Art Center Open To Public

Although the grounds were dampened by rains Sunday the enjoyment of the opening of the new Waco Art Center was not.

The project which started nearly five years ago was completed just recently and dedicated this Sunday.

At the dedication ceremonies opening the center, Mrs. Carroll W. Sturgis, chairman of the board of trustees for the center, introduced the new instructional staff, the workers who helped in the renovation, the area leaders responsible for

the art centers existence and the first director of the center Paul Rogers Harris, formerly of Dallas.

Waco Mayor Ted Getteman and County Judge Bob L. Thomas were given honorary keys to the art center by Mrs. Sturgis, in acceptance of the Center by the community.

In his comments to the crowd gathered in the main lobby, Judge Thomas said, "It is said that science feeds man's body, but that the arts feed man's soul. Such is this new art center; food for man's soul"

Mrs. Sturgis ended the ceremonies by stressing the importance of the art center to the community and added that memberships were essential in the continuance of the center.

After the dedication, a film was shown to give the public an idea of the extent of renovation that took place on the old Cameron house. Exhibits of oil paintings, water color and sculpture were displayed.

Three Krazi Texans Visit Waco For Concert

Waco radio station K-R-Z-I presents "Three Krazi Texans"-Rusty Wier, David Allan Coe and B.W. Stevenson in concert Friday, April 23rd in the Heart O'Texas Coliseum. The concert will begin at 8 p.m. Tickets can be bought in advance at Jack's Stereo, Buddy's Stereo, Baylor Records and Lake Air Records at five dollars apiece. A ticket at the

door will cost six dollars.

Five dollars a seat is "a pretty good deal" to see these three quality performers. Whether you are a rock 'n roll fan or maybe you like the fast-growing-in-popularity "Texas music" (sometimes called Longneck music) style, every spectator will be satisfied.

Promoters can not over stress the point that there must be a

good turnout, for the concert. Within the last year, Merle Haggard, Willie Nelson and War have each played to less than capacity audiences. Haggard performed at the HOT Coliseum, Nelson and War at the Waco Convention Center. If the people of Waco do not turn out to see the "Krazi Texans", they may lose the privilege of seeing top-notch artists.

Wier is unlike most Austin musicians—he was raised in the capital city. Actually, he was born in Corpus Christi and grew up in Manchaca, on the outskirts of Austin. But he attended the Austin public schools and played football and basketball for Travis High.

Wier has been picking in Texas honky tonks for more than a decade, beginning his musical career as a drummer. He played in a country band with Barefoot Chesser and Ray Fouchet, then joined "The Wig," one of the first Texas psychedelic blues bands. Later he drummed for the "Lavender Hill Express." But as he progressed as a singer, the drumming became more incidental, and about six years ago he switched to rhythm guitar.

"If I want to play well, I have to get a tightness in my stomach, and unless I've got the audience involved, that tightness just isn't there," says Wier about his work. He's talking about what is probably the single most important quality of his multi-faceted talent which has pushed him to the front of the Austin music scene: how he plays and sings for his audience. Once he was so successful that a club owner stopped selling beer for a half hour because he thought the audience "was getting out of control."

"But every night is different," said Wier. "You never know what's gonna happen. I had a guy accuse me of messin' with his ol' lady in Nacogdoches. "I was just talkin' everybody was sitting around. It was a full house and this guy comes walking in raising heck, shaking his fist and everything. I had to quiet him down, so I said, "I'm gonna do this next song for that fella that just yelled at me. I did 'I Heard You Been Layin' My Old Lady."

In 1974, Wier cut his first album, Stoned, Slow, Rugged, and the critics applauded.

Billboard magazine reported: "Way above average effort from a first time around artist, who has come up with a mix of country and rock that comes over as original rather than as simply another singer-songwriter jumping on the bandwagon. Wier has the ability to move from acoustic ballad to pure country rock within a song without jarring the listener, and has a voice distinctive enough to give him immediate identity."

In December, 1975, Wier's third album, simply entitled Rusty Wier was released and did very well on Billboard's charts. That album included the hit "I Don't Wanna Lay This Guitar Down."

B.W. Stevenson was born Louis Charles Stevenson, III. He got the name "Buckwheat" which was later shortened to B.W. from a friend who said his hair looked "jes like a bunch of buckwheats."

"I had my first paying job when I was 13," he said. "It was with a Dallas rock 'n roll band called Us. I was fired by my own band." "I went out to California (at the age of 21) and lived there until the earthquake. Then I got out—quick. I went to Arizona and Colorado and did some wrangling but still found time to do some picking."

It wasn't until he returned to Texas, that things began happening for Stevenson. Four people got together and formed a partnership in an attempt to break into the music business. They mentioned Stevenson to the man who turned out to be his first record producer, David M. Kershbaum, who in turn notified his superior in Chicago of the find.

The Houston Post, described Stevenson as a person who "has both feet planted firmly in the country and western stream of music, yet appeals almost exclusively to rock audiences. His performance, consisting of the most part of original compositions, is pleasing in a warm, easy-going way. He has an outstanding tenor voice and the material he uses permits him to be both feathery and gutsy. Stevenson is worth seeing, too. He's a dead ringer for Smokey the Bear."

Two single releases from his third album, My Maria performed especially well on the national charts; "Siambala" written by Daniel Moore and "My Maria" written by Moore and Stevenson.

The Dental Clinic will demonstrate proper brushing techniques and oral hygiene. Lung capacity testing, weight and height measurements will also be available.

Astronomy Club Shows 'Odyssey'

The Astronomy Club will present "2001: A Space Odyssey" tonight at 7 p.m. in the HPE Lecture Hall. Admission is \$1 per person; however, the audience number will be limited to 120 persons.

Before the main feature, the club will show a short film that deals with recent discoveries about the other planets in our solar system. This is an animated film set to music.

"This is not a technical film, but one that is more for enjoyment," said Keith Williford, president of the Astronomy Club.

"2001: A Space Odyssey" was made in 1968 with a budget of \$10.5 million. Stanley Kubrick is the director of the film. Kubrick is also known for the movies "Spartacus," "Dr. Strangelove," "A Clockwork Orange" and the recent "Barry Lyndon." Kubrick and Arthur C. Clarke, science fiction novelist wrote the screenplay for "2001."

"In my estimation, this picture has the best photography and best special effects of any science fiction movie ever made," said Williford.

Manager Frank Lucchesi of the Texas Rangers has gone so far as to give his starting rotation for the first four games of the season, which begins with Minnesota Friday night in Arlington Stadium. "Gaylord Perry got the opener, of course," he stated, "then I'll come back with Jim Umberger in the second game with the Twins and Bill Singer will pitch the third on Sunday afternoon. Then on Monday night against Oakland, Nelson Briles will start. He beat them twice last season, you know" With the Cleveland Indians, Perry's spring training conditioning methods came under question last year by Manager Frank Robinson. "He (Robinson) believes in long-distance running, the mile run, things like that," said Perry. "I've never been able to figure out what the hell good that kind of running does a pitcher." It was obvious that Perry had been doing more over the winter than just tending to the peanut crop on his North Carolina farm. "He threw all his pitches and his stuff was about as good as it was at any time last season," said catcher Jim Sundberg. "He pitched like he was ready to open the season tomorrow."

The Texas Longhorn baseball team hosts the Texas Aggies this weekend in a Southwest Conference three-game series beginning Friday. At stake is first place in the SWC. The Longhorns warm up for A&M by hosting the Texas Rangers tonight. A near-sellout crowd is expected to see former Longhorn ace Jim Gideon on the mound against his old teammates.

Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell, on the reserve clause: "I don't think a lot of players will switch clubs because a player, like anybody else, doesn't like the idea of moving his family from one city to another, year after year. I know I don't intend to put an ad in the newspapers saying: 'Have bat, will travel'."

The Houston Rockets of the National Basketball Association won three of four games recently at home. The Rockets have desperately tried to overtake Philadelphia and gain the wildcard berth in the Eastern Division. Houston must, however, wait till next year because they had had to play nine of their last 12 games on the road and the Rockets do not have that much talent.

Don Money, third baseman of the Milwaukee Brewers, talks about his future and the possibility of playing out his option. "As of now, I haven't even thought about playing out my option next year. I've been treated fair. You'll find only 10 percent of the 600 players who might—those who have been given a hard time by their owners." Television ratings of the National Basketball

Association games are down some 30 percent on CBS from last year.

The Houston Astros were fortunate in that only one player, James Rodney Richard, was unsigned as March reached an end. The New York Knickerbockers have Earl (the Pearl) Monroe, whose distinctive nickname is responsible for the one given to a star of the Wayland Baptist Flying Queens who reached the semifinals of the AIAW basketball championship. She's known as Pearl (the Earl) Worrell.

The Ranger Rangers won both ends of a Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Association doubleheader from the Highlanders Saturday afternoon at the MCC Field. The Rangers, now 4-2 in league play and 40-9 on the season, took the first game 3-1 in 11 innings and came back to win the nightcap 6-3.

Highlander starting pitcher, Tommy Scott pitched very well in the opener, giving up eight hits and one earned run in the eleven innings he worked. MCC committed four errors which led to two unearned runs.

Ranger pitchers Randy Larson and Brett Taylor were in trouble most of the game, but the Highlanders could not get the clutch hit when needed. MCC stranded 13 potential runs on base, including 12 after the first inning when the Highlanders scored their only run.

With one out in the first inning, Tommy Lughrey tripled to right-centerfield and scored on Dan Moody's fielder's choice grounder to give MCC a 1-0 lead.

Two MCC errors and a RBI triple by Dan Villalobos led to two Ranger runs in the top of the 11th inning to end the first game.

The Highlanders outthrew Ranger 8-5 in the second game, but once again could not get the clutch hit to drive in a run. Moody, who went 3-for-4 at the plate in the second game, started the second with a triple and scored on Steve Cunningham's ground out.

But MCC could not hang close to the Rangers, for in the sixth and seventh innings the visitors added five runs.

Drew Perkins was the Highlanders' top hitter for the day with a 4-for-8 performance, including two doubles. Moody (3-for-6, 1 triple, 1 double, 1 RBI), Loughrey (2 hits, including triple) and Jack Lindsey (two hits) were the other leading hitters for the

day.
MCC's record falls to 4-6 in conference and 11-17 overall.
