The Nilehi Trojan basketball team has won 172 games and lost 85 since the school started in 1932. Their most impressive record was in 1938-39 when they won 14 games and lost 2.

Garner Gets Interview For First Story

Mr. Robert Mackey, JayVee basketball and football coach and auto shop teacher at N.T.H.S. gave this new Nilehilite reporter an interview recently.

To start out with, the most important thing happened to Mac when he was born on Dec. 22, 1905 in a town with a population of 12,500 called Murphysboro, in southern Illinois.

Mac completed his high-school education at M.T.H.S. (Murphysboro Township High School) earning five major letters, two in football, two in track, and one in basketball.

In 1945 his boys brought home the trophy from the Waukegan Regional Tournament.

Mac's favorite pastime is "huntin' or fishin'" and he enjoys any kind of food, just so long as it's edible.
