Holy Rood, Chapel of Our Lady, Chapel of St. Catherine, Chapel of St. Nicholas, and a private oratory adjoining the imperial beachcomber on the second floor of the palace.

The decorations in the Chapel of the Holy Rood reflect best and most perfectly the achievements of High Gothic painting in Bohemia. The epoch of the reign of Charles IV imprinted Karlstein with a likeness which remained decisive even for future ages. In the course of its existence the castle has undergone many transformations, but none has ever succeeded surpassing the in the fourteenth endeavors of century.

Last year, my family and I started planning for our trip to the Czech Republic which included my in the XII participation International Sokol Slet, I had always heard of Strahov Stadium (Europe's larges stadium) and now I would be experiencing the thrill of participating there representing my country. We arrived two weeks prior to the slet and with our rented van proceeded to just tour around and visit relatives. Getting lost took us on many adventures that were not planned. Canada,




Belgium, Republic, Australia, Slovakia, Austria, Switzerland, and Russia) estimated 20,000, guess marched for 2 1/2 hours on the cobblestone streets of Praha. The crowds were so emotional with shouts of "AT' ZIJE SOKOL - AT' ZIJE SOKOL" along the whole route. The people were sobbing, waving banners, scarves, handkerchiefs, proving that 48 years of sokol suppression did not kill the spirit. The people came into our throngs to hug us and welcome us. It was so emotional that our tired feet didn't mind the abuse of the tram rails and cobblestones that they were subject to! Monday, more practice. Tuesday ... the BIG DAY. The spectators numbered into 120,000. The number I participated in was called "Verna Garda" (Loyal Guard) for senior men and women of about 3,500. Our uniform was a copy of the one they had in 1948. It's difficult to describe the thrill of marching out on the field to the exuberance of clapping and cheers from the audience. All ages were represented from tots to seniors in a total of 11 numbers.

Wednesday's performance was repeated with the exception that President Havel was in the audience. This was an experience I'll never forget. I've been in many slets or festivals, local, national international. but measure up to the importance of this one. I can fully appreciate the importance of traditions and customs that my parents instilled in me as a young person. I felt their presence with throughout the whole trip. I was happy that my family could share this with me. Even my Czech was good enough to converse with the people. We went on with the rest of our vacation with the slet the high-light of happy memories.

Sokol was founded by Miroslav Tyrs and Jindrich Fuegner in Czechoslovakia in 1862. The concept was developed from the philosophy promoting mental, spiritual and physical excellence to preserve the identity of the people of Czechoslovakia. Because of its fundamental ideas it was banned by the communists. The first sokol unit in the united states was formed in St. Louis, MO. in 1865.



SPECIAL TO THE "MOST"

The day dawned bright and clear and hot. Some children rolled over and took another forty winks, but some of them yawned and stretched and said: "Today is the first day of Czech school this summer!" It was June 6, 1994, and the 124th consecutive year of the oldest continuous ethnic school of language for children in the United States. And it's here in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

A total of forty-six families enrolled a total of seventy-two children aged 6 to 13 in a five week course which ranged from simple alphabet memorization to an advanced peek into modern Czech history and a study of political events. At Wilson Elementary School on J Street SW teachers, Bessie Dugena, Leona Poduska and Olga Drahozal were assisted in the enrollment of the students by members of the Matice Skolska school board.

Classes were from 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. Learning to count in the Czech language and to recognize the Czech works for primary and secondary colors was reinforced by children's folk songs which used these words. Older children related to Czech words as if they were learning to use a secret code. Playing "Around the World" and "Hangman" and other word games became a fun part of every day. And on Fridays there was usually an ice cream treat from one of the sponsoring lodges to ease us into the weekend.

Several resource persons visited our school this year: Jindra Bayer, a student at Mount Mercy, told us about his student years in Czechoslovakia. John Kuba stopped in to tell us about his immigrant grandparents. Stephan Hejda, from Connecticut, while visiting our school, shared

with us his experiences. When he was four, his parents decided to escape to the west with their family from the Communist controlled country Czechoslovakia in search of freedom and a better life for their Raynolds. family. Aaron student-teacher from Kirkwood, brought in his twelve (Wilson Middle School) students who were experiencing a five day crash course in "All Things Czech". They particularly enjoyed our singing classes.

A very special highlight was the Gazette's visit to Czech Village on June 21 when students of the Czech School were invited to appear on the band stand and present a program of Czech folk

The educational field trip this year was to Pella, Iowa, to visit the museum of that predominantly Dutch community. Two full buses carried students, parents and friends on the all-day excursion.

A program on Friday July 8th in the Wilson School auditorium presented to the community a kaleidoscope of learned accomplishments. It was followed by the traditional "Zmrzlinovy Dychanek" (ice cream social) and was attended.

We are grateful to the staff of Wilson Elementary School for their hospitality and kind assistance. And to the Czech community for supporting the Ceska Skola for 124 years.

ORIGINAL BOHEMIES

The Boii were a tribe if the ancient Celts who were in the British Isles, Western Europe and lands of the Mediterranean and

Turkey earlier than 400 B.C. An explanation of the work Biohemie is what the Romans called the part of Central Europe where the Boil lived for centuries. The name was finally Bohemia.

In the years about 437 A.D. the Slavs moved out of the Ural Mountains that separate Russia and Siberia. The leader of one group of Slavs was Jan Cechus. When they reached the part of Central Europe that looked desirable they decided to stop there and make it their new home area. And so the mane Bohemia was the name until W.W.I.

In the mean time there had been a Kingdom of Moravia (900 - 100) and later a Kingdom of Bohemia (1100 - 1200). Then the following vears brought German control over the area and it was later followed in the mid 1800's by Bohemia becoming a province of German Austria. Finally at the end of W.W.I Czechoslovakia came to be its own nation. President Masanih (d. 1937) served his nation from 1918 - 1935 and then Beres was After W.W.II, the president. communist nation was and remained that way until recently.

Then the Czech Republic and the Slovak Republic came into being. There is a difference in the language, culture, political ideas and social customs. The Slovaks are communists, in contrast the Czech Republic has highly developed manufacturing and mining and agriculture.

Cedar Rapids is predominately of Moravian ancestry with Czech & Moravian making up about 30% of the population. The first wave of settlers came in 1858 - 1860. Then the Curt War there was a troubled era. By the late 1880's and into the 1900's many more Czechs came to the States.
