Miss Money is working at K-Mart Department Store. This past semester she has worked about 30 hours a week and plans to start working 40 hours a week.

"Mike will make a very fine president and equally fine representative of the school. Student Government has worked on many worthwhile projects this semester and will do the same next semester. I know Mike will see all of them completed," said Miss Money.

This semester the Student Government painted the campus fire hydrants, recommended that the parking lot stripes be repainted, helped students to become aware of the cafeteria mess and checked into the reported problem that some Physical Education teachers were keeping students overtime.

Placement Schedules Session

All students interested in how to apply for the work-study program can attend an information session at 10 a.m. today in the Tartan Room on the third floor of the Student Center.

Students who have been approved for the work-study program, but who are not presently employed can attend. A list of jobs, job duties and skills needed during the spring semester will be discussed. Referrals will be made before the fall semester ends so that students may begin working on the first day of the spring semester.

Student employees must be enrolled in at least 12 semester hours if they wish to continue working on campus. Students cannot begin working until they have a current referral slip and have completed all necessary paperwork.

She plans to stay in Waco, work and enroll in night school. Miss Money plans to receive a degree in elementary education and has attended MCC for three semesters.

As president Miss Money's duties were to plan meetings, appoint committees, preside over the meetings and represent MCC in the Texas Junior College Student Government Association.

Student Government Finishes Business

Student Governments at its final meeting of the semester, Monday, accepted the resignation of its president and treasurer.

Carol Kirkland, treasurer, presented the budget and a list of the expenses from this semester. Student Government started the year with a balance of \$3520. Expenses this fall included purchasing trophies and supplies, funds for two mini-concerts, scholarships and dances. The balance now stands at \$2735.77.

James Sheffield, a student in the nursing program, attended the meeting to suggest that student government check into the possibilities of pre-registration. A committee of three freshmen was appointed to research this in the spring.

Carol Degrate and Paula Roerick reported on the Texas Junior College Student Government Association (TJCSGA) meetings that they both attended here Sat. afternoon. The main purpose of these meetings was to plan the activities and the agenda for the TJCSGA State convention to be held in April. The convention will be at the Red Carpet Inn on South Padre Island.

Those who attended the regional meeting at Blinn Junior College in Brenham Friday were President Roxanne Money, Vice-President Mike Kelley, Secretary Carol Degrate and Representatives Cindy Burt, Paula Roerick and Carol Mitchell. MCC was elected to serve as host school for the regional meeting in the spring. The Monday meeting was

Elections will be held early in the spring semester to fill two of the vacancies. The vice-president will assume the presidency.

Trustees Table Proposal

The Board of Trustees tabled a motion Nov. 30 to approve incorporation of an MCC Foundation that would administer and receive contributions to MCC.

Dr. Wilbur Ball, president, said the foundation would serve as a focal point for businesses, individuals and other donors giving scholarships and other contributions to MCC.

Board members disagreed on the control of the foundation and the amount of influence the board would have over the foundation's board of directors.

Proposed articles for the foundation provide for the initial foundation board of directors appointing their successors. Some board members suggested that the foundation's board be appointed by the college's Board of Trustees.

"People and organizations are more likely to donate funds and property to a foundation with a specific board which not only is in charge of collecting but of distributing the funds," Ball said.

Ball said he hopes the foundation will encourage prospective donors because of the board's interest in control of the funds.

In other business the board voted to purchase several pieces of equipment and furniture.

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Center Displays "Aunt Clara's World"

An exhibition of 18 paintings by Mrs. Clara McDonald Williamson, Bosque County native, are on display now through Jan. 2 at the Art Center.

In 1943, when Mrs. Williamson, at the age of 68, began sketching scenes from her childhood in Bosque County, her original intention was to fill the loneliness that followed the death of her husband. Freed from the burden of a daily routine as housewife and shopkeeper, Mrs. Williamson found that she finally had the leisure to communicate the beauty she found in the world about her. In a little more than two decades after she began her first experiments with form and color, the widow was one of the best known painters living and working in Texas during the 1960's.

"Aunt Clara," as she is popularly known, was born in 1875 in the little frontier town of Iredell, located in a lovely valley on the north side of the Bosque River. For 45 years, until she and her family moved to Dallas in 1920, she observed this small rural community with a keenly observant eye. With the freshness and innocence of a child's vision, Mrs. Williamson at the age of 70 began to record the history of this village and her own

exciting personal experiences. "That was my world," Aunt Clara said, "all I had to remember and put on canvas; and I think a painter ought to paint what he knows."

In the "memory" paintings currently shown at The Art Center, the viewer finds a detailed narrative of the world that the young Clara McDonald knew.

In "Chicken for Dinner," the

first and perhaps most famous of her paintings, she presents a panorama of her world as seen from the family cottage on a hill above the Bosque River. Through the fields and pastures that surround the village of Iredell, Mrs. Clara Williamson and her brothers and sisters chase a chicken for their mother to fry. The distant Davis Mountains provide a backdrop for the idyllic scene.

Mrs. Williamson records with equal clarity the mundane daily life in Iredell and periodic excitement of special events. Because Iredell was a stopover on the Old Chisholm Trail, the cattle drivers and cowboys are vividly recalled in such paintings as "Get Along Little Doggie" and "Breaking the Broncs".

Although Mrs. Williamson attended some art classes at

Southern Methodist University and the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts, her approach to painting is largely uninitiated and remained uninitiated.

Mrs. Williams died last year at the age of 101. In an interview shortly before her death, she made this assessment of her paintings: "They don't look modern, but they're honest and true."

The MCC Highlassies, still smarting after consecutive losses to Texas University and Temple, soundly defeated Texas Christian University 96-68 Saturday afternoon in Highlander Gym. MCC upped its record to 5-3 while the Lady Frogs fell to 0-2 for the year.

Both teams played sluggishly in the game's opening minutes, but eventually MCC used its height advantage to break to a 27-19 lead with 11:05 left in the first half.

Post Jackie Swaim contributed 14 points, many coming from rebounds, to bring the 'Lassies to their early lead. The 6' freshman finished with 24 points for the contest.

Swaim, Kathy Jarvis and Geye Loewe were forced to leave the action midway through the first half due to foul problems. The game probably would have been more of a rout if it were not for MCC's fouls. TCU found the MCC defense tough as the visitors scored only seven first-half field goals. But the Frogs made good 15 of 23 free throw attempts in the game's opening 20 minutes to keep the contest close.

Substitutes Claire Morris and Ellen Lindemann each

contributed 11 points to the 'Lassie cause, exhibiting the depth Coach Pam Davis is searching for.

The second half was just a question of how many points the Highlassies would tally. Davis substituted freely in the final 10 minutes.

Cagers Collect Victories Over Navarro, Lon Morris

The Highlanders came away with two more victories under their belts after the annual MCC Classic. The tourney was held in the MCC gym Friday and Saturday and involved teams from Hill, Navarro and Lon Morris junior colleges.

In first round action Friday night, the Highlanders rolled over Navarro 107-87. MCC started the game cold and quickly fell behind Navarro 12-7. However, right before the half, the Highlander's press began to wear down Navarro, and MCC scored 10 consecutive points. The barrage of points was culminated by Sam Worthen's slam dunk at the buzzer, making the halftime score 53-42 in MCC's favor.

The two teams played evenly throughout most of the second half with Navarro never getting within 7 points. The high-octane Highlander offense made sure of that and the MCC defense played one of its finest games of the year until the latter part of the game.

MCC started slow again as they fell behind 10-4 early in the contest. But the Highlander's defense and rebounding power began to short-circuit the Lon Morris offense and MCC stormed to an easy 50-37 lead at the halfway point.

The second half was almost a carbon copy of the first as MCC's rugged press and steady play kept the margin between the teams at 10 points. Coach Johnny Carter let his reserves finish up the last three minutes of the game, and Lon Morris cut the lead to the final difference.

The Highlanders were led again by Johnson, the sophomore from Brooklyn, who canored 33 points in giving his usual fine offensive show. Glenn Minnex, MCC's demon under the boards, produced 18 points and blocked several shots in one of his better performances of the season.

The only other Highlander in double figures was point guard Sam Worthen who chipped in 17 while playing a fine floor game and directing MCC's high flying offense.

The preliminary game was won by Hill as they squeaked by Navarro in a barnburner 94-91.
