Two Hundred Twenty-One Stars in Your Alma Mater's Service Flag—
College is Awake to War

THAT Knox College is doing its full share in all matters relating to the war goes without saying. The wide range of things in which the college and the students have been lending their aid is indicated by the following partial list of movements with which they have been connected:

Of the students who were in college at the time war was declared by the United States, over seventy, or a little more than 25% have enlisted.

The list published in this number of the *Alumnus* and in the October number gives the names of 221 alumni and former students who are in the service of their country. There are undoubtedly many others of whom we have not yet heard.

The college has established military drill, which is required of all freshman and sophomore men three times a week, and has provided a course in military tactics, one hour a week, which is required of the same students.

A course in conversational French has been started, which is designed especially for men who expect to go to France soon.

The records show that only fifteen men now in college are within the draft age, and several of them are enlisted in the Aviation Corps, or other branches of the service, and merely waiting call.

Last spring when there was urgent demand for help on the farms, the college released students for agricultural service, as well as for military service. Over a hundred men left before the year was up for military or agricultural service.

In the recent Liberty Bond campaign, the faculty and students subscribed for several thousand dollars of bonds. The freshman class bought a \$100 bond, which they donated to the college, and the Phi Mu sorority a \$50 bond, which they likewise gave to the college.

In the campaign for army Y. M. C. A. work, Knox College was asked to raise \$2,000. It subscribed \$2,609.

In the Red Cross membership canvass, Knox College was the first 100% college in the country to be reported to Red Cross headquarters. Every member of the faculty and of the student body is a member of the Red Cross.

The Knox auxiliary chapter of the Red Cross, composed of the girls of the college, spends every Saturday morning in the Red Cross work shops, and has turned out a large amount of work.

In the membership canvass of the Red Cross, thirty-five of the Knox cadets acted as canvassers in one or two wards of the city, where it had been found difficult to get solicitors. They did very effective work.

For the convenience of its alumni and students in Europe, Knox College has joined the American University Union in Europe.

The faculty have taken a large part in all patriotic movements in the county. Miss Painter is secretary of the Knox County Chapter of the Red Cross. Kellogg McClelland has been treasurer of the Red Cross membership canvass of the county. Professor Raub is chairman of the Knox County committee on publicity, and a member of the Knox County executive committee of the State Council of Defense. Dean Simonds and Professor Griffith are among the Four-Minute men of Galesburg, and have delivered a large number of speeches for this organization. Miss Stayt has had charge of the canvass for the Y. W. C. A. war fund in Knox County.
