During July 1945, Mayor Henry Bloom appointed community leaders to a Polio Executive Committee.






He also appointed I.D. Pennock as Director of the Committee.


They designated the Winnebago County Hospital a Contagion Facility for the city and county.



The medical staff of the hospital were incorporated in the new Polio facility.



New equipment from neighboring hospitals and the National Committee for Infantile Paralysis arrived without delay.





259 nurses and 18 physical therapists were recruited from 18 different states and Argentina.

Each day nurses were transported to County Hospital from the Faust Hotel where they were provided with living quarters.




In July, 1945, the Executive Committee published this Proclamation in an attempt to contain the contagion.

POLIO PROCLAMATION

The INFANTILE PARALYSIS COMMITTEE strongly recommends that parents keep their children under 14 from congregating in parks, playgrounds, business districts and other public places. It is important that children be kept from making new contacts and from engaging in all fatiguing activities. Insofar as possible, children should be kept within the areas of their own yards.
