THIS YEAR, NILEHI STU-DENTS more than doubled the amount they contributed to the 1958 United Fund Drive by giving \$1,318.27. (Last year's total was \$521.74.)

It is their hope that "the students will realize the importance of the Fund Drive and the fact that it completely eliminates other charity drives.
