Re: Summary of Delegation meeting with parties to the Indian settlement

5/29/80 Date: 5/30/80

Points covered at the meeting:

1. WSC impressed on all present that the proposed settlement might have to tailored to meet whatever objections key committee chairmen insist on.

- 2. Because it cannot be determined at this time, what those objections will be, no one in the delegation can issue an unqualified endorsement of the proposal.
- 3. Action on the proposal will begin in the Senate with the Senate Indian Committee.
 - a) Hearings on the proposal will be held probably in late June.
- 4. Following the Indian Committee's consideration of the bill, the Senate Budget Committee will analyze the amount of money involved.
- 5. Senator Hollings will have to be satisfied that:
 - a) the settlement is fair in failing to require a state contribution.
 - b) the amount of money involved is appropriate
 - c) whether the terms of the settlement will serve as the precedent for the remaining Trade and Intercourse claims.
- 6. Representatives of the State of Maine were apprised that the State might have to make a token contribution of either money or land or both.
 - a) Pessimism was expressed over whether this was possible.
- 7. The point was driven home that the Congressional version of the settlement could differ significantly from the present proposal.
- 8. Emery noted that Morris Udall had set forth 4 points which he was prepared to insist on as prerequisites to passage:
 - a) Consensus of all parties
 - b) Unanimity within the Telegation
- c) Some state contribution
 - d) That the proposal be reasonable and defensible.
- 9. I think Tureen was very pleased with the meeting as was Dick Cohen. The Indian negotiators made the appropriate rumblings of dissatis-faction but I believe they were given enough to go back and talk to their people.
