## Jr. ball club begins drive

A clinic hosted by basketball players and coaches will kick off this year's membership drive for the Jr. Basketball Club, Saturday at 10 a.m. in The Highlands.

The club is open to boys and girls in grades three through seven. Membership is \$3.

Members receive an official MCC Jr. Basketball Club t-shirt and can participate in the clinic and special contests at several basketball games. Members will be admitted free to all home games when they wear the t-shirt and are accompanied by a paid adult or MCC student.

"At the clinic we will break down several basketball skills, and do some individual teaching," said basketball Coach Johnny Carter. "Both boys' and girls' basketball teams will be there. We'll be teaching

fundamentals such as dribbling, passing, jump shots, rebounding, lay-up shots and some defense techniques. There will be prizes for those who do real well."

Carter said several special contests are planned at halftime and between games. "We are planning a freethrow contest, dribble races, a 30-second shooting contest, a dribbling through chairs contest, lay-up drills and other contests."

Coach Carter said, "This is an absolute must for every young basketball fan. The cost of the shirt alone is about \$5. When you add a season pass plus the clinic, this becomes the best sports bargain ever."

Membership last year was 175. Memberships are good for one year.

## Roof leaks to be fixed

A solution may be in the offing for leaks in the health careers building roof, according to Charles Burney, director of administrative services.

"We have contacted William Johnson, a consulting engineer, who is preparing an estimate," said Burney. Johnson has not returned the estimate.

Two areas needing repair, according to Burney, are the flashings on parapet walls and cracks in the tar on the roof.

Flashings are metal strips caulked to the edge of the parapet wall and to the roof. Burney said the flashings have pulled loose from the wall and water leaks into the building.

Built in 1974, the building has leaked on and off for some time, said Burney, and maintenance men have made temporary repairs.

"Our people don't have the equipment or time for this repair," said Burney.

## Faculty, staff discuss foreign student needs

Needs of foreign students were discussed by several faculty and staff members in an informal meeting last Friday.

"We want to make foreign students feel comfortable in social as well as academic life here," said Bill Mygdal, head counselor.

The 17 students come from Nigeria, Iran, Chile and Thailand according to Mygdal.

"We are concerned about the students feeling at home," Mygdal said. "We will try to help them adjust to the different way of life."

To give students an "at home" feeling, several staff members have asked six foreigners to spend Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners in their homes.

Mygdal, who, after spending 21 months in West Africa with the Peace Corps, knows the difficulties of living in a foreign country, said the visits would give foreign students a chance to "know us and understand our holidays better."

Anyone else who wishes to have a foreign student in their home over the holidays should call Judy West (Counseling Office) ext. 386.

An advisory committee is also being formed to develop programs for the students, Mygdal said.

The committee welcomes input from faculty, students and people in the community.

Developing an orientation program that applies to foreign students was also discussed.

Faculty and staff involved in the meeting were: Darlene Allen, assistant registrar; B.J. Carillo, coordinator of the Right to Read program; Phyllis Denton,

counselor of Special Services tutorial center; Kay Kocian, also of Special Services; Carolyn Rodabough, director of health services; Omega Rodriguez, director of Special Services, Dr. Ron Smith, dean of instruction; and Mygdal.

Also concerned with needs of foreign students is the students services council.

During its meeting Tuesday, the council discussed nontraditional student needs.

The term, nontraditional, refers to foreign and older students.

Debbie Olsen, member of the council, said the group was investigating the idea of a foreign student club.

In other business, the council examined the possibility of categorizing traffic violations into minor, major and flagrant offenses.

'Landers, 'Lassies bounce Henderson

## Roundballers win third straight

With 32 seconds remaining on the clock and MCC ahead 97-95, Roy Watson stole the ball from Henderson County and then sank two free throws after being fouled to ice the game that the 'Landers eventually won 101-97.

After Watson's heroics, the Cardinals cut the score to 99-97 with two seconds remaining. The Cardinals then fouled Danny Harris on the inbounds pass and he proceeded to sink two free throws to give MCC the game and raise their record to 3-0.

It was the first time the Highlanders ever defeated the Cardinals on their own floor.

The game was neck and neck for about the first 15 minutes, but the Cardinals began to pull away and built a lead of ten points with a minute remaining on the clock before half. The 'Landers got two quick buckets to pull within six points. With 30 seconds left MCC seemed to have the Cards on the ropes, but two mistakes gave them two buckets and Henderson led 59-49 at half.

With six minutes gone in the second half, MCC trailed 75-63. Point guard "Goldie" Suber led the team to a comeback. Suber scored 16 points the second half, most of them long range jumpshots. Charles "Bean" Burley helped as he pumped in eight points, with four of the points coming at key times. Anthony "Doc" Lee added seven in the second half to help Suber and Burley.

Suber finished the game with 30 points, six steals and six assists. He played his best game as a Highlander.

Watson also played well as he poured in 10 points, grabbed seven rebounds, stole the ball four times and dished out four assists. Freshman Lee pumped in 17 points and 10 rebounds.

### Grid action nears peak

Six teams in both the men's and women's division are still alive as this year's flag football tournament swings toward its final weeks.

But barring bad weather, five of those hopefuls will be gone as the elimination process weeds out the also-rans from the contenders for the championship.

In men's play, the Wild Bunch fights for survival against OFSA and the Wild and Crazy Guys battle to remain against the Rip-offs on Friday. The two winners will meet on Monday as will the Saints and the Grunko Studs, the two undefeated teams.

The Rip-offs remained alive this week with two big wins, a 47-0 excommunication of the Vatican Crew and a 12-0 defeat of the Outlaws. Craig McMurtry scored both touchdowns in the second contest. Meanwhile, the Wild Bunch kept its hopes afloat with a forfeit win over the Ricky

Burley had 12 points and collected nine rebounds, while Charles "Big Time" Jones added nine points and nine rebounds.

"The key to the game was that we never gave up. We were down by twelve and kept applying pressure," said Coach Johnny Carter after the game. "You thrive on winning close games and the one who wins close ones usually is the productive team. In this past week I have seen remarkable improvement and we have minimized our mistakes to a large degree."

"To me there is nothing sweeter than a come from behind victory. This shows what our players are made of," said Carter.

Last weekend MCC took two victories in the Hill Classic. The team downed South Plains 97-96 and beat arch-rival Hill 83-80.

For Coach Carter's bunch it is a great start, considering all three wins have come on the road. MCC plays two more games on the road before opening home with Temple next week. The team faces Lon Morris Friday night at 6 and Navarro, Saturday at 8 p.m.

### 'Lassies breeze

The Highlassies downed the HendersonChicks Tuesday 82-43 to remain unbeaten, 3-0.

The 'Lassies never had any trouble as they moved to a 18-5 lead with eight minutes gone. They went on to build a halftime lead at 55-21.

"It is always nice to win on the road," said 'Lassie Coach Pam Davis. "We had a cold spot on offense but played good defense."

MCC shot 45 percent from the floor to grab a team total of 49 rebounds and steal the ball 49 times.

The 'Lassies were led by freshman sensation Gaye Pack's 17 points. Sophomore Kathy Westerfield added 15, freshman Jackie Valentine added 12 and sophomore Deb Davis added 10.

Others to score were Pam Green with eight, Loretta Lister

with six, DeAnna Kroll with six, Terri Warren with five, Linda Linam with two and Phillis Oliver with one.

Valentine led the Highlassies with 12 rebounds, while Davis had seven. Valentine also led in steals with seven. Lister and

Westerfield each had six. The 'Lassies beat South Plains and Howard County earlier in the MCC Classic.

The 'Lassies' next outing will be tonight at 6 when they host two-time national champion Panola.

## Softball entries being sought
