

Recycling involves more than separation and ersion of a material from the waste stream. There must be cost effective methods for returning the recyclable back into a marketable product. At the present time there are a number of materials being actively recycled in this area. These include most metals including tin cans, paper, cardboard, clear glass, some PET 1 and most HDPE 2 plastics, as well as used motor oil. Businesses in the area are trying to develop markets and economical collection methods for other recyclable materi-

There are a variety of recycling opportunities in Black Hawk County.

Y Carton Company at 5 Dunkerton Road in Cedar Falls is accepting a number of items including: newsprint,

high grade papers, cardboard, HDPE 2 plastic, clear container glass and metal cans. Weissman Industries, 1500 W. Airline Highway will accept metal cans and will pay for cans in quantity. R-Business Recyclers, 236-1344 will set up paper recycling for schools, office buildings and small businesses.

Most full service gas stations will accept used motor oil. Jim Lind's Standard and Duffy's Sunoco are just two examples. Most salvage yards will buy lead acid (car, truck or motorcycle) batteries and most battery retailers will accept them. Many will pay you for recycling your battery.

There are also several drop off points throughout the area. Columbus High School students have established a program for newspaper, cans, plastic

and glass. The Waterloo Public Library will accept magazines. St. Luke's Episcopal Church has a recycling program in place, as do many other area churches. It is suggested that you confirm acceptability of materials and hours of operation before delivering materials.

Gary Wilcox was appointed the Solid Waste and Resources Recovery Administrator for Black Hawk County in March. Since his appointment he has been working to develop a comprehensive waste reduction program for the county. Gary will be happy to answer your questions about waste reduction in our county, at 234-8115. Other questions about how and what to recycle should be directed to the businesses listed.





### HARTMAN CLEAN UP

On April 20, 1991, about 175 volunteers pulled on their work gloves and marched into the new 180 acre addition to Hartman Reserve Nature Center (HRNC). By the end of the day a total of 10.32 tons of garbage, 9.77 tons of scrap iron and 346 tires had been removed from the site by these volunteers! This clean up is the first step toward making this new addition a clean, safe addition to HRNC.




### HICKORY HILLS ADDITION

When the Casey's Lake at Hickory Hills Park was created in the early 1970's it offered clean water for swimming and provided excellent fishing. Since then the lake has been rapidly filling with silt. Much of this silt is a result of soil erosion from farm fields within the watershed which drains into the lake. This additional silt has made the lake shallower, smaller and has reduced the quality of the water for recreational purposes.

The only way to prevent the lake from to-tally filling with silt was to reduce the amount of soil erosion in the lake's watershed. Recently, 48 acres of erodible land within the watershed of the lake was purchased by the Black Hawk County Conservation Board with monies from the Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) fund.

This new addition, which is located due north of the lake, will be taken out of row crop production and will be seeded to prairie grasses and other permanent covers. Protecting the soil on this new addition will go a long way toward extending the life of Casey's Lake!



### THE DEPOT RE-OPENS

The Black Hawk County Conservation Board (BHCCB) has leased the Depot, which is located in Gilbertville on the Cedar Valley Nature Trail, to a new concessionaire, Fred Wahl. Mr. Wahl, who lives in Gilbertville, will offer a variety of sandwiches, beverages and ice creams for sale. He is interested in expanding his menu and services if there is enough support from trail users.

The Depot will be open Tuesdays through Fridays (11 am to 5pm), Saturdays (8 am to 5 pm), Sundays (noon to 5 pm) and for special requests at other hours.





POND CANOEING- June 11, 18, 25. Explore the ponds of HRNC by canoe. Reservations required, basic instruction provided, \$5 fee.


