

# Tarleton Offers New Type Of Degree

Students in the Waco area planning to get a bachelors degree now have another choice of institutions.

Tarleton State University (TSU) is offering graduate and undergraduate programs at Texas State Technical Institute this fall.

"TSU was contacted and asked if they would consider offering courses at TSTI," said

Mrs. Yvonne Martin, TSU representative at TSTI.

The program will consist of the junior and senior level courses. "It is designed for students that have finished a junior college, a technical school, a vocational program, or has accumulated several college hours but have not gotten a degree. It is also for students who can not afford a

private school. TSU is state supported and is less expensive," she said.

TSU is offering a Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences (BAAS) degree.

The program has been in Waco for three years and has been on its own for two and a half years until Mrs. Martin was hired last fall.

"We will not offer any

freshman and sophomore courses. If a student lacks any of these courses they may pick them up at MCC," said Mrs. Martin.

A lot of people in the Waco area are interested in getting a degree for several reasons. Some of them have completed a two year program and have been working in job related field but find that they need a degree

for better pay. There are students working that have families and can't afford to move to attend a university.

Students that are working in job related courses may receive credit of four hours per working year up to six years. This depends on the job. But the fact that a student is working in his job field gives him specialized training, she said.

"There are 11 universities in Texas that offer BAAS degrees," said Mrs. Martin.

Tuition is \$50 for three to 12 hours. Registration will be separate from TSTI and graduation will be at TSU.

"We had two graduates last Dec. and we will have two in May," she said.

John Whiting, registrar, and Dr. Staig, director of sociology, will be on the TSTI campus April 6 between 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. to talk with students that are interested.

"The BAAS carries the same weight and value of a BA degree," she said.

TSTI has done a service to the community by making the class room space available, she said.

## Activities Planned For Sunday's Open House Show Variety

Parents and students will be the guest on campus Sunday as faculty and staff extend Open House.

The event honors the students of the college and their families, and this year has the added emphasis of the 10-year anniversary of the college. Special guests at the Open House will be seniors from area high schools.

MCC came into being with a county-wide election and formation of the Board of Trustees in 1965. The first classes began in September, 1966.

All of the buildings on the campus will be open during Open House and hosted by college faculty and staff members.

Special entertainment events are being planned, including those with a Bicentennial emphasis since MCC is also an officially designated Bicentennial college.

First stop for most visitors will be a reception at the

Student Center. Wilbur Ball, president, and a member of the Board of Trustees, and Bobby Kacal, student government president will greet visitors.

Entertainment, displays, and equipment are among methods used to demonstrate college courses and services.

Musical groups will perform three concerts: the Concert Band at 2:30, the Concert Choir at 3:30, and the Stage Band at 4:30.

A 30-minute carillon concert of bicentennial music will greet visitors at 1:45 p.m. and again at 4:45 p.m. as they prepare to leave campus.

The well known Houston Pipe and Drum Band will stage two standing concerts and two strolling concerts across the campus.

Two highland lassies will dance during the stationary concerts.

How to sail and canoe will be shown at the MCC swimming pool; fencing, gymnastics, archery, volleyball, modern dance and tennis demonstrations will also occur at the Health and Physical Education building.

Science laboratories with the most modern in teaching tools will be open, as will the communications laboratories at the Liberal Arts Building.

Continuing Education class products in quilting, oil painting, and pottery will be displayed. Square and round dancers will entertain.

Cosmetology students will model the latest in hair styles, created through their own

efforts at the cosmetology salon plus display skills learned there.

A memory typewriter demonstration is also planned at the Applied Science Building where adults and children can pick up free Snoopy calendars.

All area residents are invited to Open House. A reception will be held from 2 until 5 at the Student Center. Members of the Afro-Student Kindred Club will act as hostesses.

Faculty and staff members will greet visitors at various buildings as they tour the campus. Student guides from the college Circle K Club will be stationed on campus to direct visitors to their next stops.

Last week we definitely had spring-like weather, with the temperatures up into the 70s and 80s. Of course the big news of the week, was the rain that fell on March 24.



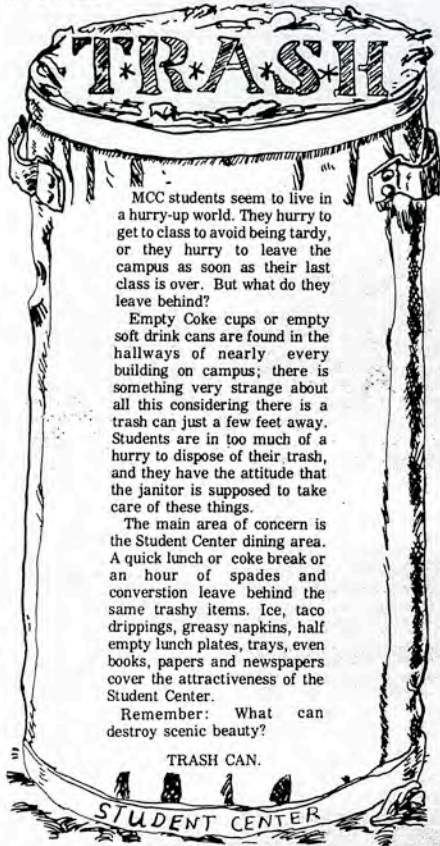

### Editors Note

Below are excerpts from college newspapers throughout the state.

Couples planning to move into married students housing at Northern Arizona University are not required to produce a marriage certificate.

The president of the West Virginia University Board of Regents was surprised to read his own obituary in the student newspaper, the Daily Athenaeum. The obituary had apparently been prepared for a journalism class and somehow found its way into print, much to the shock of the regent's friends and to the embarrassment of the student editors.

Two of three UT El Paso students have a better chance to make an A or B this spring than students four years ago. Statistics from that school show inflation has hit grades.

Reasons cited for the inflated grades range from greater student involvement in studies to faculty leniency. Said one dean, students have left the protest age of the late sixties and are more interested in school. Also, students who went to school to avoid the draft are not hanging around. Students are more concerned about the high requirements for graduate, law and medical schools, too, he said.

# State Campus Report

Yale faculty members restored the "F" grades at the New Haven school. For four years Yale students have been able to slip by without an "F" blotting their records.

"The present situation has produced the absurd situation in which a failing grade is more desirable in the eyes of many students than a D or even a C," one faculty report said. Since so many want to enter graduate school, fear of receiving a C or D has kept them from experimenting with different courses.

Last quarter 43 per cent of the grades were A's. The system is plainly dishonest, history professor Donald Kaga said. -Barometer, Galveston College

Homosexual's life not so gay: Leonard Matlovich made 150 UT Arlington listeners squirm with apprehension as the former Air Force sergeant, discharged last fall for homosexuality, gave a taste of the feat that many homosexuals live with daily.

"You know what they say, 'It takes a faggot to know a faggot.' Now I'm going to walk around the room and point out the gays, and when I point to you, I want you to stand up so the person next to you will know you're gay."

After walking around the

audience, Matlovich said "I never point anyone out but I wanted you to know how it feels, how the fear feels to gays, every day of our lives."

Matlovich spoke as part of "Human Sexuality Week," sponsored by the SAB Forums Council.

It looks like we will have a major league baseball season after all. Teams are now in their spring camps and are in the process of playing exhibition games. There sure is a lot of interest in baseball now, probably due to the outstanding World Series of 1975. When the New York Yankees arrived in the clubhouse for the first time, they were surprised with a list of regulations posted on the bulletin board by new Yankee owner George Steinbrenner. It called for no long hair, no muttonchops, no beards and no high stirrups on uniform socks. Just to prove that he was entirely behind his boss' war on hair, Manager Billy Martin shaved off his mustache. No player was affected more by the hairy rules than outfielder Oscar Gamble. This year, the Bears will journey to Austin for the always tough Texas Relays, then they travel to College Station for a duel meet with the Texas Aggies. The weekend of Easter, April 17, is the date of the Baylor Invitational. The 1976 meet will feature outstanding track action for the Waco area.

Highlander basketball player, Burt Burrows is now engaged in MCC baseball. The freshman from Austin played a major part in the roundballers

reaching the national tournament and now hopes to contribute his winning ways with Coach Rick Butler's forces. If hustle is important in baseball, Burt will be a definite asset for the Highlanders.

The MCC Highlanders and Hill Jr. College Rebels split a Northern Junior College Athletic Association doubleheader Saturday in Hillsboro. MCC won the opener 12-3 but Hill came back to win the nightcap 7-2.

The Highlanders collected 12 hits and committed no errors in the first game. Sophomore pitcher, Tommy Scott picked up his fourth win of the year, giving up three runs on four hits and striking out four.

The Highlanders took command early in the opener, scoring three runs in the second inning. After Drew Perkins and Terry Kunkel walked with one out, Steve Cunningham doubled over the rightfielder's head to score Perkins. Rusty Erwin then singled with two out to score the final two runs of the inning.

MCC added two more runs in the third inning. Dan Moody and Jack Lindsey led off the session with singles and consecutive walks to Perkins and Kunkel produced the fourth Highlander run. Nick Harris' sacrifice fly gave MCC an comfortable 5-0 lead.

The Highlanders put the game away with seven runs on seven hits. MCC sent 11 men up to the plate in the scoring bonanza.

Hill rode the pitching of Brian Gilbreath in the second game for the 7-2 victory. Gilbreath scattered nine hits while going the seven innings.

Leading the Highlanders 21-hit attack for the doubleheader were Cunningham (4-for-8, 2 doubles, 2 RBIs) and Kunkel (3-for-5, 1 triple, 3 RBIs). Moody also collected three hits, Perkins, Erwin and Harris two hits and two RBIs each, and

Lindsey and Donnie Snyder two hits apiece.

## Derrick Named All-Star MVP

John Derrick scored 22 points, grabbed 16 rebounds and blocked four shots, leading the West to a 123-119 overtime victory over the East in the National Junior College All-Star Game at the San Antonio Convention Center, Friday night.

Derrick, the 6-7 post man for the Highlanders the past two years, was selected for the game's most Valuable Player Award.

The contest, which features

the top 20 junior college players in the nation, had 11 juco All-Americans. But in the end, it was Derrick who dominated both ends of the court.

In the first half, Derrick scored six points, but he erupted for 19 in the second half. His totals included 9 of 14 field goals and 4 or 5 free throws.

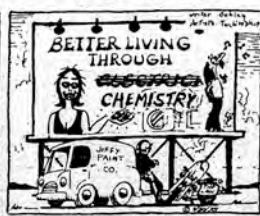


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
