## Varsity Thinclads Lose to Arlington; Sophomores Defeat Arlington, Leyden

The Nilehi Trojan track men lost a close meet to the Arlington Cardinals, Wednesday, May 11, by a score of 58-55 in a night affair held on the Cardinal cinders.
A new school record was set by John Boznos in the discuss with a throw of 134 feet. John is also the holder of the previous discus record at 131 feet, 7 inches.
The Trojans were ahead going into the last event, the 880 -yard relay, by three points-55-53. Don Siegel, lead-off man for Niles, came out on top at the first baton exchange to Jim Kennedy. Augie Krause of Arlington, however, accidentally knocked the baton from Kennedy's hand and before Jim could recover it, Niles found themselves half a lap behind; consequently, Arlington bettered Nilehi's total score by three points.

Niles took first places in the mile run, Bill Grafke; the 120-yard high hurdles, Don Siegel; the 440-yard dash, DeStories; the 880 -yard run, Grafke; and the discus, Boznos.

At the annual State District track and field meat held Saturday, May 14, at Evanston Township High School, Bill Grafke and Jack DeStories just missed the qua'ification times for going down state in their respective outstanding events.

Grafke's time for the mile run was swo seconds over the required mark at 4:47. DeStories, however, came even closer, just missing qualification in the 440 -yard run by two tenths of a second at :53.6.

The freshman baseball team from Niles Township High School continued its winning way by swamping Leyden, $23-3$, on May 16 in Franklin Park, according to Mr. Robert Mackey, frosh coach.
Ed Trausch and Dick LaVeau hit home runs for the Trojans. Ronald Juern was the winning pitcher, going all the way.
The frosh dropped their first game of the season to Evanston on May 13, by a score of 10-1. Leroy Glauner, Jack Thiry, and Ralph Wenk hurled for the Trojans.

The team has a record of six wins and one loss.
on Monday, May 16, as the Arlington Cardinals outlasted the Trojans, 4-3.

Niles had nine hits to Arlington's six, but the Trojans could tally only three runs.

The big inning for Niles was the sixth when Frank McNeill singled, and Bonney tripled. Harold Siemsen grounded out, but Jack Heurlin, Ed Beebe, and Fred Brei singled consecutively, two more runs scoring. The inning ended on a fielder's choice, and an infield fly.
The winning pitcher was Bill Robinson of Arlington. The loser was Jim Hosfield, Trojan right-hander.

Neither Arlington or Leyden was any match for the Trojan sophomore track men on Monday, May 17, when the Nilehi thinclads came out on top with scores: Niles 681/2; Arlington, 64; Leyden, $321 / 2$. In a frosh meet held the same afternoon, Nilehi lost to Arlington and Leyden.
Walter DeStories, Ronny Gawrys, and Don Walter captured eight first places for the Trojans. Gawyrs won the 220yard low hurdles, the 110 -yard high hurdles, the broad jump, and the high jump (tie). DeStories won the 440 and $880-$ yard runs, while Walter captured the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Russell O'Grady took a second place in the shot put.
