Highland Games Usher In Spring

The Highland Games will begin at noon on Friday on the grounds between the Student Center and the Administration Building.

The Games will begin with a concert by Gary and Wayne Duncan and their band. Various campus organizations will offer food and activities. Among the foods offered will be hot link sandwiches, homemade ice cream, tacos, chulapas, hot dogs, corny dogs, popcorn, nachos and cold drinks. Activities offered will be a dunkin' booth, a "cake" walk and a jail house.

The following activities will be sponsored by the Student Government beginning after 1 p.m.:

Caber toss-the caber is grasped by its thinner end and when thrown lands on the heavier end. The distance from the feet of the thrower to the far

end of the caber is measure to determine the winner. Each contestant has three tries. The MCC caber weighs approximately 80 pounds and is 12 feet long. The MCC record is 53 feet and 3 1/2 inches.

Egg toss-partners will face each other in two lines. The egg is tossed back and forth as the lines move further apart. This is continued until only one partnership remains with an unbroken egg.

Water Balloon toss-same rules as egg toss.

Waling Race-a walking race around the perimeter of the parking lot.

Leap frog-a coed race. Leap frogging from one line to another.

Pie eating contest-each contestant must have a feeder. Upon the beginning signal, the contestant will gobble the pie held by their feeder until no pie

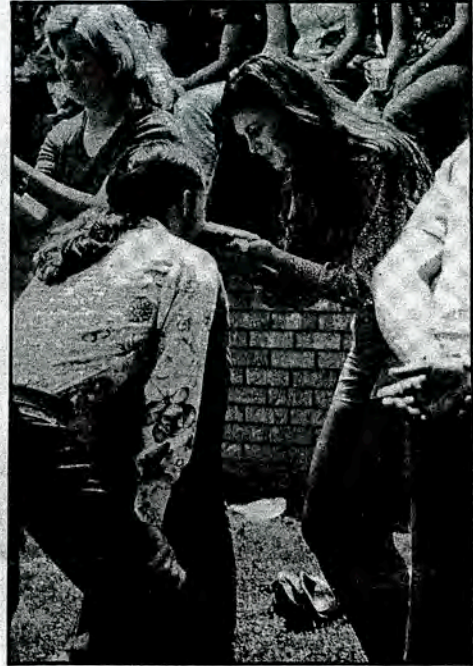
is left in the pan or on the ground; it must either be in the mouth or on the face within a one inch radius of the mouth. The first one to finish is the winner.

Watermelon seed spitting-each contestant may spit three seeds for distance. Watermelons will be furnished.

Three-legged race-a coed race.

Frisbee throw-partners will face each other across a line. The frisbee (some will be furnished) is tossed back and forth as the lines move further apart. The frisbee must be caught with only one hand. The game will continue until only one partnership remains.

Tug O' War-"battle of the sexes." Twice as many girls will oppose a group of boys with a puddle of shaving cream in the middle.

Alcohol Seminar Held At MCC

A five-day law enforcement seminar on alcohol related traffic safety problems was held recently at McLennan Community College.

The seminar course was designed to increase the effectiveness of alcohol enforcement programs and to enable officers to identify alcohol-impaired drivers in time to prevent accidents.

Courses are taught through the Traffic Safety Institute of Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois, in cooperation with the MCC Traffic Safety and Education Office. The Governor's Office of Traffic Safety sponsored the seminar.

Participants came from local law enforcement agencies in five counties: Bosque, McLennan, Falls, Limestone and Bell.

Former San Antonio police chief George Bichsel awarded certificates to the officers. Bichsel is currently Police Service Consultant for the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety.

Work-Study Planned For Summer

Students who plan to be employed as work-study students this summer must re-apply if they were previously employed by MCC and have their eligibilities established in order to be placed on student payroll.

All student employees will be terminated following the May 28 payroll. This will be done in order that a clean start can be made with student work-study eligibilities for the summer sessions.

May 10 Deadline for Merit Scholarships

Students who received Merit Scholarships for the first time during the 1975-76 academic year are eligible for the scholarship during the 1976-77 academic year provided that they have maintained a 2.5 average and enrolled full time.

It will be necessary for all scholarship recipients to contact the Financial Aids Office on or before May 10, 1976 and complete an application. This is necessary in order to have the award available for the fall registration.

Lost and Found Auction May 7

Watches, calculators, books, and other unclaimed items will be auctioned May 7 in the Student Center at the activity hour. The items to be auctioned were found and turned over to the Lost and Found department but never recovered by the owners.

Items turned over to Lost and Found are kept for four weeks to be recovered by the owner. After four weeks the lost items become property of the Student Center. If one finds that their property has been found and turned over to Lost and Found that person must appeal to Don Bynum, director of student activities to recover it.

"All lost items will go to the highest bidder," said Bynum. The proceeds from the auction will be used for service projects as decided by the Student Government.

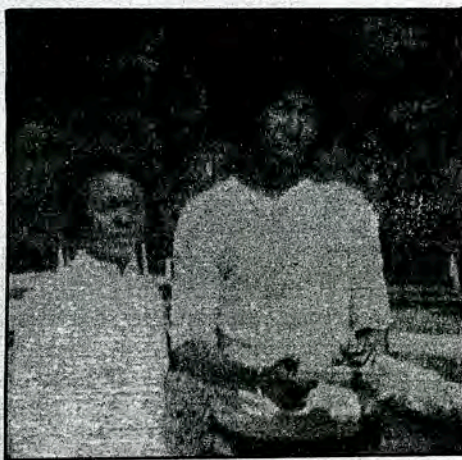

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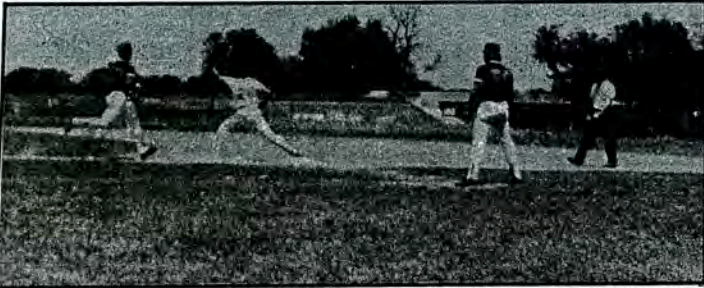

Golfers Ready for Regional Meet

The nationally-ranked MCC golf team participates in the regional tournament Friday and Saturday in Roswell, N.M. The event will be held on the New Mexico Military Institute course. Thirty-six holes will be played Friday, 18 on Saturday. Approximately thirteen teams will be in Roswell for the action.

Coach Jimmy Calyton will take seven golfers to the tournament. Dan Croonquist, Dale Carlisle, David Sann, Russell Orth and Jack Twedell will form a five man team and Bobby Heath and Frank Johnson will play individually.

"We have a real good chance to win the tournament. The course that we will play on is in the desert so we have been practicing all week to get ready. We went there two years ago and qualified for the nationals so we are going to try to do it

again," said Clayton.

In the spring season the Highlanders played in seven tournaments, five of which were university oriented. MCC won three of these—the Sam Houston State Invitational, the Southwest Recreational and the Longhorn Invitational.

The Highlanders sport impressive yearly averages. Croonquist averages a 73.0, Carlisle 74.0, Sann (who has only played in the last two tournaments) 73.4, Orth 74.5 and Twedell 76.0.

The national tournament will be held in Galveston.

The Highlander baseball team rode the excellent pitching of Cliff Crowell and David Hicks to tighten up the Northern Texas conference standings with a pair of wins over Ranger 7-1 and 4-0. MCC's league record goes to 12-8 and the Rangers drop to 11-7. Today the Highlanders travel to Hillsboro for an important doubleheader against Hill and then they close the season in Ranger for a twin-bill.

Crowell and Hicks silenced the usually loud-ringing Ranger bats, leaving the visitors in a daze throughout the afternoon. Scattering four hits, Crowell struck out six, walked six and hit a batter, but the tall righthander never was in serious trouble. The win upped his record to 3-4. Hicks, a transfer from Ranger, baffled his former teammates while giving up four hits, three walks and struck out five. His record goes to 5-4.

The Highlanders played perhaps the best defensive day of the season—against the Rangers. For the afternoon

MCC committed only five errors. None of the miscues caused any trouble for the Highlander pitchers. Mike Tarver, Dan Moody, Jack Lindsey and Steve Cunningham had particularly outstanding defensive days.

In the first game, pitcher Crowell's control got him in hot water in the second inning. With one out Danny Villalobos reached first of a walk. After Carl Young bounced out to Crowell, Kevin Schell singled to put Rangers at the corners. But leadoff hitter Robert Joseph struck out to end the threat.

The Highlanders scored all seven runs in the third inning. After Terry Kunkel bounced out to third base, Tommy Loughrey rapped a single sharply into centerfield. Scott Nichol then blooped a single over the first baseman's head to put two men on. Mainstay Drew Perkins tripled in Loughrey and Nichol to give MCC a 2-0 edge. Shortstop Tarver doubled in Perkins, then Lindsey reached base on a single, to put Highlanders at the corners. Moody drove in Tarver with a single for another MCC run. Ranger then changed pitchers, pulling starter Mike Glenn for reliever Rusty O'Brien. After Cunningham flew out to center for the second out, Tim Skinner rapped a single to drive in Moody.
