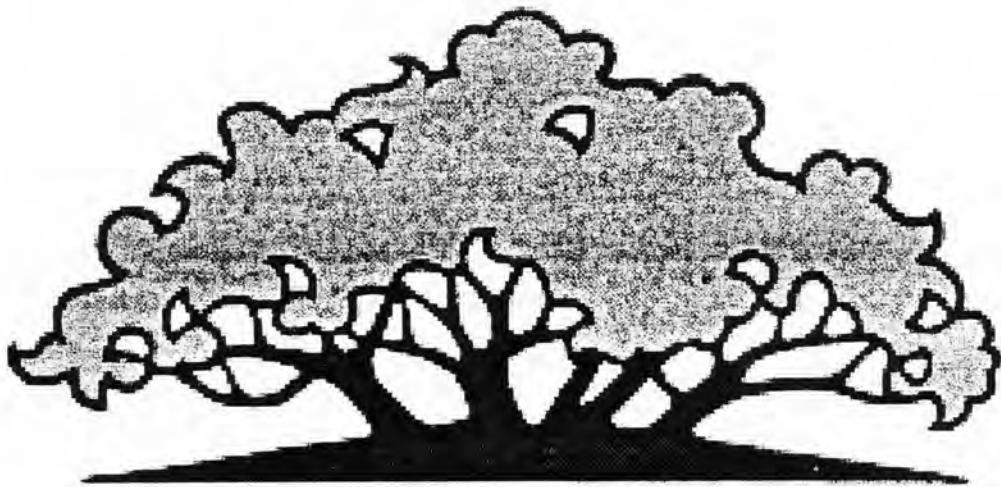

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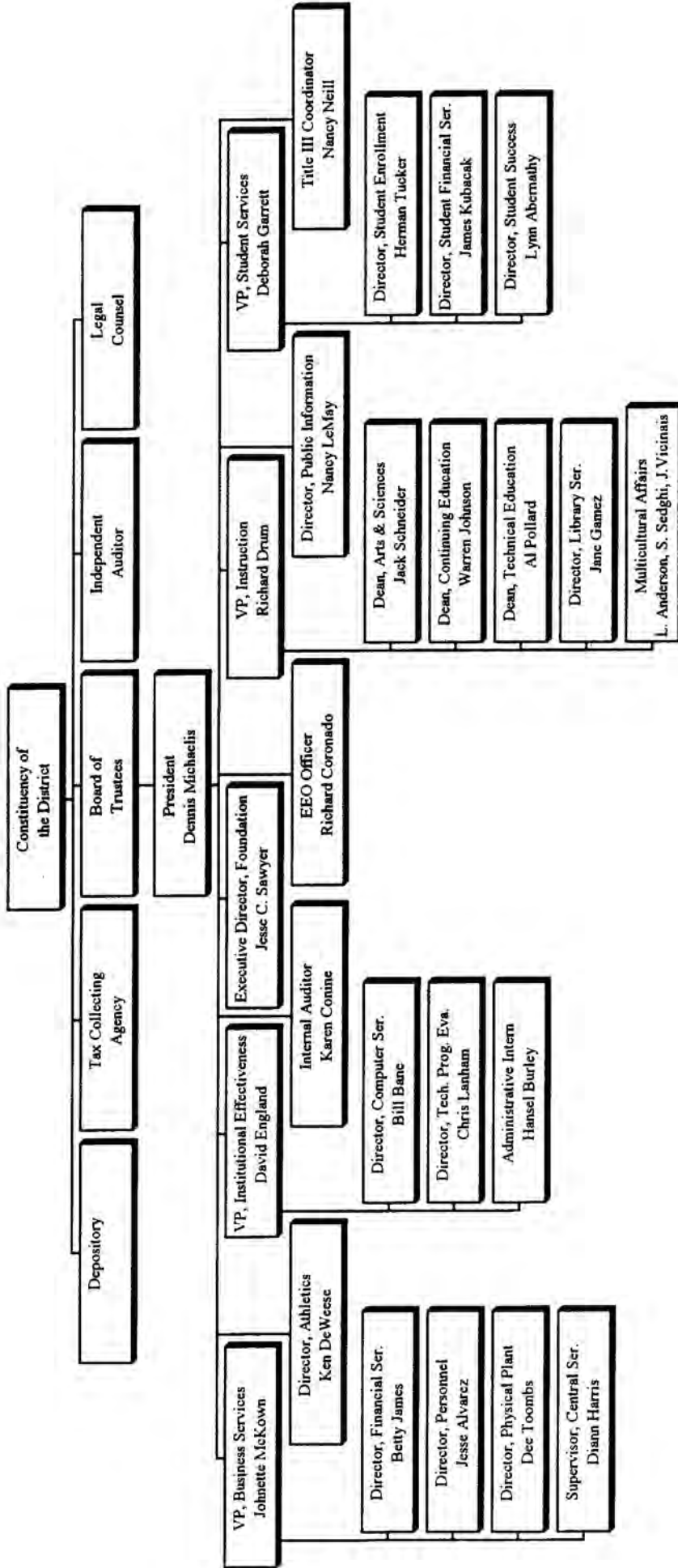

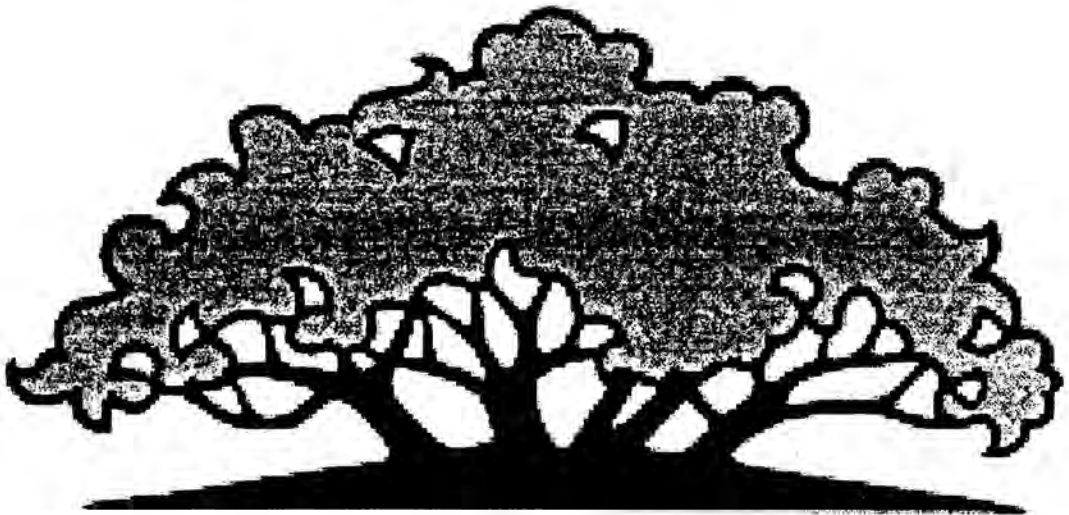

1984 - 1993

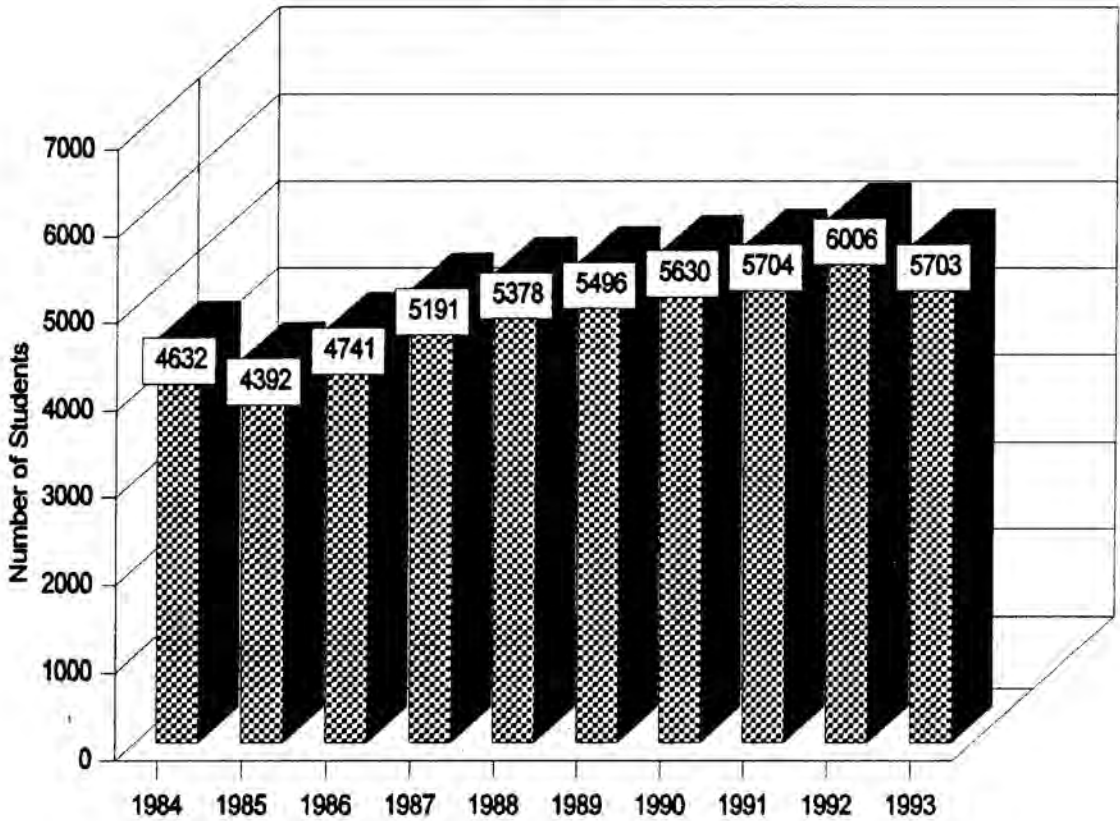


Figure 1. MCC total enrollment growth.

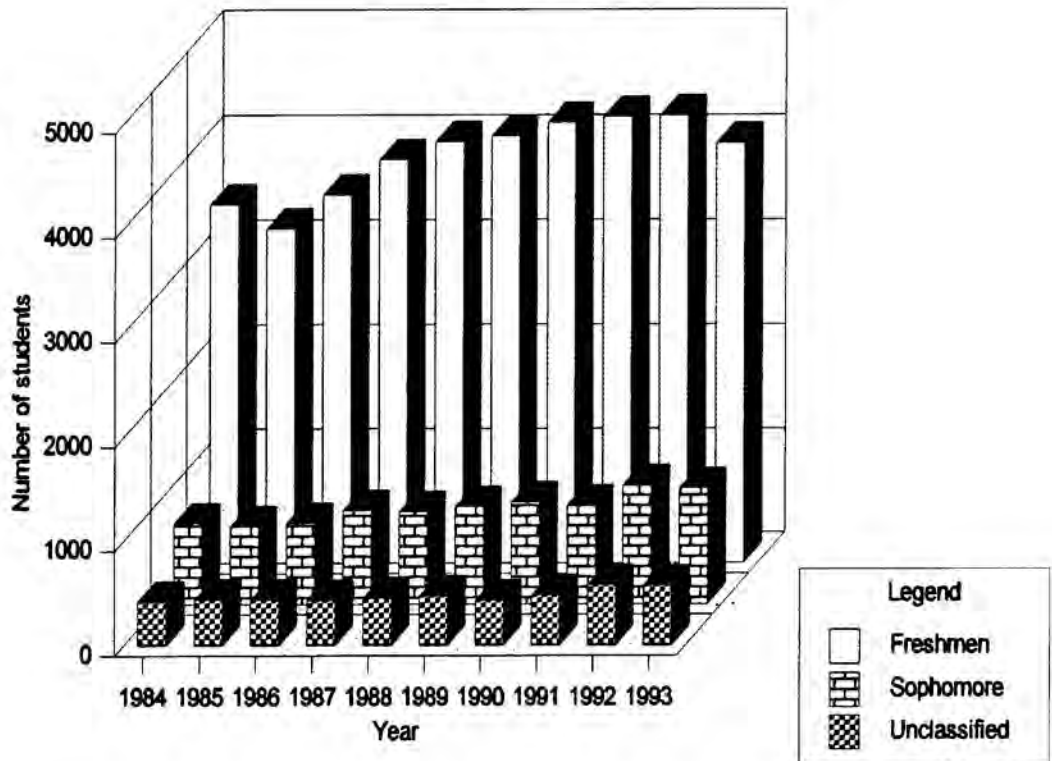


Figure 2. Comparison of class enrollment figures for ten fall semesters.

Freshman fall enrollment percentage of total enrollment ranges from 73% to 75%, with the exceptions of fall 1992 and fall 1993, when freshman enrollment dropped to 71.4 and 70.5% percent of total enrollment, respectively. However, in 1992, sophomore enrollment jumped by nearly 2.5%.

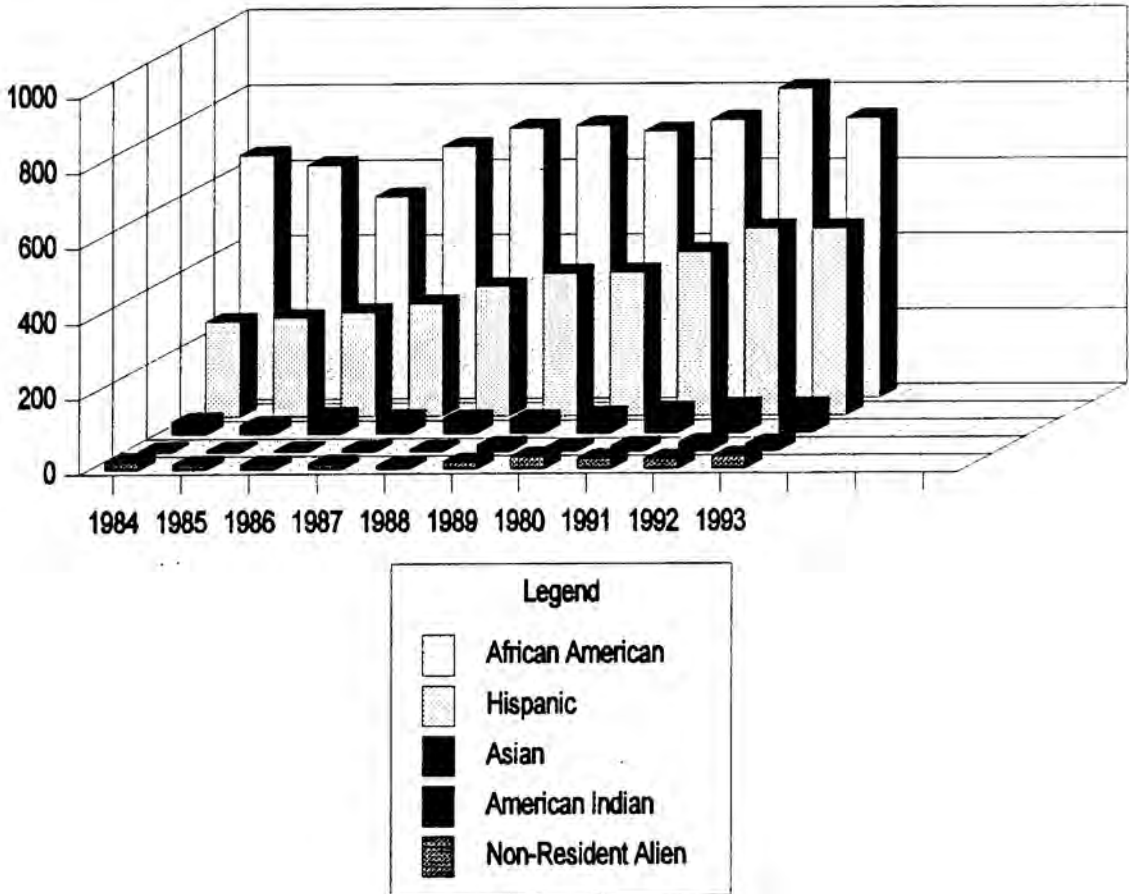


Figure 3. Minority enrollment growth.

While total enrollment at MCC has risen steadily, enrollment by minority populations has grown from 21% of total enrollment in 1984 to 24% of total enrollment in 1992. Most of this growth has been led by Hispanic students, whose enrollment nearly doubled during this period. Hispanic students made up 5.5% of the total enrollment in 1984. That number rose to 8.7% in 1993.

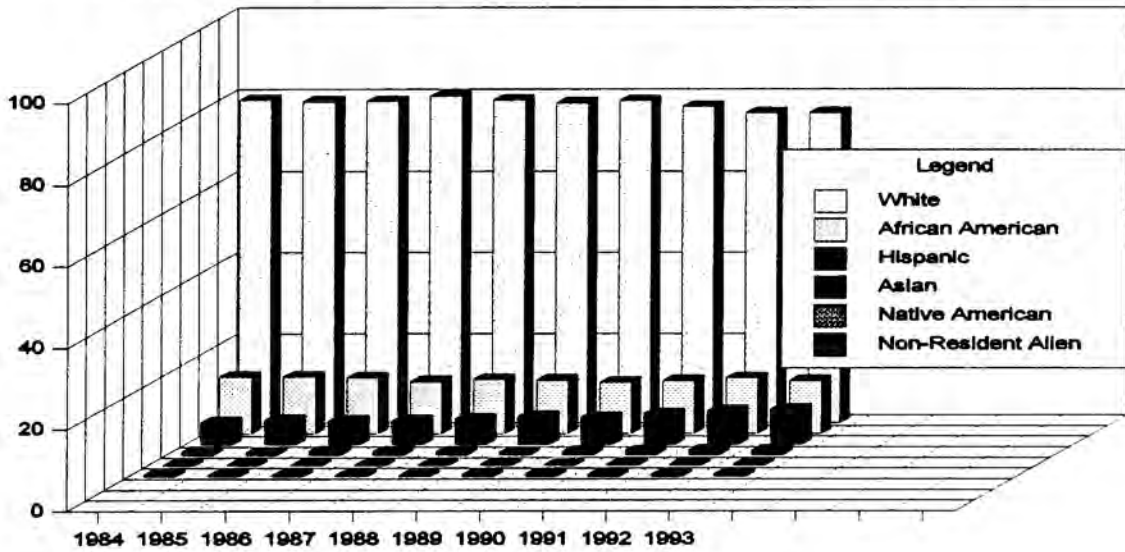


Figure 4. Graphic comparing all ethnic groups.

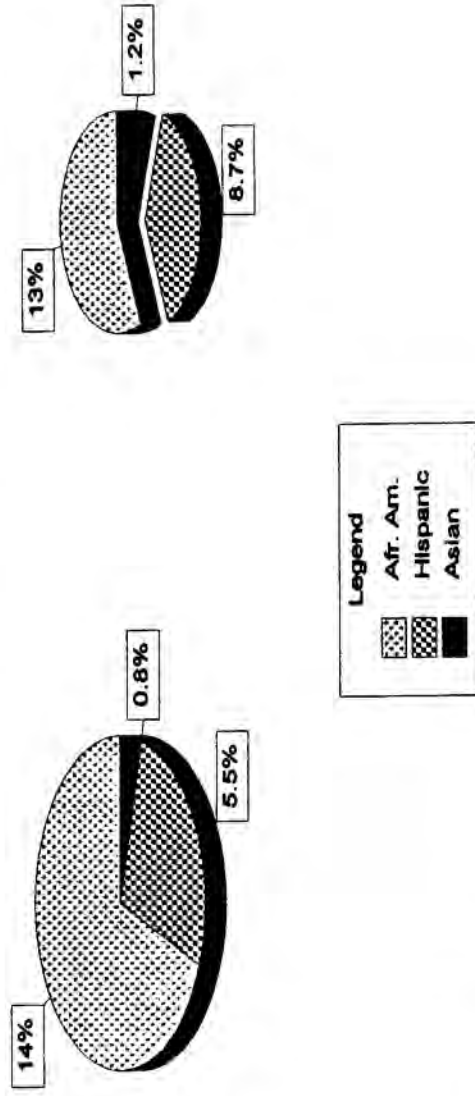


Figure 5. A comparison of selected minority populations.

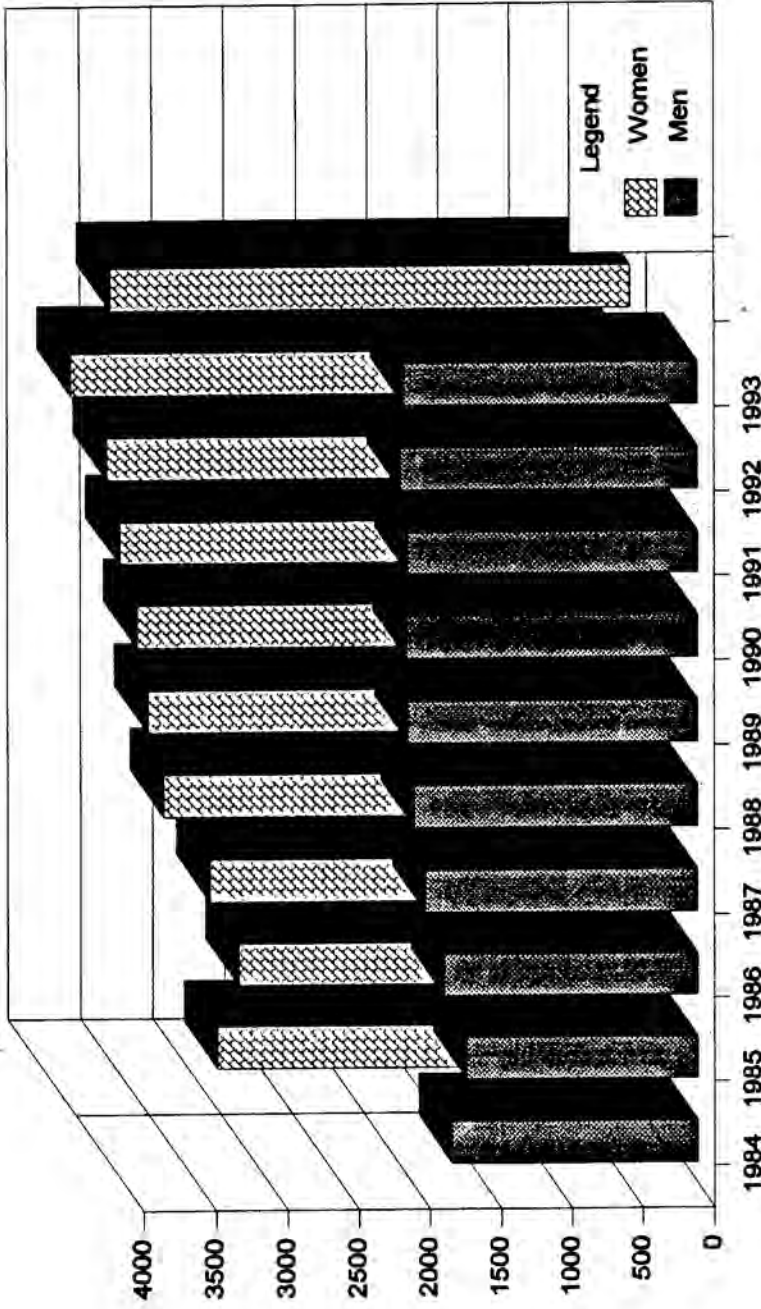


Figure 6. Number of students by gender.

# Age Ranges for Part Time Enrollment

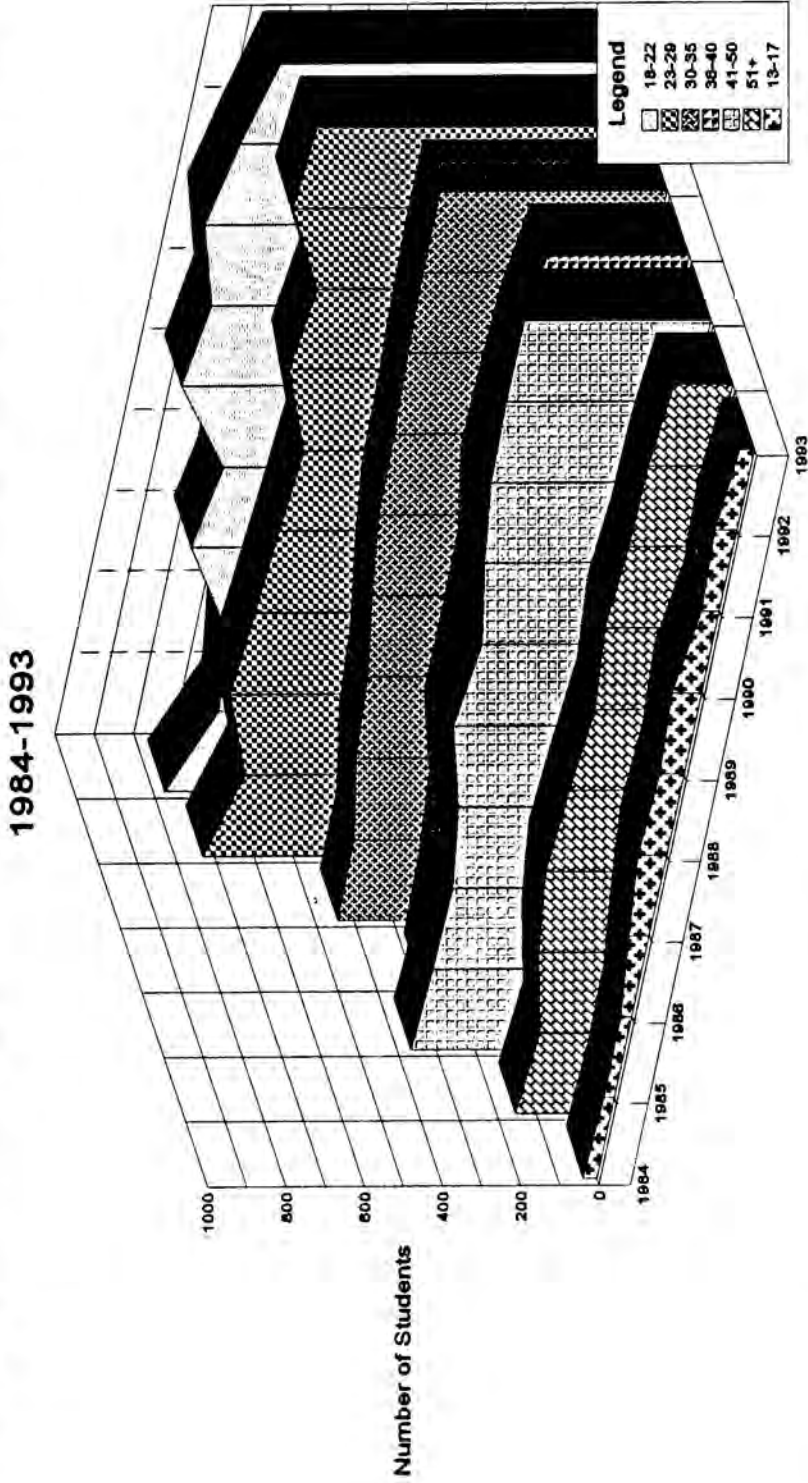


Figure 7. Age ranges of students who take less than 12 hours.

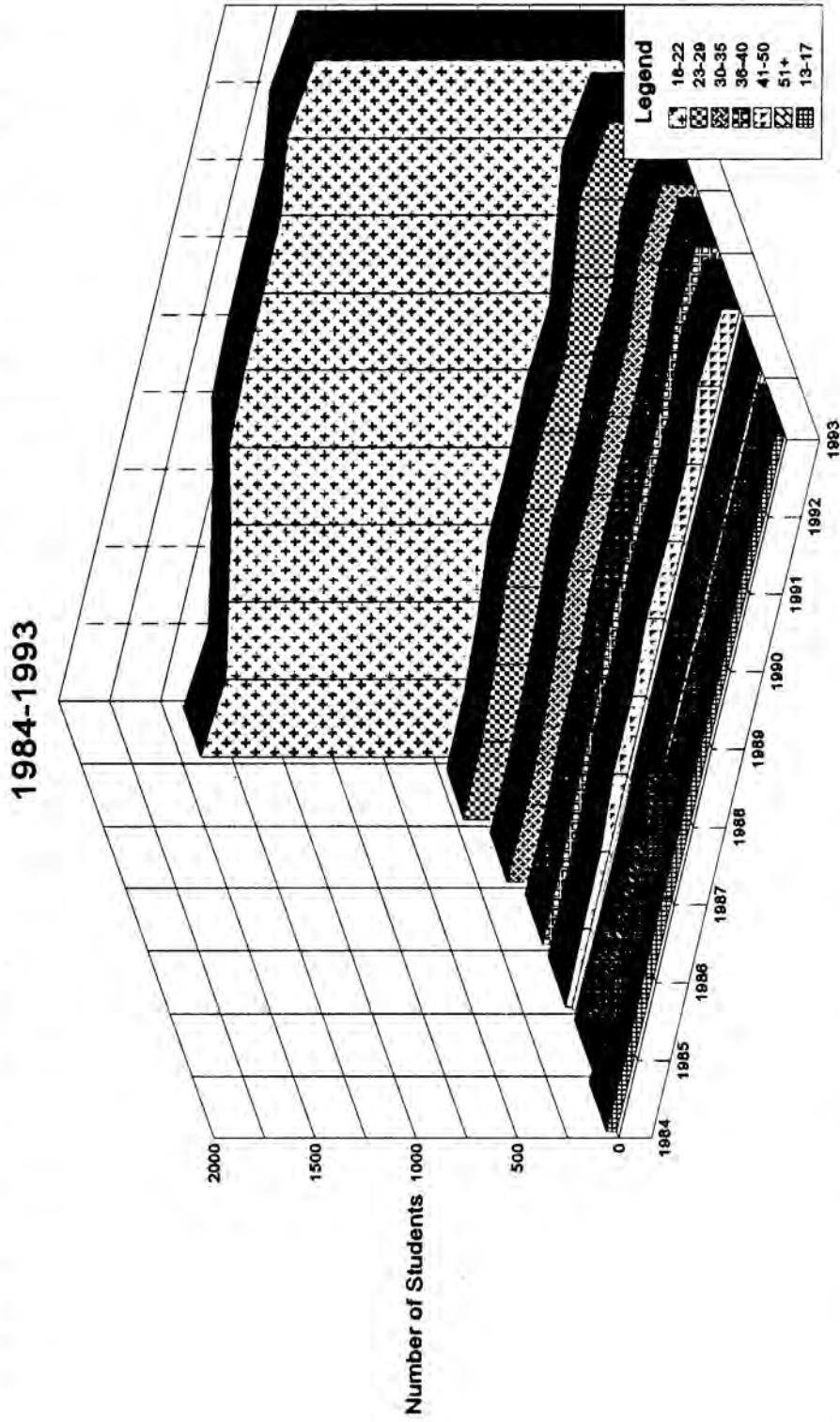


Figure 8. Age ranges of students who take 12 or more hours.

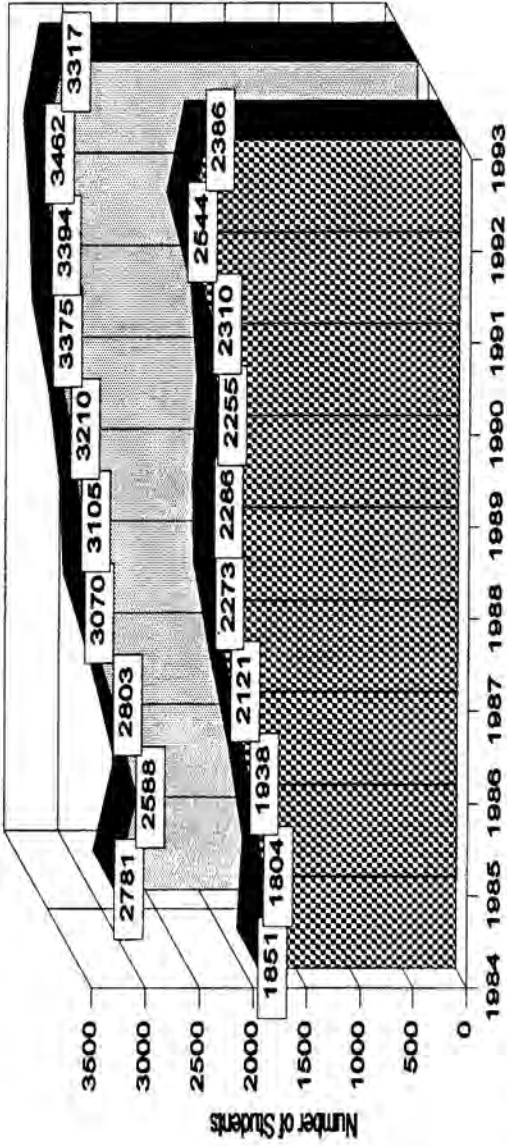


Figure 9. Comparison of total full time and total part time enrollment.

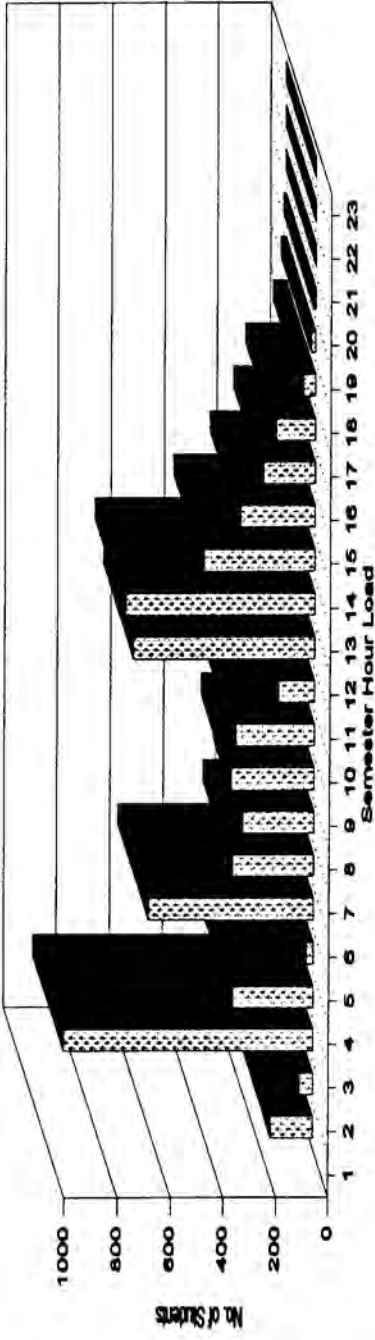


Figure 10. Distribution of students by number of hours taken in 1992.

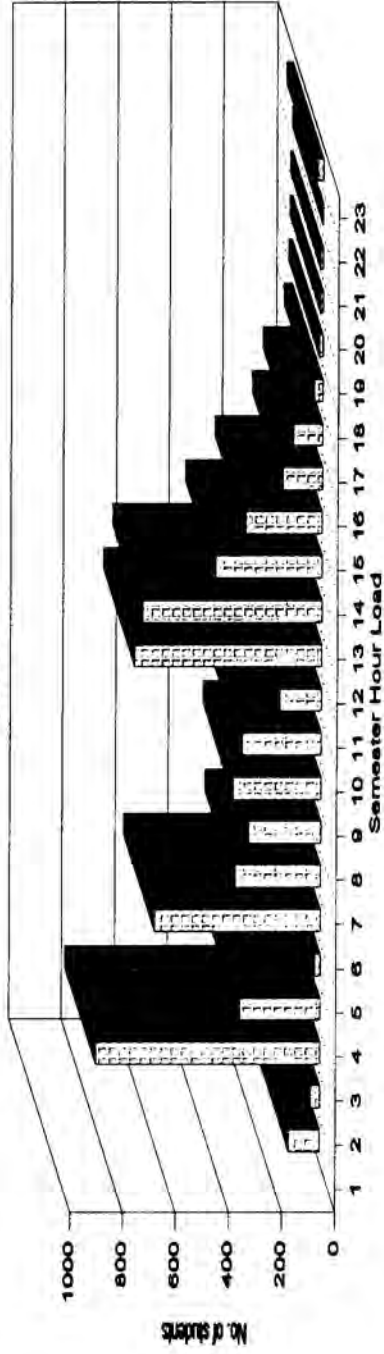


Figure 11. Distribution of students by number of hours taken in 1993.

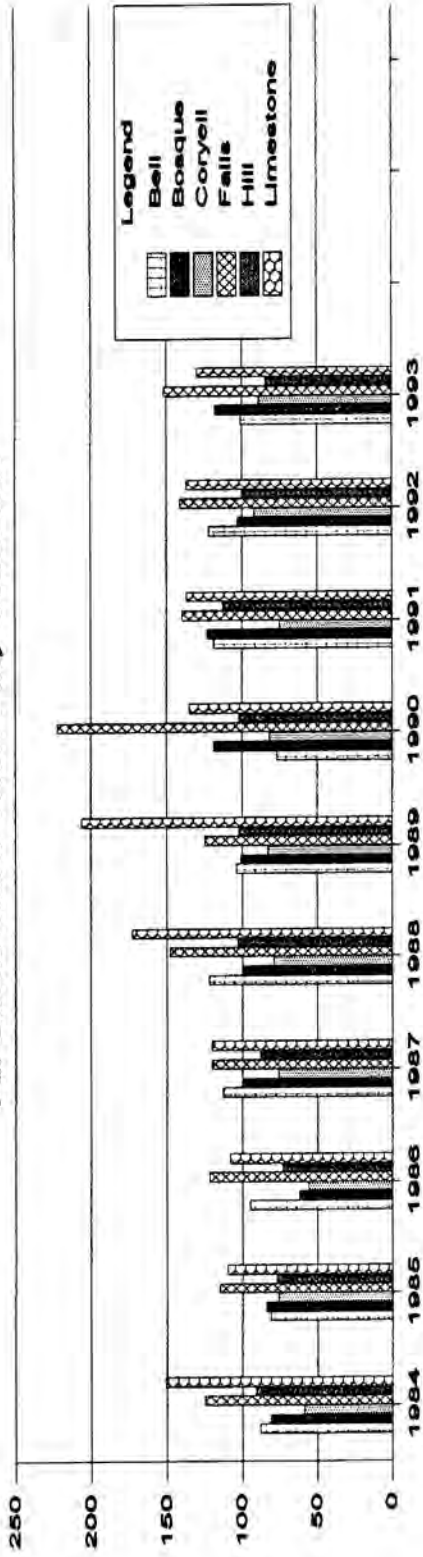
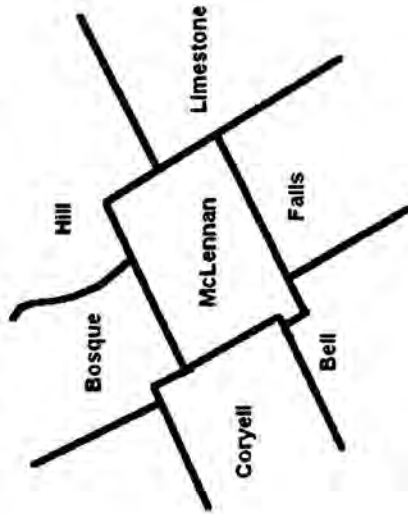


Figure 12. Texas counties outside of McLennan County, listed as home to MCC students.

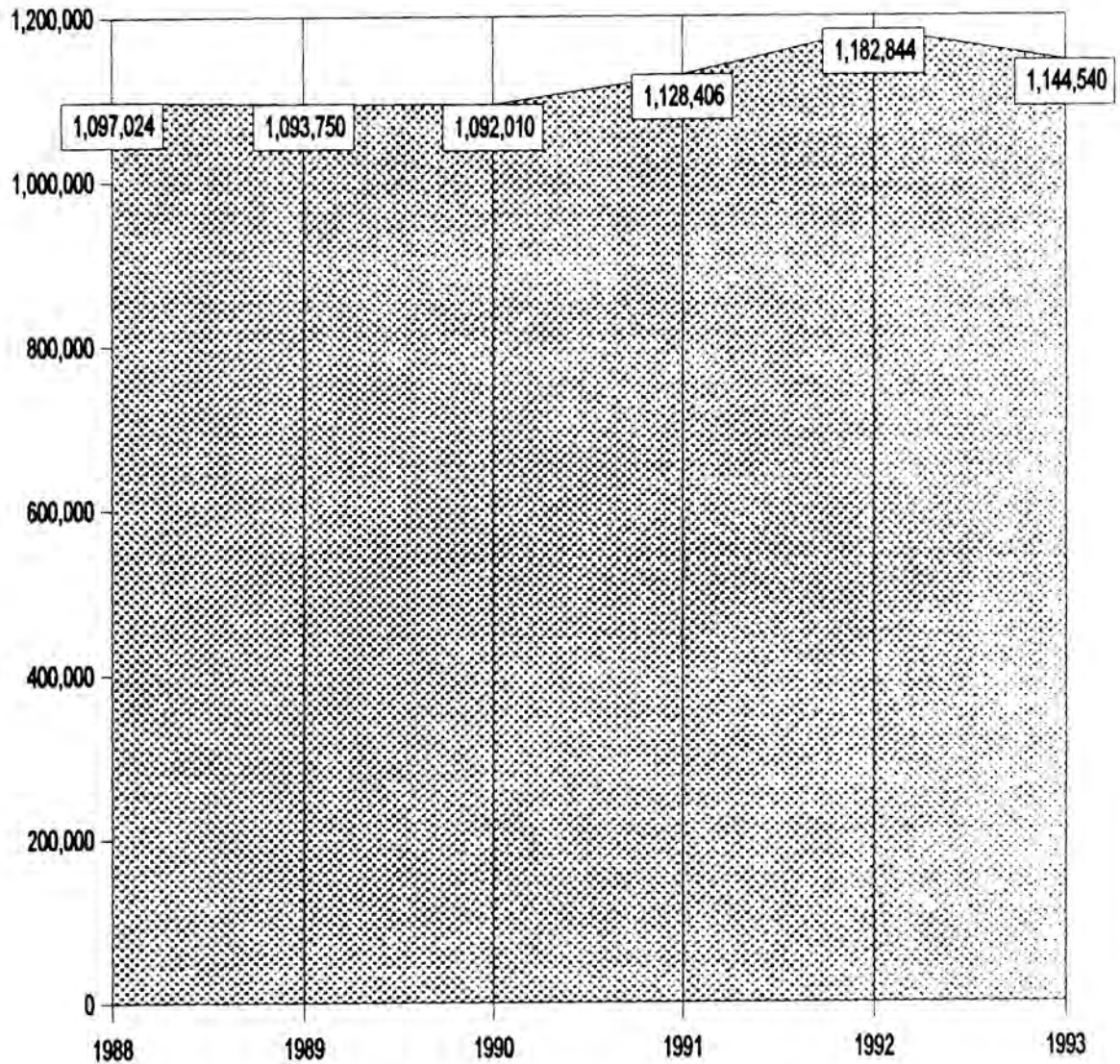
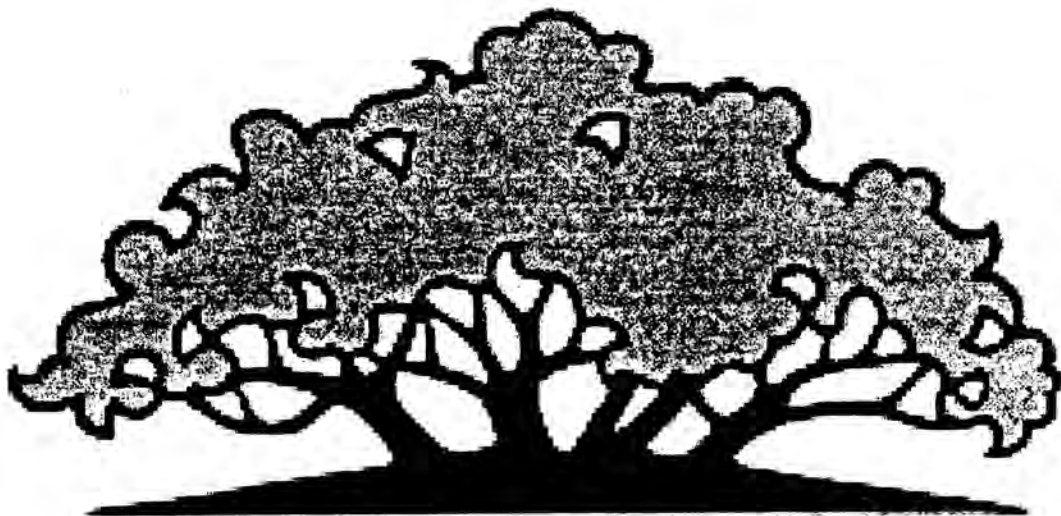


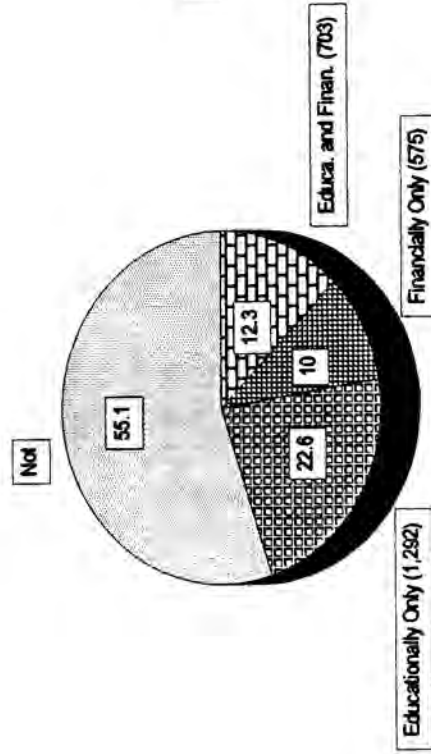
Figure 13. Total contact hours.

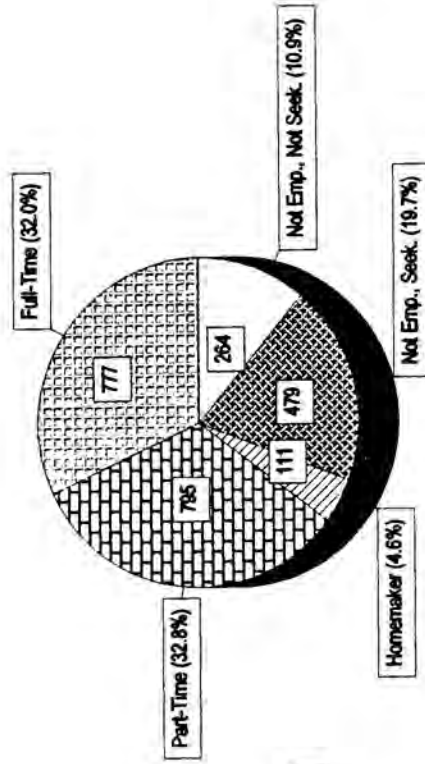
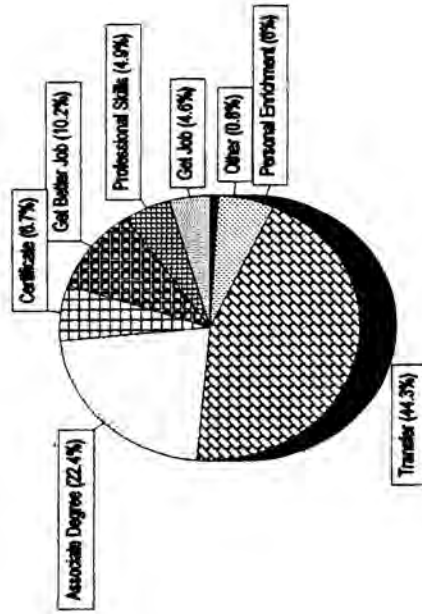


Figure 14. Disadvantaged status of MCC students.

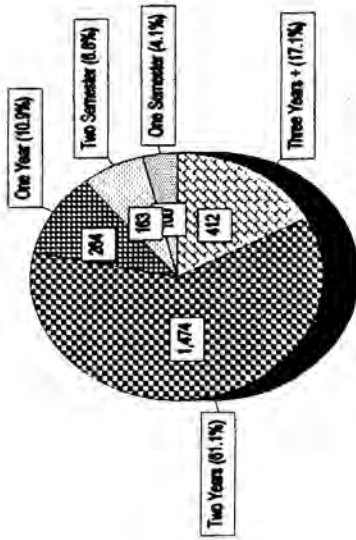

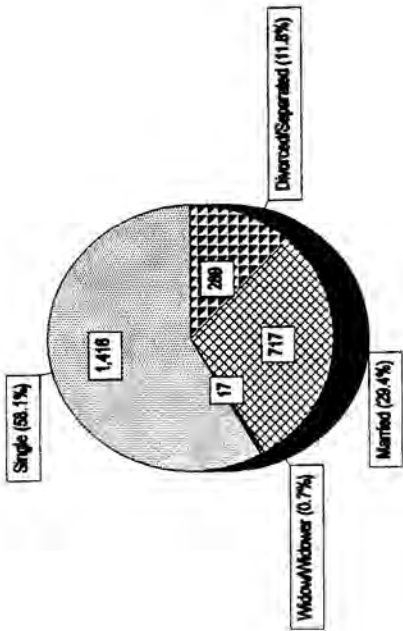


Figure 19. Marital status of students, based on survey of 2,445 students.

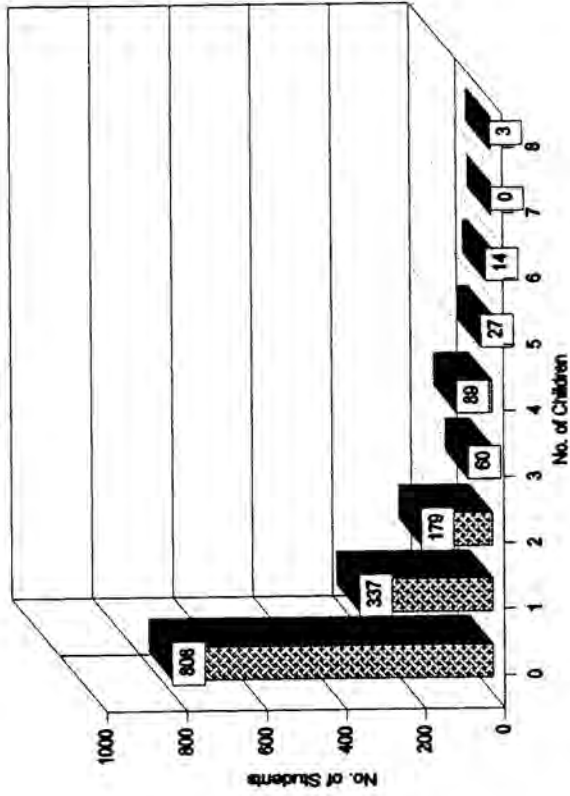
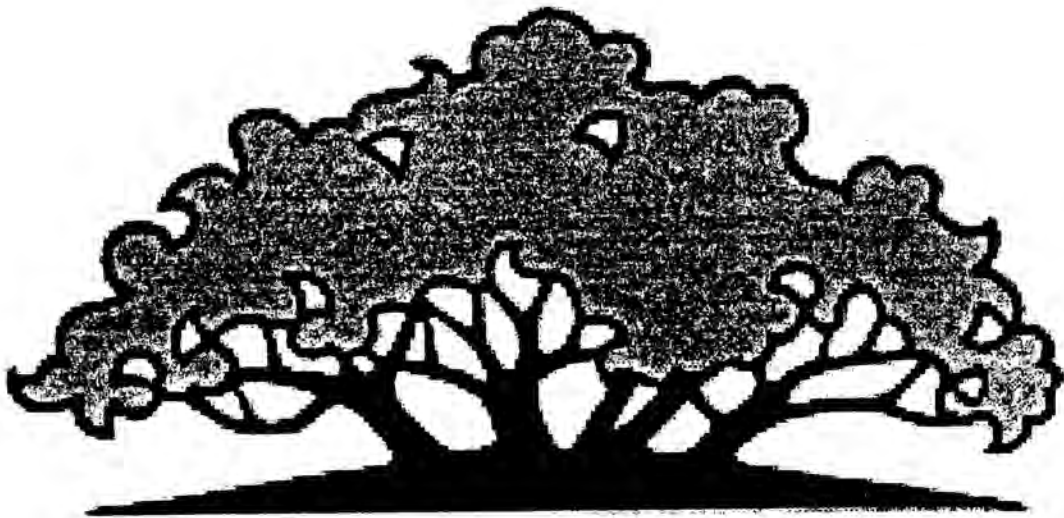


Figure 18. Number of children of students, based on survey of 2,445 students.

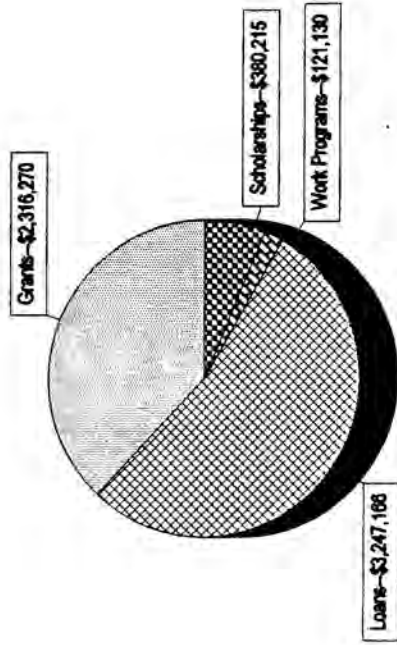


Figure 21. Financial aid classified by type with total dollar amounts awarded.

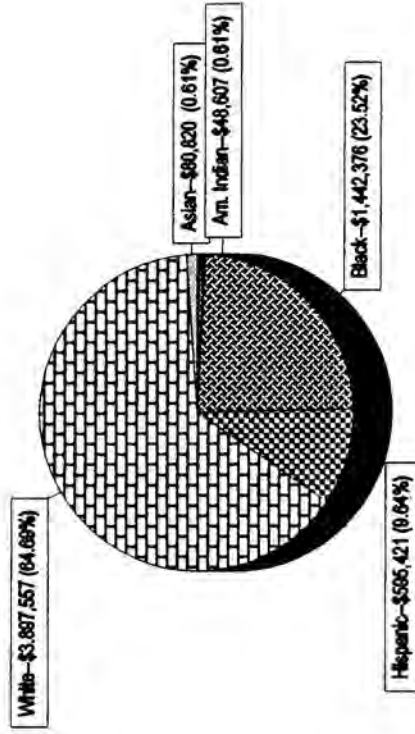


Figure 20. Financial aid awarded by ethnic group with total amount awarded.

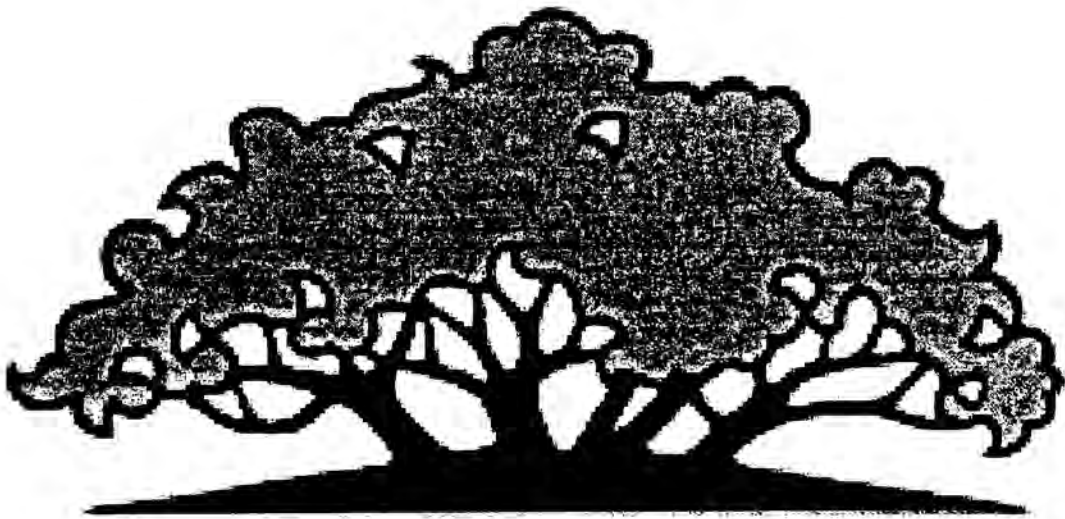

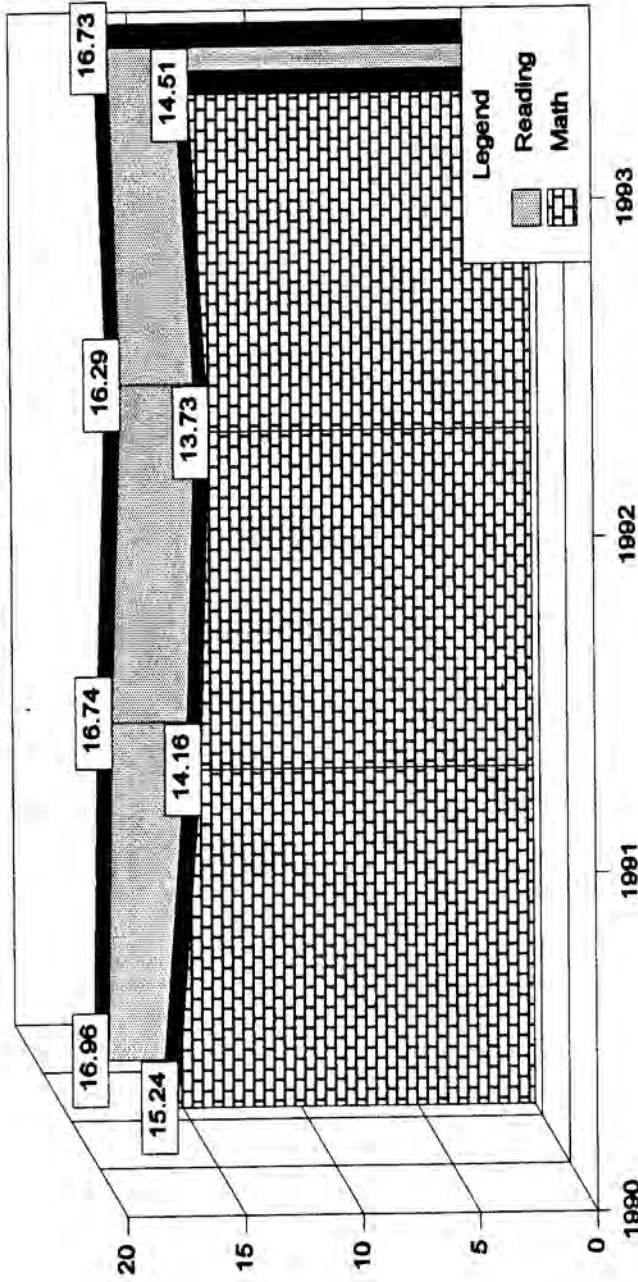


Figure 22. MCC Placement Test scores -- reading and math.

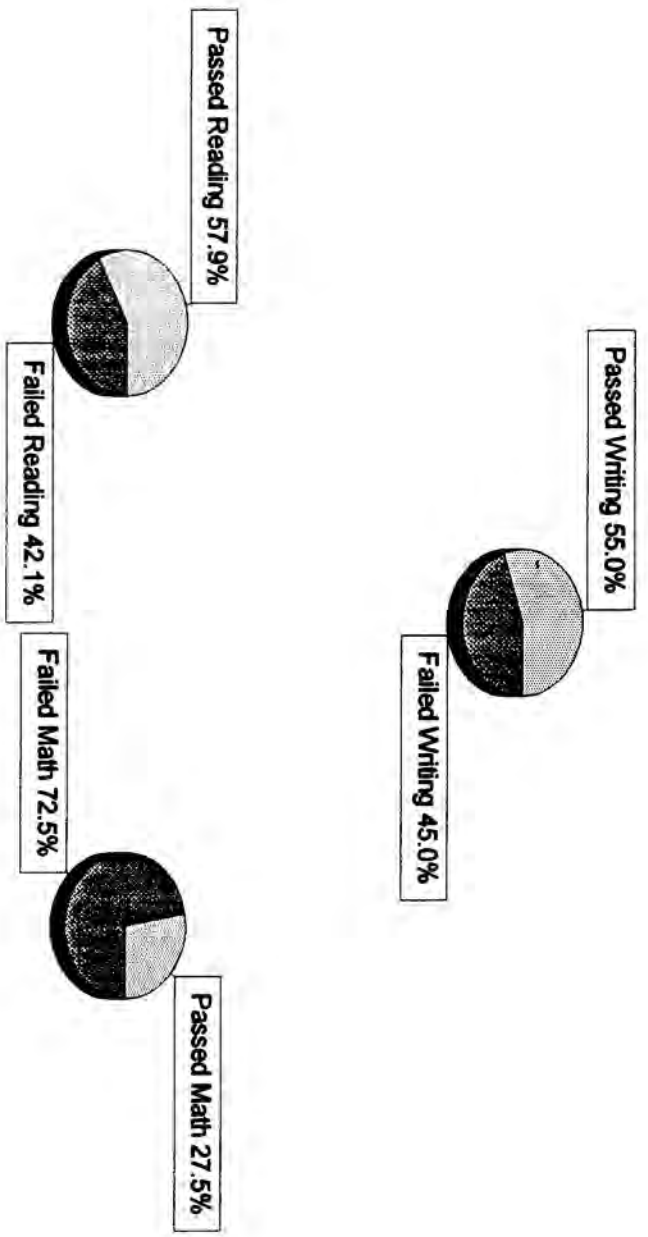


Figure 23. MCC Placement Test -- Pass/fail percentages for writing, reading, and math.

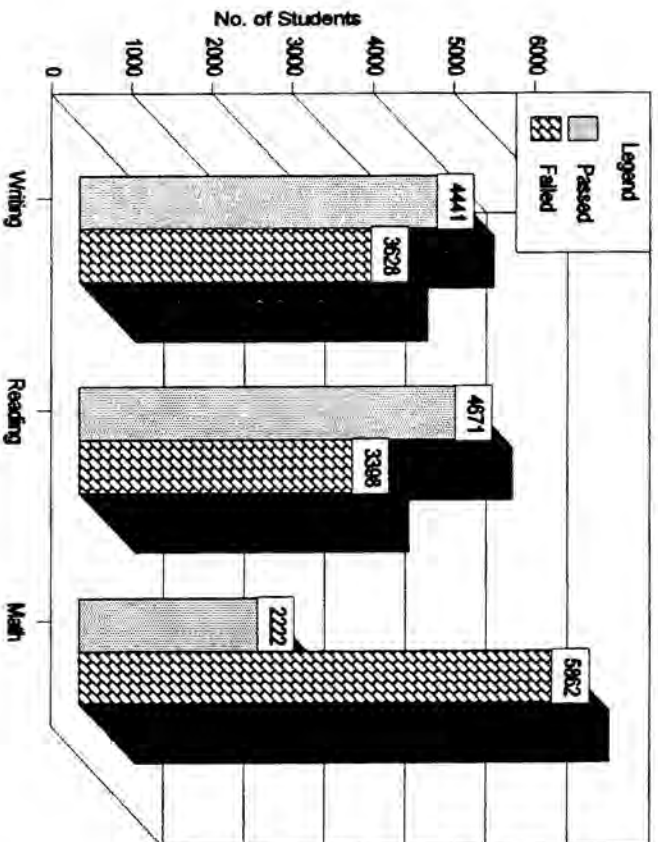


Figure 24. Students passing MCC placement test --1990 to 1993.

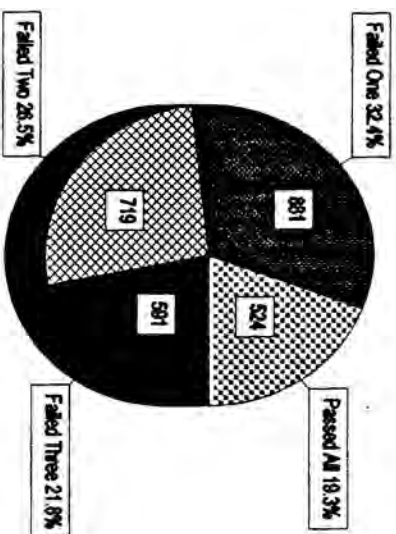
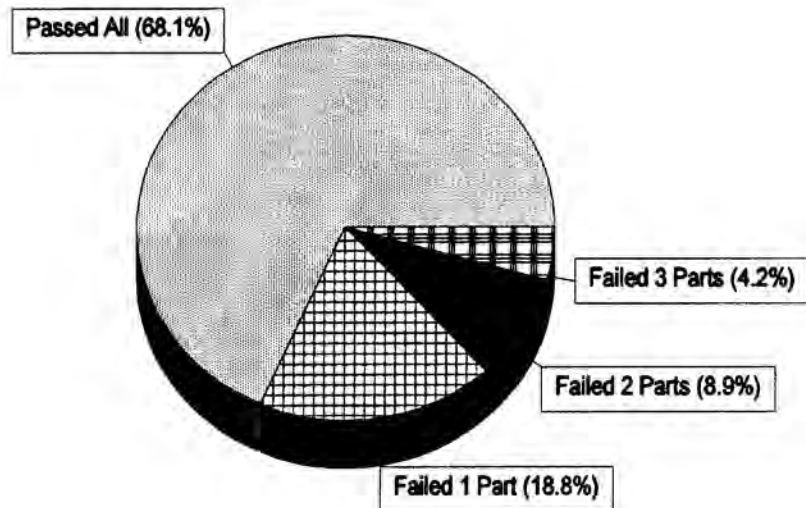


Figure 25. MCC Placement Test Results for fall 1993.

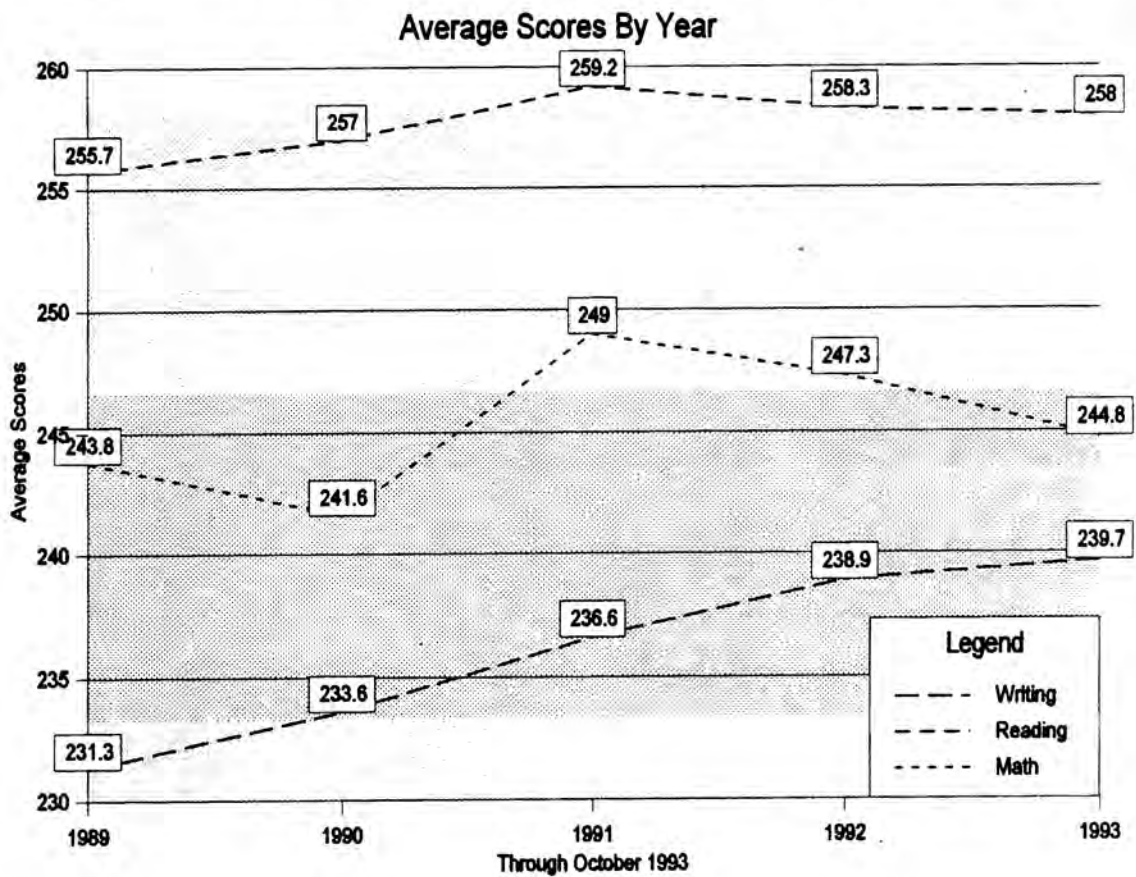


Figure 27. Average TASP scores by year and by subject.

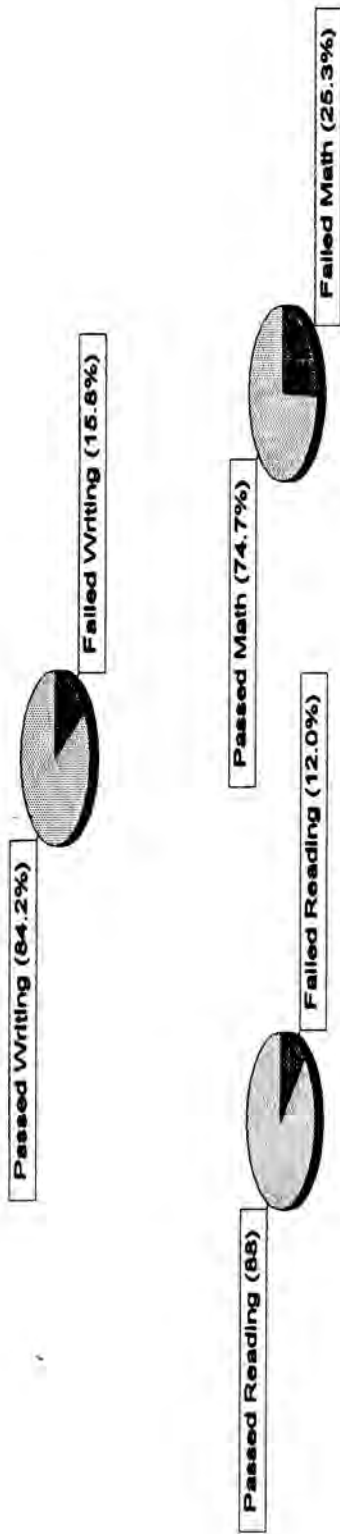
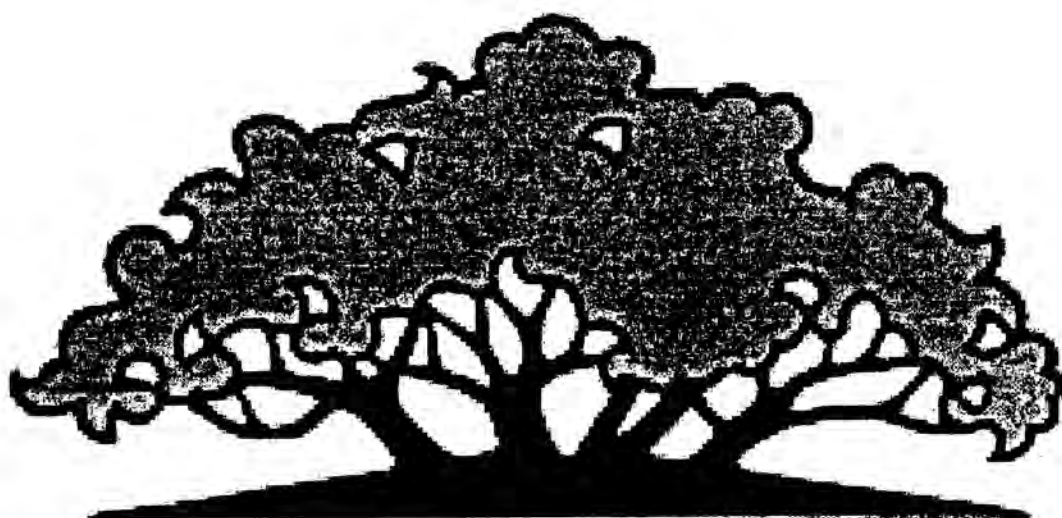


Figure 28. First time performance of MCC students on TASP test by subject.

The graduates in this study include all technical and academic students who were reported on the CBM-009 Graduation Report who graduated during the 1990-1991 academic year. If a student received more than one degree or certificate, that student was counted once. The non-returning students include students who were enrolled during any one of the following semesters: summer I, 1990; summer II, 1990; fall, 1990; or spring, 1991; and did not re-enroll at the same institution during the fall 1991 semester.

Employment was determined by matching former student social security numbers against the Texas Employment Commission's Unemployment Insurance Wage-Record data base, using the most recent data available at the time. The Pursuing Additional Education column was derived by matching former students (graduates and non-returning) against the fall 1991 student enrollment reports for all public institutions of higher education (community and technical colleges, universities, and health institutions). Students were counted once when a match was located, even if a student was found attending more than one institution.
