Christmas Celebrations (2016-04-14 20:27)

The most common religion in the world is Christianity and the most well known holiday is Christmas. This is the celebration of the birth of the Son of God, Jesus. 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Hanukkah (2016-04-14 23:59)

Hanukkah is the celebration of when the Jews drove Syrians out of Jerusalem. The holiday is a full week in the month of December that reminds Jews that they rebuilt the alter and menorah of the Second Temple and were ordered to keep the 8 candles burning. According to legend, there was only enough oil to let the candles burn for one full day but they kept burning for a full eight days.

To continue the tradition each Jewish family will light the candles of the menorah over a period of eight nights at sundown. Hanukkah has grown substantially in North America, much like Christianity, recently. Gifts are exchanged over the eight days and different scriptures are recited. Games are also played such as spinning the dreidel. This is another holiday that has been changed from a celebration of a holy even to focus upon the material items exchanged. Hanukkah is the second largest holiday of the Jewish religion, following Passover, and is widely celebrated amongst Jewish followers worldwide.
