Dr. Clyde Parker, Superintendent of the Niles Township High Schools for the past nine years, was born in a coal mining town, Dugger, in Indiana. He is married and has two daughters and five grandchildren.

After graduating high school, Dr. Parker attended Franklin College in Indiana where he received his Bachelor of Arts Degree. He earned his Master of Arts Degree at Indiana State University and later earned his Doctorate Degree at Indiana University. Dr. Parker was also awarded an Honorary Doctorate Law Degree from Upper Iowa University.

The capable educator has been in the field of teaching and education for 42 years. He has held the position of Superintendent of various schools for the past 35 years. Furthermore, he has been active in both the Iowa State School Administrators Association and the American Association of Administrators.

Dr. Parker has also taught at Augustana College, University of Colorado, and Indiana University.

The Trojans finished up the finals when Katz and Hawkins teamed up with juniors Wayne Thomas and Lee Bollow in the 200 -yard medley relay. The relay team took fourth place, posting a time of 1:44.9. The men of Troy swan for 43 points that afternoon and on March 1, 1968 placed ninth in the state meet. Since the strength of this year's team lay in juniors, next seasons varsity swimming picture is a bright one. He sensed their growing disatisfaction with our present policies and youth's distrust of their parents' generation.
