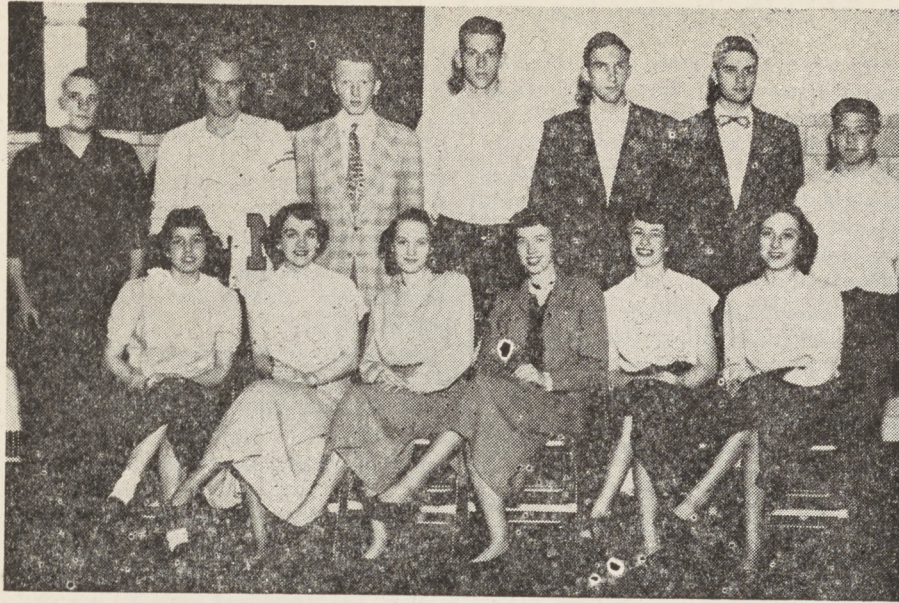

## Nilehi to Hold Annual Track Event June 3

"...An Annual Pentathlon, held at the close of each season to determine an individual grand champion in track, would create a lot of interest. It would tend to stimulate track at each individual school."

The preceding excerpt was taken from a letter written by Charles W. Hussey, Nilehi varsity track coach, to 53 coaches of other high school track teams in the surrounding area.

"The Annual Niles Pentathlon is to be modeled after the great Olympic all-around event," according to Coach Hussey.

The Pentathlon is to be held on the Nilehi track June 3. The meet will take place during the evening with preliminaries in the afternoon. It is felt that if 25 schools enter a participant, the venture will be worth while.

Each contestant is required to participate in five events as set up by an annual pentathlon in one of the larger state universities.

There are eight listed events—running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, 12 pound shot put, discus, 220 yard dash, 880 yard run, and 120 yard high hurdles. Three requirements, however, have to be met by each trackster; he must participate in one of the first three events, and in one of the next two, and in one of the latter three listed.

The scoring for each event is based on a point system which ranges from 0 to 1000. In the field events, points are graduated according to distance; and in the running events, the scores are graduated to match the timings.

The individual man representing each school will not have to be named until a week before the meet, according to Mr. Hussey.

Two new school records were chalked up for the Nilehi tracksters—one in the high jump and one in the discus. Martie Seidler bettered the high jump record of five feet eight inches by two inches, making the new record five feet ten inches, while John Boznos threw the Discus two feet further than the previous record, setting a new mark at 131 feet 7 inches.

High point man for Niles was Bill Graefen with a total of 15.05 points, closely followed by Jack DeStories, who scored 14.25 points.
