## President Honored At Reception

A surprised Dr. Wilbur Ball walked into the administration building with Earl Harrison, charter board of trustees member for presentations in honor of his 10 years as president of the college last Monday.

Dr. Ball took his position as president of the college in March of 1966. He had previously been employed at Wharton Junior College as vice-president and dean of the college for three years.

He worked at Belmont Junior College in Corpus Christi for five years and before that he taught Spanish and English in public schools.

"As president, I don't have much contact with the students, but I would like to think that the decisions I make benefit them," said Dr. Ball.

Harrison presented a plaque to Dr. Ball for outstanding leadership with appreciation from the board of trustees.

Harrison told a short history of the establishment of the college and of selecting Ball as president.

"We thought that the selection of a president was the most important decision, so we invited five or six applicants at a time to appear before the board with their wives. Then Mrs. Ball showed up. We really elected Mrs. Ball," said Harrison, jokingly.

Harrison closed his presentation by saying he hoped that Dr. Ball would be here on MCC's 25th anniversary and more so that he (Harrison) would be here.

Receiving the plaque, Dr. Ball said, "When Harrison asked for an appointment at 10 a.m. this morning I thought he was coming to raise hell with me."

Charles Kennedy, chairman of the Faculty Council and government instructor, presented a painting by local artist, George Nelson, on behalf of the faculty and staff members.

The painting was unveiled by special guest Mrs. Lawanda Ball.

"I don't expect MCC to turn into a four year college, said Dr. Ball.

"Enrollment will start leveling off pretty soon, especially day school. I expect a growth in continuing education," he said.

The non recent high school graduates are attending MCC but there is a decrease in public school enrollment, so I don't expect a growth that would require new buildings or dormitories.

"Dormitories are a headache," said Dr. Ball. "There are three things to avoid in school administration," he said. "Dormitories, football and buses."

There is no need for dormitories because most students commute or rent an apartment, he said.

"MCC is a first class institution academically and I find it difficult to imagine

getting a better education, elsewhere," he said.

"We have been thought of as the fair haired school for the community and the institution has produced for the community," he said.

"We are not as good as we could be and I think we will concentrate on being better in the future," said Dr. Ball.

The reception was sponsored by Student Government, the McLennan Community College Office Personnel Association and the Faculty Council.

Three faculty and staff members will aid in conducting the 29th annual Texas Junior College Teachers Association (TJCTA) and Texas Junior College Association convention Thursday, Friday and Saturday in Dallas.

Mickey Ferguson, director of public information, will be chairman of two journalism and public information section meetings. The topic for the first will be "Time and Money: Managing for Top Productivity," and for the second "Public Service Announcements."

Child Care Program Director Dr. Ann Hansen Garrett will act as chairman for the child development section meeting. The speaker's topic will be "Status of Core Curriculum Development."

Music Coordinator William R. Hasket will lead the music section meeting on the topic of "Comprehensive Musicianship at the College Level."

Five MCC music students will perform with the TJCTA All State Honor Band at the convention.

The MCC students that will perform during two concerts with the 110-piece honor band are clarinetist Cay Greiner, base clarinetist Mark McKee, trombonists Manuel Pena and Steve Snyder, and trumpeter David Roos. The first concert will be from 7:30 to 9 p.m. on Friday and the second will be at 11:30 a.m. on Saturday.

The TJCTA All State Honor Band is directed by Coordinator Charles McAdams of Grayson County College and is conducted by Dr. James Sudduth, director of bands at Southwest Texas State University.

## Student Picked As Waco Ambassador

One MCC student began a four-month trip to Valley Forge last Saturday with the Bi-Centennial Wagon Train that passed through Waco, Jan 21.

Mary Ellade North, 20-year-old sophomore, was dubbed a representative of Waco by Mayor Ted Getterman Friday morning in City Hall. Saturday she left with her parents to meet the Wagon Train in Fort Smith, Ark.

She joined the seven cast members who performed four times in Waco during January and the large group of auxiliary people who keep the train moving. Miss North will work as a camp jack, moving the trailers, pickup trucks and wagons to the new campsites and running errands for other travelers.

"I planned it all out...but my parents had mixed emotions. I love meeting people, traveling

and camping, so this ought to be pretty good," Miss North said.

"I have a bi-centennial dress I'll wear in parades and when I ride on the wagon. And I have a cowboy suit I'll wear in parades when I ride a horse," she said.

Miss North, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dwan D. North of 3000 Austin, and sister of freshman Harry "Dru" North, is a 1974 graduate of Richfield High School.

The job furnishes room, board and spending money and will keep Miss North away from Waco for six or seven months. After the train arrives in Valley Forge July 4, it will be on display for two months.

"I have a lot of luggage to cover a couple of seasons. I found out I could join the train Feb. 3. I talked to the cast members while they were in Waco and told them I wanted to join them about May," she said.

# GR Profits For Loans And Ath. Scholarships

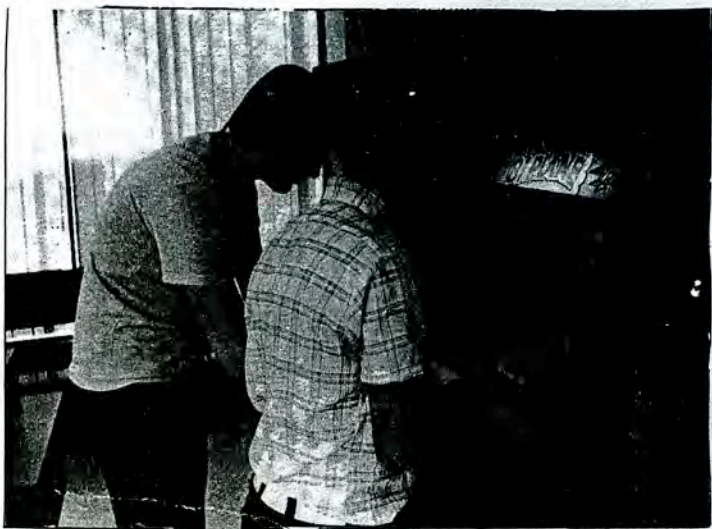

Games Room of the Student Center celebrated a profitable first birthday Monday. New tennis and airplane games have been added to the original equipment of five billiard tables and three foosball tables. A new jukebox has also replaced the old one.

During the last year, the games room has averaged \$250 a week in profits for the college. The money is placed in the general fund and helps support scholarships, athletic programs and other college costs.

The jukebox, situated in the dining area, had to be replaced last semester.

"The old company gave lousy service. They came out once a month and didn't change records unless we asked them," said Don Bynum, director of student activities.

"We lost money. Students wouldn't play it. The new company is in the vending business. They're out to make money and so they're out to give the best service. New records are added every Friday. The box has a meter that tells what songs have been played and what hasn't," Bynum said.

Money from the jukebox goes to the Short Term Loan Fund that offers money to students. The loan fund is not in use this semester because so many students have not repaid loans, the financial aids office reported.

The two new games, tennis and bi-plane, brought in about \$60 the first week and about half

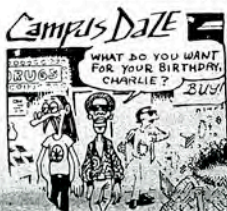
that the second week. These two games and the jukebox are leased, and MCC and the vendor share profits 50-50, Bynum said.

The Tennis Tourney can be played by two to four people. The background of the game resembles a tennis court. A electronically reproduced tennis ball constantly bounces back and forth across the screen. By pushing buttons, players try to serve and hit the ball so their opponent cannot score any points.

The bi-plane game also has a reproduced background of World War I airplanes. Players try to knock their opponent's plane out of the air. This game also has sound accompanying it.

The cost of playing the games is varied. Billiards is 1 cent per minute per player. Foosball is 25 cents per game and is coin operated. The Tennis Tourney is 25 cents per game, and the bi-plane game is 50 cents per game. The most popular game, the game that produces the most revenue, said Bynum, is foosball; however, it also costs more to maintain. Bynum said the least popular game is Tennis Tourney due to the fact that it is a new game and has not had time to catch on.

The four students who are employed in the games room are Ronnie Copeland, John Miller, S. L. Roddy and Roxanne Money. In addition to their supervisory duties, they also operate the campus lost and found department and provide general information.



# Supreme Court Handles Judicial Responsibilities

The campus Supreme Court was established in May of 1969 when Dr. Wilbur Ball, president, approved it.

The supreme court consists of five justices and a clerk appointed by the student government president.

To become a member of the supreme court a student must be full-time and have a 2.0 semester grade average.

"Student government advertizes at the first of the year that any student interested should contact the president of student government," said Don Bynum, director of student activities.

President of student government and the student will then set up an appointment for the student to take a test over the student government constitution.

The student does not have to pass the test but he has to prove that he has read it, said Don Bynum.

After the president has made his choices, he then presents them to the legislature to be voted on separately.

The original purpose of the supreme court is to rule on the legislative action of the student government, and the appellate jurisdiction is on traffic cases where a student has received a traffic ticket and feels it is unfair.

Kathryn Newberry, sophomore, is Chief Justice and

Tom Fuller, Marvin Schroeder, sophomores, David Sann and Paula Roerick, freshman, are the justices.

Scott Adams, history instructor is the faculty advisor. The supreme court constitution is Article V, the judicial branch of the student government.

The constitution is as follows: The Judicial branch of the Student Government shall consist of a Student Supreme Court and inferior courts as may be established by the Student Congress. The Student Supreme Court will function as the highest student judicial organization.

There shall be three sophomores and two freshman appointed to the Student Government with the advice and consent of the Legislative Branch of the Student Congress.

The President of the Student Government shall also appoint a clerk to the Student Supreme Court to take minutes of the proceedings and prepare copies of appeal cases for each member of the court and advisor.

All appeal cases within the jurisdiction of the court must be considered by the court; however, it would take the approval of three of the members of the Court before a final judgement is reached on any appeal.

The President of the Student Government shall also appoint other officials as the need arises to insure the efficient operation of the court.

The members of the Student Supreme Court shall choose one advisor from either the faculty of administration of McLennan Community College.

# Ravens Steal Twin Bill

San Jacinto College won a doubleheader from the Highlander baseball team Monday afternoon at the MCC Field. The final score in the first game was 4-2, and the Ravens won the second contest 5-3. MCC now owns a six-game losing streak.

Five MCC errors paved the way for the first Raven conquest. All four San Jacinto runs were unearned as Highlander pitcher Mike Faubion did a creditable job. The sophomore from Richfield struck out six Ravens while giving up seven hits and walking one. Every inning except the fifth and seventh, Faubion was in trouble due to MCC errors or hits by the Ravens.

San Jacinto drew first blood with two runs in the second inning. Mike Kane singled, stole second, and advanced to third on an error by MCC shortstop Donnie Snyder. With men on third and second, Eric Finley singled to left field to drive in two runs.

The Highlanders tied the game in the bottom of the second. Drew Perkins walked and after Tim Skinner flew out, Steve Cunningham lined a drive to center that got past Raven centerfielder Dwayne Bagley. Perkins scored on the play.

Snyder then singled to score Cunningham.

San Jacinto scored the two decisive runs for victory in the top of the third. Two Highlander errors, a passed ball, and a wild pitch accounted for the two tallies.

Loughrey with two hits, Cunningham and Snyder, one RBI apiece, led the Highlander hitters.

The Ravens pounded out 10 hits against two MCC pitchers in the 5-3 win. Scotty Proctor started for the Highlanders, giving up the five runs and seven hits. Craig Campeol relieved Proctor in the fourth inning and pitched well. Campeol gave up no runs and struck out four.

MCC scored in the fifth when Loughrey singled pinch runner Andy Nesrata to third. Nesrata was running for Robert Simmons who had singled. Nesrata scored on a wild pitch by Raven pitcher Mike Bailey.

No combinations off opponent's ball (hit first). Ball or balls sunk will be spotted. The "eight" ball is neutral and available for combinations.

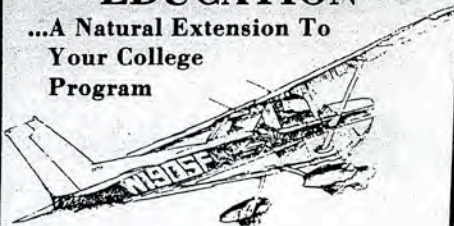
### New Voters Registered

## Orange Rips Grayson

The Highlanders left no doubt Thursday night who the number one team in the NTJAC standings is, with a 106-92 win over the Grayson Vikings. MCC's record is now 27-3 on the year and the Orange closed the conference season with a 12-2 mark.

Grayson County brought a bus load of Viking supporters to the game which left some MCC fans locked out of the gymnasium. The doors were locked by 7 p.m. because of the over-flow conditions. The people that were fortunate enough to get in saw the Highlanders play one of their finest games of the season.

Grayson pulled ahead 2-0 on a basket by Darryl Lee. Lee, the 6-7 post man from Camden N.J. who scored 51 points against MCC in the first meeting between the two teams, was held to 36 this game. Thirty-six points is still an awful lot of baskets, but Lee just was not as big a factor in this game as the one played in Denison.

Three Highlanders, Skippy Black (until he picked up his third foul with 10:48 left in the first half), Carlos Blackwood, and Glenn Minnex all took turns in guarding the Viking's leader.

Vinnie Johnson knotted the score at 2-all with one of his patented moves and jumpshot. After Lee converted on a three-point play, John Derrick gap to 5-4 in favor of Grayson. That would be the last time the Vikings would hold the lead. Easy Ed Marshall made the score 6-5 with a basket and the Highlanders never looked back.

The first half was a tough

battle throughout. The Highlanders played well but could never mount enough momentum to take a big lead. MCC led at halftime by the score 62-54. The large amount of points was not due to poor defense. Both teams were shooting well. Johnson and Derrick tallied 46 of the Highlander's 62 first half points. Keith Foster and Jay Depanion of Grayson scored 23 points between them in the first half and their outside shooting was hurting MCC more than the talents of Lee.

Marshall, as he did in the first MCC-Viking game, led the Highlanders to victory in the second half. Making several shots off the offensive backboards, Easy Ed had 16 points in the game's final twenty minutes.

A Grayson bucket with 6:30 left in the game, closed the MCC lead to 88-81. But Johnson and Marshall scored consecutive baskets and the Highlanders coasted to victory after that.

The sophomores, Derrick, Black, Blackwood, Mark Talaga, Martin Schwartz played their last game in Highlander Gym. Derrick went

## Cagers Face Tough Rivals In Regionals

The eighth-ranked Highlanders are seeded first in the eight team Region V Junior College Basketball Tournament which begins tomorrow in Abilene.

Western Texas, the defending national champion is seeded second. MCC will play its first game at 9 p.m. against Howard County, the highest scoring team in the nation. The MCC-Howard County winner will play the victor of the Hill-New Mexico Military Institute game.

There are three teams entered in the tournament representing the Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Conference. Of these teams, MCC finished first, Grayson County second, and Hill third.

Five squads are from the Western Texas Junior College Athletic Conference. Western Texas won the loop title, New Mexico Military ended up second, Amarillo and Howard County tied for third, and Frank Phillips finished in the fifth position.

Western Texas College is located in Snyder. Led by All-America Bob Miller, the Westerners won the national title last year. This season, Lawrence Butler, the second leading scorer in the league with a 24.8 per game average, leads Western Texas. Although, winning the league title, Western Texas was defeated by New Mexico Military of Roswell, N.M. on three different occasions, in the Wool Bowl Tournament and two times in league play.
