



High School Journalists Hit MCC

More than 150 high school journalism students will hear 2004 Pulitzer-prize winning photographer David Leeson Oct. 19 at the J-3 summit, MCC's annual combined contest and UIL instructional session.

Leeson won the Pulitzer for his photos of the Iraq War, and has covered diverse subjects

ranging from civil unrest in El Salvador to apartheid in South Africa. Leeson has covered the homeless in Dallas and flood victims in Southeast Texas. His work includes an essay on death row in the United States, and he has covered the Angolan Civil War.

Competition at the Summit will be divided among five separate events.

News writers and photographers will cover a simulated news event, like last year's "fatal" automobile

crash, then write stories and select photos for publication.

Feature writers will interview Pulitzer-winning photojournalist David Leeson of the Dallas Morning News. Students will write their stories after a question and answer session.

Editorial competitors will receive topics from Larry Hauk, publisher of the *Copperas Cove Leader-Press*. They will conduct their own research and then write an editorial.

All contests will simulate dead-

line conditions and have been set up to present students with the kind of problems reporters might encounter on the job.

Advertising challenges the students to design an entire campaign around a real business request as presented by Dean Riley, of Fletcher Communications, one of Central Texas' leading advertising agencies.

Sports writers will interview veteran *Houston Chronicle* columnist and MCC alumnus John

McClain. There will be a question and answer period, and then they will write a story about the writer.

Students who are entering their first writing competition are eligible for the Brites competition, competing to see who creates the wittiest and most interesting "filler" paragraph.

Winners will be awarded scholarships, as well as individual medals and certificates. The school with the most winners will receive See J-3, Page 3



LaStrada: Not Your Average Play

18th Century Classic Gets a Facelift

Food fights, chase scenes, mimes, and a voluptuous puppet named Smeraldina spiced up the stage at the Ball Performing Arts Center on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week.

'La Strada' was the MCC theatre department's first production of the semester.

The performance is based on an 18th century play, *The Servant of Two Masters*, by Carlo Goldini and was adapted by two of MCC's own, Jerry MacLauchlin and Dr. Cindy Sorelle.

The play included dancing, acrobatics, slapstick, and colorful costumes.

"Sometimes, you push the envelope to see if you can make things work without doing the same old play," MacLauchlin said.

The comedic play was a new experience for some theatre students.

"The biggest learning experience about it was trying to play a character that's so over the top and melodramatic," Jacob Critz (Florindo) said.

The students didn't stop at acting. Oliver Lukach purchased a puppet-making book and built his character Smeraldina from scratch.

"This was my first time as a puppeteer. The biggest challenge was conveying all my emotion through the puppet," Lukach said.

In one scene, almost the entire cast showed off their tap-dancing skills.

"What I learned most from this show is my tap. That's what I'm the most proud of," Bobby Sands (Lombardi) said.

The play stretched the actors and actresses in different ways.

"In this show I have to cross-dress, so playing a man playing a woman was difficult," Colette Currie (Beatrice) said.

The audiences responded to the performance with laughter and warm applause, but the cast also enjoyed the experience.

"Just being in Jerry's show was challenging and exciting. He pulls so much out of you that you don't even know that you have," Mark Capalbo (Brighella) said.

"I think you have to create some theatre with your audience in mind. If you create a museum piece, they're just going to be bored," MacLauchlin said.

Upcoming plays include a modern spin on Bram Stoker's 'Dracula' this fall and 'You're A Good Man Charlie Brown' next semester.

MCC students, faculty and staff receive free admission to all plays.

Non-MCC students and senior citizen tickets are \$8, and adult tickets are \$10. There are also group rates and season tickets available.

Patrons to upcoming plays may benefit from one piece of advice: dress warm and bring a jacket.

"I thoroughly enjoyed the play, but it was freezing in there," said Adam Chop, an MCC student who attended the play.

MCC Sets New Attendance Policy

Changes in MCC's attendance policy for 2004-2005 are centered around the number of classes students can miss before being dropped.

"The biggest and most important change in policy was the 25 percent ratio," said Jim McKeown, English instructor and attendance committee chairman.

Students who are absent from 25 percent of their class sessions will be dropped.

The new policy excuses absences due to illness and school functions or activities for make-up purposes only. These absences still count toward attendance.

Last year the policy did not include college-related excused absences, while the drop ratio was only 20 percent of total class hours.

The committee's purpose was to give incentives to students with excused absences because of school activities and who also miss days without excuses, McKeown said.

Another change, however, was the fact that the professors now have more prerogatives on whether to reinstate those dropped McKeown said.

Some students who miss more than the 25 percent may have sound excuses such as pregnancy or severe illness, he said. Instructors can now handle those on a case-to-case basis.

When students communicate with instructors and show proof of an

excuse, such as a doctor's note, the instructor has the right to either reinstate or withdraw the student with a passing grade, regardless of whether the student is passing or failing even if the 25 percent rate is reached after the official drop date.

"The purpose of an excused absence is to make sure there is an opportunity for missed assignments to be made up," Buddy Powell, Dean of Arts and Sciences, said.

Some students said they agree with the attendance policy.

"I think it creates a fairness between those who are involved in school functions or organizations, and those who do not have time to be active," said sophomore Feven Kifle, adding "it makes the students

who are always going places for the school to go to class when they are actually here."

Other students said they disagree.

"It doesn't help those who are always going places for school functions, because if they use many of those days for activities there are not many sick days for them to use if they are actually sick," said Lisa McNabb.

Programs such as the Cosmetology and some Health Sciences like the Nursing programs, have their own attendance policies to adhere to and are not bound by this new policy due to clinical requirements.

Health Fair Informs, Serves Community

Richland Mall hosted its 10th Annual Senior Source Health and Information Fair. Regent Healthcare, Hillcrest, Texas Medical Foundation on Sept. 24.

Retired Senior Volunteer Program and several other non-profit organizations sponsored the event. JC Penny's forum was filled with an audience learning the details and benefits of private home healthcare.

Numerous booths were set up, primarily serving people aged 35 to 97. The fair lasted from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Hillcrest's Lifeline was one of the featured programs. Lifeline is a 24-hour, 365 day program designed to place medical aid just a button-press away. The program's members buy a special telephone for their home, installed by a

technician. Pressing the red button connects the line to a service center. The

call is handled almost immediately. In case of life or death circumstances, the

fire, police or ambulance stations are notified. The phone's voice recorder can also serve as a medication reminder.

The Texas Medical Foundation provided contact information for anyone with questions about Medicare. They also told people the functions and benefits of Medicare. Medicare recipients' rights were also a topic.

The TMF is a private nonprofit organization of doctors who serve as the Medicare Quality Improvement Organization. It works with health care providers, doctors and hospitals to improve the quality of Texas' medical care system.

"This fair was very helpful and filled with variety. Not only were we provided with sufficient information, but we received free health screenings, bone deterioration tests, and sugar blood level tests," local citizen Mildred Sue Roberts commented.

Three Faculty Receive NISOD Awards

Three faculty members received Teaching Excellence awards at the National Institute for Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD) annual conference in May of 2004.

The recipients include Robert Page, Director of Commercial Music; Beverly Walker, Office Technologies; and Linda Dulin, Speech Communication.

The teachers were nominated by MCC faculty and students.

Nominees then answered specific essay questions about teaching and filled out a form, Page said.

NISOD has been giving out awards annually since 1989 to some 600 community colleges and 200 small rural colleges around the world, according to the official website.

"Winners were announced at a faculty meeting this past spring and then presented with their official medallions at the three-day conference," Page said.

At the conference there were plenty of activities for the

teachers including lectures, workshops and a variety of booths and clinics to visit during break-out sessions, Page said.

"The award ceremony was just the last part of it," Page said.

Page has been teaching music at MCC for 25 years, but before that, he played the saxophone professionally in Australia and also taught at the University of Colorado, he said.

"I was surprised," Page said, when he found out he had been nominated for the award, but he

was "very glad."

Beverly Walker has been teaching at MCC for 30 years.

"I don't know what some students would do if MCC weren't here," Walker said.

She also said she is very proud to be a part of a college like MCC that gives everyone a chance to advance his or her education.

"It's nice to be recognized with the rest of my colleagues who also got the award," Walker said.

Walker said she loves her students and really enjoys teaching them how to be good employees in the future.

the Sweepstakes Trophy. Teachers accompanying their students will have the opportunity to earn state-mandated professional development credit by attending lectures and break-out sessions while their students.

During the afternoon students will attend lectures and workshops from Texas' most winning high school journalism teachers.

Dallas Morning News photographer David Leeson won the 2004 Pulitzer Prize for his photos of the Iraq war. No stranger to conflict throughout the world, he has covered war, violence and unrest in Nicaragua, El Salvador, Panama, Peru and Colombia.

In 1985 he was a Pulitzer finalist for his photo coverage of apartheid

in South Africa.

In 1986 he lived on the streets of Dallas with the homeless for two months and won a Robert F. Kennedy Journalism Award for Outstanding Coverage of the Problems of the Disadvantaged.

In 1991, Leeson covered the first Gulf War, then won a second Robert F. Kennedy Award for his image of the civil war in Angola. A Leeson photograph of a family evacuating floodwaters in southeast Texas again made him a finalist for the Pulitzer.

He worked on an essay about death row in the United States and completed stories about China, Bosnia, the 1999 earthquake in Turkey and civil war in Sudan.

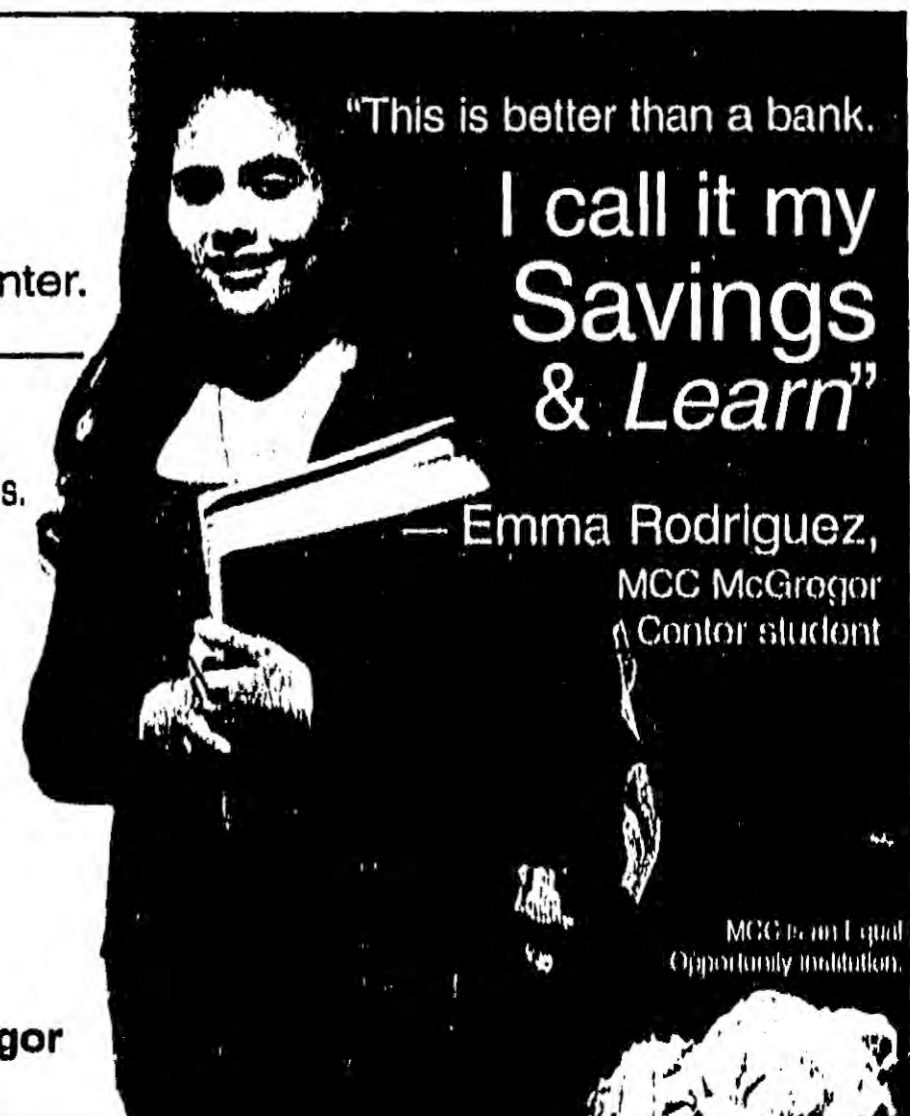
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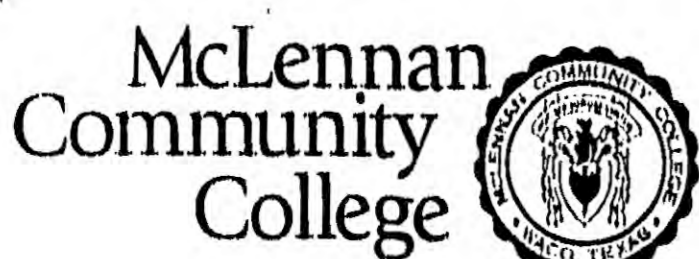

If Fannon could go to the next level and play for any NBA team, he said, he would choose the Mavs so he could be close to his friends and family.

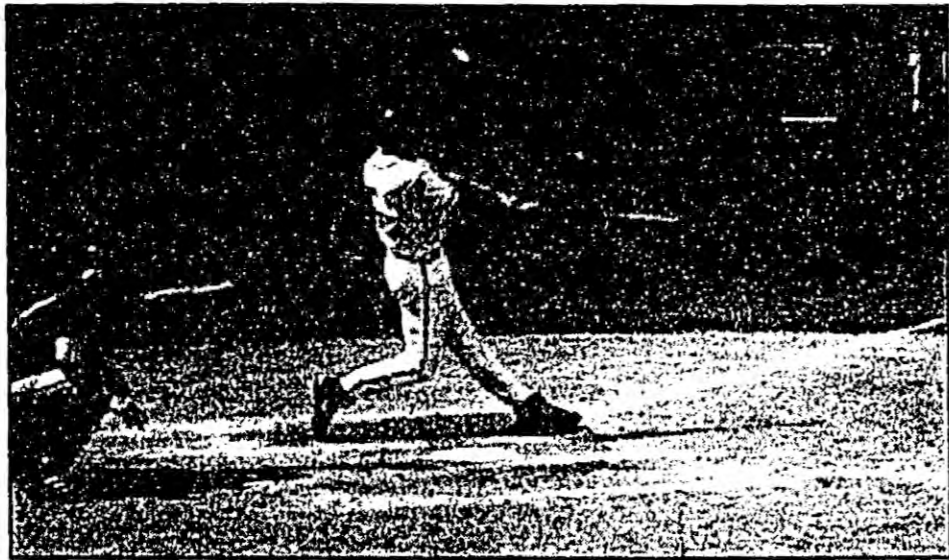
As far as the best player at his position in the NBA, he chose Kobe Bryant because, he said, "he can do it all."

Catcher Matt Sodolak fouls off pitch during second game of All-Star series. Region 5 won 9-8.

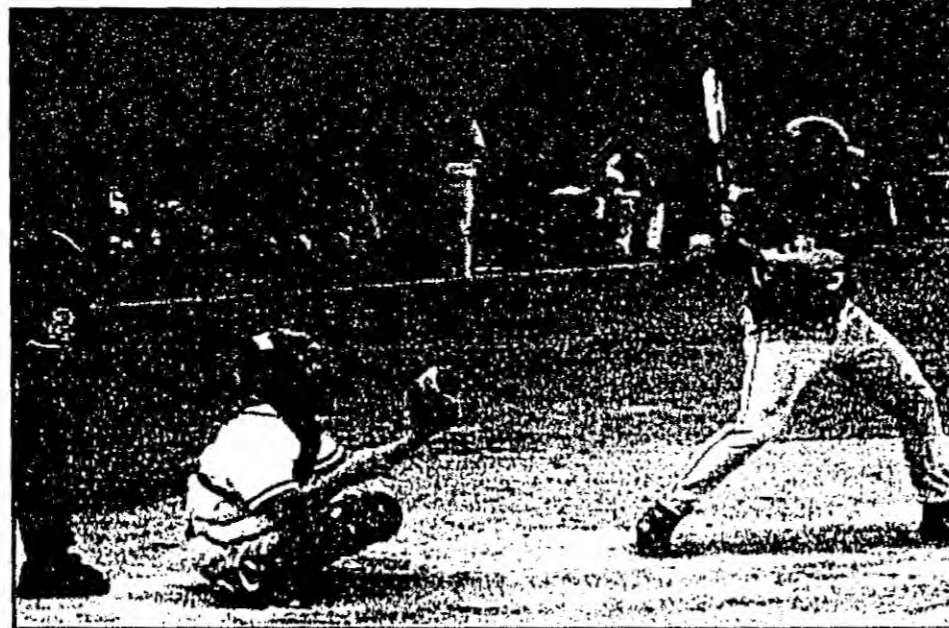

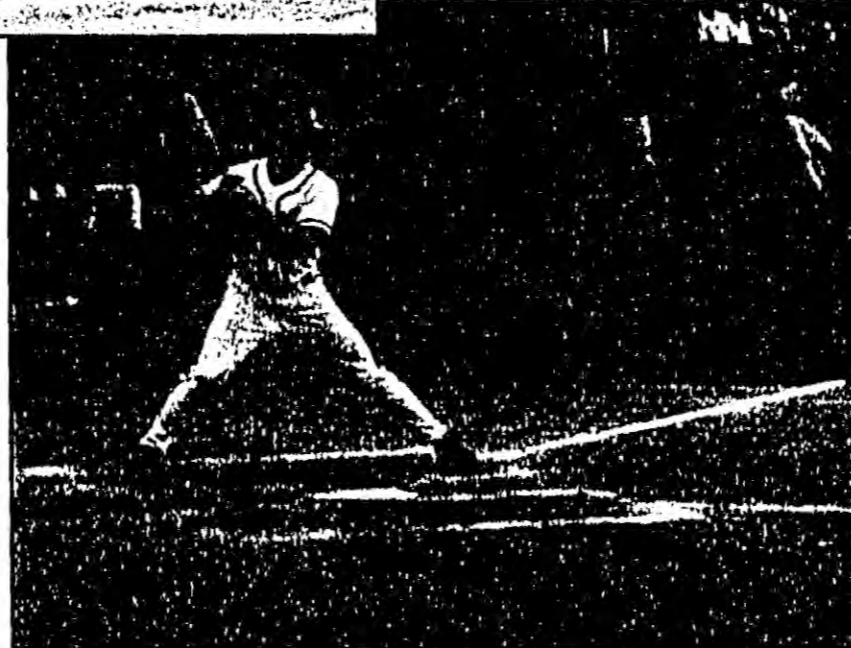

Three MCC baseball players, sophomores Steven Allred, Matt Sodolak, and Luke Prihoda, were selected to play in this year's Region 5 all-star game Oct. 1-2 against their sister Region 14 all-star team.

The three game event played over two days, the first on Friday night followed by a double header on Saturday, featured some of the most talented junior college athletes in two states, Texas and New Mexico.

Head coach Tim Tadlock, Grayson County College, got the honor of leading this year's squad as reward for his team winning the Region 5 Championship last year; Tim Arrington of San Jacinto got the nod for Region 14.

"We know 'em. Most of them here are in our league," said Tadlock when asked if it was difficult to coach players he may not know well.

"We had the roster since Wednesday. Usually we have the roster about two weeks in advance," said Tadlock.

The first game of the series was less

than impressive for the home team, coming up short 12-1 in the eight inning game with MCC's own Steven Allred driving in the lone RBI from the runner on second.

On the following day, after a heavy rain that required the field to be tarped overnight, the Region 5 team even upped the series with a 9-8 extra inning win. Catcher Matt Sodolak went 2-for-5 in the game.

Though pitcher Luke Prihoda was selected to the team, a hurt arm prevented him from taking the mound during the three-game series.

The yearly all-star games are an honor for the athletes and provide recruiters with a peek at a possible future big league star like former MCC stand-outs Pat Listach and Jay Buhner, or athletes like the 2001 hurling tandem of Sean Henn and Trevor Tacker who got picked up by the New York Yankees.

With a large portion of the audience donning clothing adorned with many division I, division II and even professional team logos, the Highlanders remain primed to produce future Major League stars.
