March Meets Its Match

Approximately 320 marchers protesting the nature of ROTC at the Colleges encountered four companies of ROTC enrollees on their drill field near Bauer Hall Monday afternoon. The result was a unique and peaceful encounter involving a dialogue between the demonstrators and the ROTC men.

The protestors, led by ASPC President Rick Marcus and Bob Berke, organizers of the Students Committee for Social Change, marched from PC's Alumni Field to the ROTC drill field, where 150 men were participating in the first day of drills. Berke and Marcus earlier said that they planned to lead the demonstrators around the perimeter of the field, which was surrounded by a fence erected last week.

Marchers Welcomed

However, they expressed surprise upon their arrival when the ROTC opened their gates and hung up a "Visitors Welcome" sign. After hesitating the marchers passed through the gates and were handed a letter from the ROTC calling for a "Day of Dialogue". It stated that "We, as fellow students, would sincerely appreciate your understanding, recognition and respect of our right to pursue a course of our own choosing."

The members of the ROTC were given, in turn, a letter from the SCSC explaining that the dissatisfaction with ROTC centers around the apparent conflict between the purposes of ROTC and the purposes of a liberal arts college, the granting of academic credit to ROTC, giving professors of military instruction full votes in faculty meetings and granting ROTC the use of college facilities within the curriculum.

After entering the field, the marchers encircled the perimeter

of the grass without disrupting the drills. As the drills drew to an end about ten minutes later, the ROTC men, followed a plan which, according to Colonel Bowen N. Smith, was determined last weekend. They individually approached small

Security Filmed All

Apparently acting unilaterally, campus security took films of Monday's SCSC ROTC demonstration. The filming followed a statement by one of the security officers that they would only film incidents of obstruction.

Grady Sharp, head of security, and two of his men stationed themselves in the Bauer Center parking lot until the drill started. At that time one of them said they planned to take pictures of obstruction to be used as evidence at any trials stemming from the incident and that the pictures would not be used for any other purpose.

When the marchers entered the field Sharp was inside the gate with a movie camera. He filmed them as they went through the gate.

After the demonstration the COLLEGIAN asked a CMC administrator whether he had authorized Sharp and his men to take pictures. He said that as far as he knew security was acting on their own. Sharp's only comment was, "I acted on my own. I feel that it's part of my responsibility."

SDS, SCSC Disagree

Both the Student Committee for Social Change (SCSC) and the Claremont Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) participated in Monday's demonstration. The two organizations, however, gave different reasons for participating:

"The dissatisfaction centers around the apparent conflict between the purpose of ROTC and the purposes of a liberal arts college, the granting of academic credit to ROTC, giving professors of military instruction full votes in faculty meetings and granting ROTC the use of college facilities within the curriculum." (SCSC memo distributed to ROTC cadets at the demonstration.)

"We do not protest the administration or procedures of the ROTC program, uniformed officers appointed by the Army voting on the college faculties, the regulation of dress and behavior of students by the military, special privileges for ROTC recruitment, or course credit for bayonet training... Committee Leads Way

Colleges Head BSU Demands

Implementation of last year's seven BSU demands has begun by the Committee for Minority Student Relations, chaired by Professor

Galbraith at PC. Noted economist, diplomat, and author, John Kenneth Galbraith will be the featured speaker at a political rally this Saturday at 10 a.m. in Pomona's Greek Theatre.

The rally is being conducted in support of Fred Warner Neal, Chairman of the Political Science Department at Claremont Grad School, and currently the Democratic candidate for the Congressional seat in the 24th district.

Galbraith is a Harvard professor of economics who has served as American ambassador to India and Chairman of the Americans for Democratic Action. His extensive list of books includes THE AFFLUENT SOCIETY and THE NEW INDUSTRIAL STATE.

The Committee is composed of several faculty and six student representatives. Of these six, two are from the BSU. The other four were to represent the other campuses and minorities. Originally it was thought that these other student representatives could be obtained from the United Council, but this wasn't possible.

Committee Accomplishments

Instead the Student Body Presidents were asked to secure a list of nominations from their respective Student Councils. As of yet there are no student members, save the two from the BSU. Pixley considers this lack of student participation as being very detrimental. "Our motion depends on student participation."

Nevertheless, the Committee has accomplished much of the organizational procedures necessary for its future action, as well as a few concrete things.

This summer, for example, three professors attended courses

in black culture, at the expense of the Committee. Mrs. Sull from Honnold Library was one. Funds (\$4000) are currently available for the purchase of books dealing with aspects of Black America. In addition, a course in Swahili was created this summer and is currently being offered at the Grad School.

Organizational Work

For the most part, however, the Committee's work has been organizational. Subcommittees on curriculum, housing, admissions and speakers have been established. They are headed by Professor Hamerton-Kelly of Scripps, and Dean Malan of Pitzer, Dean Wheaton of Pomona and Mr. George Blair of CGS, respectively.

The goal of the Curriculum Subcommittee is the establishment of a program in Black Studies. Pixley feels that planning is very necessary here. He feels that the ad hoc methods used in bringing about the Swahili course (it was created in two weeks in response

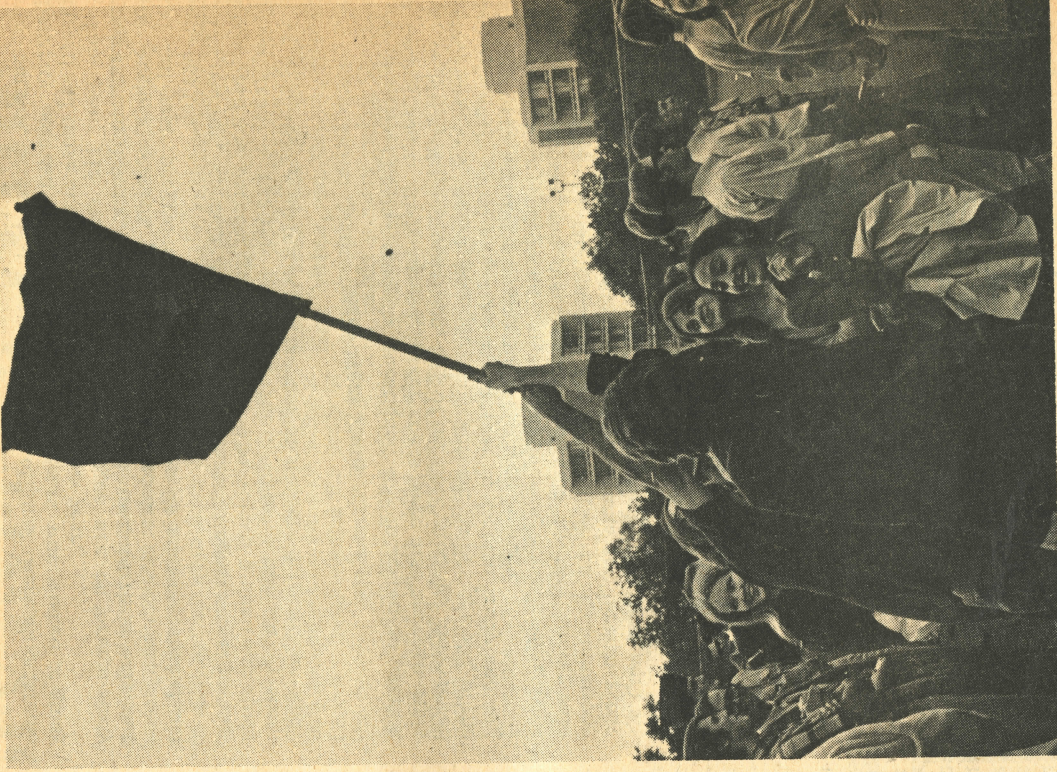
