The poster will be an illustration emphasizing the theme of this special week. The entries will be judged in Chicago the week of October 1, and will also be on display during this week.

First prize will be a one-year scholarship to the Art Institute of Chicago or \$300 cash and a Disabled American Veterans medal.

Second prize will be a one-year scholarship to the Academy of Fine Arts in Chicago or \$300 cash and a D.A.V. medal. Third prize will be \$100 U. S. Savings Bond and a D.A.V. medal; prizes for first and second honorable mention will be \$25 Savings Bonds.

The winners will travel to Chicago for a two-day all-expense visit to receive their awards.
