

She took us through the safest ways of cataloguing, recording and sharing the researched information we've gathered in our historical quest; at present, the hard copy is in files and folders under our bed, and digital copy is on a disc!

Advice was given to us about possible grants, to boost the finances we may need to organise proper storage facilities, as well as to enable us to purchase recording equipment.

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# Golant Downs Maintenance Volunteers, or *The Downers*

At the moment we are concentrating on repairing and replacing the steps on the main flight that leads down from the top path to the stream. There are 50 steps to replace and we are going to add a new flight further along the path which has been difficult to negotiate in recent months. We hope to finish this work before the end of February, weather permitting.

In November we planted a hundred or so trees on the Downs in the valley above the *Sawmills*, and it is extremely disappointing to see that some of the tree guards have been mysteriously removed.

#### Estuarine Bird Surveys

Most of *The Downers* members are also involved with the *Cornwall Wildlife Trust* and *Friends of the Fowey Estuary*, who are co-operating to conduct surveys of local bird populations.

Recently, Claire Hoddinott, who is the *Environmental Officer* of the *Harbour Commissioners*, organized a preliminary river-born survey of the Heronries on the river, in particular one at the mouth of Penpoll Creek. We recorded 12 nest sites, and about 20 Herons in attendance. Herons breed quite early in the year, in March or even February, so it is likely that our local birds are building and repairing their nest sites now. We have also accepted responsibility for an ongoing detailed study within the one kilometre grid square that covers both sides of the river from St. Winnow Point south.

These surveys will continue throughout the year, and the results will be analysed and collated by the *British Trust For Ornithology*.

#### River Clean-Ups

In the late autumn David Johns organised a 'canoe clean up' of the river using his *Encounter Cornwall* fleet of canoes. A group of keen volunteers recovered 40 bin liners full of discarded refuse from the shoreline. Most of the debris consists of soft drinks bottles, beer cans, supermarket bags, discarded fishing line, etc., some of which can cause fatalities among the bird population.

He hopes to repeat this event early in the spring.

### Bathing Water News from the Environment Agency

Bathing waters in England and Wales now have stricter water quality targets to achieve by 2015 under the revised Bathing Water Directive.

It poses a number of challenges for local communities, government and non-government organisations. As well as improving water quality there is a much stronger emphasis on beach management and providing more information to the public.

Our aim, which you can help us with, is to have all bathing waters passing the new standards in 2015. This poses a number of challenges for all concerned as some of the problems are not easy to solve. We have been working for a number of years in and around key bathing water areas detecting and eradicating pollution. However, there is still more work to do if we are to raise the standard of bathing water quality even further.

On Saturday 9th March, *The Environment Agency, Cornwall Council* and *Friends of the Fowey Estuary* will be hosting an event from 10am – 3pm at Fowey Town Hall to talk about Readymoney Cove and the revised Bathing Water Directive.

The day will involve displays and activities to raise awareness of bathing water quality at Readymoney Cove and how everyone can play their part to make a difference. The day is free of charge and everyone is welcome. Look out for posters and leaflets coming soon. We look forward to seeing you there!

#### TWO VILLAGE CHRISTMAS TREES

Anyone who looked closely at the church's Christmas tree may well have wondered who had made the dozens of beautifully crafted soft decorations.

The London designer, Rachael Bromley, who created the exquisite model of St Sampson's church, and who feels such a strong affinity to Golant, is the craftswoman.

She made the first batch in 2011, as the church flowers at Christmas "always look spectacular" and she felt the tree looked "a bit forlorn", and has added many more of her imaginative decorations this year. Rachael started designing & sewing when she and Carl (and dogs!) were down in September, cutting her patterns from a dog food box, as that is all she had to hand at the time!

Rachael, having a keen eye for interesting detail, writes: "I managed to source some Cornish tartan ribbon for the snowman scarves, and had some Golant ribbon woven for the santas."

As a top designer, she has many suppliers to source the felt and trim, and adds "The diamanté crystal collars on the reindeer is a bit of left-over swaroski crystal from one of the outfits we did for the fashion section of the Olympic



Games closing ceremony for a designer called Christopher Kane. It is £80 a metre, but I did keep a few scraps!"

Rachael explains that Ruth kindly supplied some old pillows with which to stuff the big round balls, which was done "after a visit to the pub, and seemed much less daunting after a few beers!"

She concludes- "I think for this year I might just buy some tinsel, although I did think a few angels, possibly an elf or two, some bells maybe....might need a bigger tree!"



The Village Green

A few years ago, Annie & Alan Barker had the idea of raising a Christmas tree on the village green during the festive period. The idea took off and there has been a tree on the green ever since, apart from one year, I think.

Up until this year the tree, lights, cable etc have been scrounged or borrowed from willing villagers, but it was decided earlier in 2012 that perhaps the whole affair should be put on a more stable footing, and to this end some monies were raised towards providing the equipment. An application for some funding was made to the Parish Council, and the members were very generous in passing sufficient funds to pay for the lights. Other items of equipment purchased were some cabling & cable protector to cross the entrance to the car park.

It was initially thought that it would be necessary to buy a tree, but Ian & Sarah Laughton kindly donated the last suitable tree from Reay's garden, and this was duly erected a couple of weeks before Christmas by a small working party. The lights, all 900 of them, were festooned around the tree and the cable laid into Ian & Sarah's garage.

My personal view is that the tree looked very good. It was just a shame that the scheduled evening of Songs & Carols around the tree was plagued with heavy rain, but a hardy group still carried on under the covered patio outside the pub.

We may have identified a tree for next year, and hope that it will be suitable. If not, we may have to purchase one, though if anybody has a Christmas tree in their garden which they need moving next December, please let us know. We will try to raise a few more funds this year to make it possible.

Grateful thanks must go to Ian & Sarah who allowed us the use of their electricity, especially as they were not around to see the tree. Also thanks to Pete Edwards, Roger Page & Stuart Young for their assistance in digging it up and then erecting it. Some ingenuity had to be used!

In the picture, the left-hand end of the building looks like a single storey addon, which subsequently became the shop part of the house with the second door




and shop window, and was made full height. (See Ed's note



#### **GOLANT OIL BUYERS**

Rain, rain, rain. Doesn't it take forever to dry things out?

With all this rain, and now some winterish temperatures as well, keeping warm & dry just takes ever more energy.

If you use oil to drive your heating, now might be the moment to look at trying to keep down the costs. In Golant we have a village oil buyers group that purchases oil in bulk and thus buy at better prices than any one individual can. Average oil price is currently about 61p per litre, and looks as though it might be heading up again. This time last year it was around 58p. Coincidentally, a saving of about 3p per litre is usually what we manage to achieve, so now is the moment to freeze your oil costs rather than your toes and fingers!

The system works very simply. When people need oil they let me know, and I contact the group by email or phone to collect all the orders. We place an order and that's it. Each household has its own account with the supplier, so pays direct as normal. The more we buy, and the more households we cover, the better the deal we can get. Currently, there are about 25 of us in the scheme, but it would be good to have more.

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# GOLANT BOAT OWNERS' ASSOCIATION (Boatwatch)

#### **Timely Reminders:**

I know it is early in the season and probably too soon for most of us to even think about the boating season to come, but even now, in darkest January, we have already suffered ongoing crime in our area, just down the river at Penmarlam! So continued vigilance is still necessary, even in the winter months!

#### **Quiz Question:**

When the Police recover an outboard engine (presumed to be stolen) from a third party (i.e. a suspected criminal).... who eventually gets the engine if the rightful owner cannot provide evidence of ownership?

#### Answer:

The suspected criminal! And the lesson here is obvious: You must be able to prove ownership, or the goods stay with the current holder, even if that is a suspected criminal!

#### So how do you prove ownership?

- 1. Record the all important serial number from your engine (and know where to find it if required).
- 2. Photograph your boat and engine and keep the photographs on file.
- 3. Mark your boat and engine with your identity (your name or postcode or telephone number) somewhere for the Police to find it. Use a special security marker if you have one or see me.
- 4. Replace your outboard cover with one of the loose covers marked up with Police branding. (Linda Thomas, our local PCSO, can let you know how to obtain these).

#### **GOLANT QUAY USERS' ASSOCIATION**

I can report that *South West Water* are going to start work to replace the outfall pipe on 1<sup>st</sup> March with completion by 31<sup>st</sup> March, the Easter weekend.

The work will involve digging alongside the existing pipe from a trackway they will install across the mud. The work will be done in sections as they have to concrete over each length as they install it. The digger obviously has to come out of the Pill every evening and they can only really work in Spring tides when the water goes out sufficiently to allow access.

They plan to 'hire' some car park spaces for storage and utilise the slipway by the *Rowing Club* to get in and out of the Pill. They can only work when there is no water below the bridge and 'boaters' can only use this area when there is water in, so a conflict shouldn't occur (famous last words!!). *SWW* will buoy anything that they have to leave out above normal ground level, like trench side forms.

I have asked that when they finish that they leave the stream running straight out to the river instead of the meandering course we currently have.

There is also a possibility that they will replace the new exposed pipe that goes across the stream just north of the bridge, because they fear it will become brittle in time. This would involve a few frape positions being temporarily removed, and I will keep those members affected informed if this work proceeds.

SWW have also informed us that they have approved £50k worth of work for 'sewer rehabilitation' – whatever that is – along the foreshore to 'better protect the pump station and that work should also start in March/April'. No other information is yet available for that work yet but it looks as though we will have more disruption in the village in the Spring.

Otherwise there is no other news, but do look forward to a dry and sunny spring, as optimism must prevail.

Others reflect on the laments of those who have ventured to other countries to find work (cousin jacks) & who still long to see their families & beloved duchy again. Fathers still sing in male voiced choirs, friends & relatives sing after boat & gig races & then down at the pub! But, sadly, singing is heard less these days across the duchy; the group lament the loss of these powerful reminders about the past life of the Cornish.

The programme is not yet available but I'm hoping that established favourites such as *Lamorna* and *Trelawney* will be included. Modern Cornish composers/poets feature in their repertoire particularly Harry 'Safari' Glasson. There may be some gentle risqué humour, perhaps, in some songs like *The Romance of Derby & Joan* and *Lady Chatterley*.

I thoroughly enjoyed hearing the group sing a few months ago in the pub at the village of Devoran, where I grew up. I was especially moved by a song about the loss of the Mousehole lifeboat in 1981, *Solomon Browne*, which expresses so well the grief & resilience shown within that little community.

John Jenkin needs no introduction to most because he lived in Golant for over twenty years & comes back for various village events. He is regarded as '...one of our great contemporary Cornishmen...' In 2012 he made two sets of CDs. One was called *Crowst Time Tales* & he will be telling one of those stories on **February 16th.** 

So, come along for a great entertaining evening! It will start at **7.30pm. Tickets (£7.50)** on sale at the door or from Penny White (01726 832315). Drinks & refreshments will be available. Also, CDs of both *The Oggymen* and *John Jenkin* will be on sale.

For those of you still wondering what Wassailing is all about, it is an old custom, traditionally performed on Twelfth Night, but hey, we like to be a bit different in Golant, and find New Year's Day as good a time as any!

It's all about encouraging new life and the New Year. The idea is to encourage the apple trees by feeding the roots of the master tree in the orchard with some of last year's cider (my dog was very puzzled by what the Jolly Green Man was 'sprinkling' on the base of the tree and had to go to 'inspect'!); then to encourage the birds who look after the trees by eating the



insects, we leave them some cider-enhanced toast, before chanting an *encouraging* rhyme.

#### St Sampson Parish Council

The Parish Council meetings at the beginning of December and January, and the end of January meeting were dominated by Cornwall Council's decision to cease running the public toilets. The Parish Council has requested that the freehold of the car park be given to the Parish Council under the transfer of assets scheme, and also requested the freehold of the public toilets. Such an arrangement might make it possible to run the disabled toilet while leasing out the rest of the building for storage. We feel that the freehold of the car park is an essential prerequisite, as without the certainty of this income it would not be feasible to maintain the toilet facility.

There are still many uncertainties, and, of course, Cornwall Council has to examine the car park lease before it will make a decision, but we hope to have a response before our February meeting. This will be on Tuesday 26th February, at 7.15 pm, and I urge villagers who would like to express their views to come along then.

We shall allow half an hour for the public participation, but I must stress that once the council meeting begins the public cannot take further part in the discussion. On the one hand it is desirable to maintain a public convenience, but on the other hand any solution must be affordable and sustainable in the long term. My thanks to Cllr Hunter for pursuing this matter with Cornwall Council.

I am pleased to report that *Highways* have finally cut the *Hybadore* hedge, and cleared most of the drains, but we are all aware of the parlous state of our roads. Please do report the potholes yourselves – there is a County Council website from which you can go to *Highways* and make your report. Weight of numbers seems to count!

The Parish Council sent in its response to the appeal for wind turbines at *South Torfrey Farm*, and my thanks to Richard Strode especially, and Stuart Young and Barry Campbell-Taylor for their help with this. Your council also resolved to repair the 'wobbly walk' (I have no idea what the correct term should be!) and the climbing rope in the playground, and we are also looking at either replacing the chippings or buying more rubber mat — whichever is the most cost effective.

#### News from St Sampson's Church

Usually the congregation on the Sunday after Christmas is small but not so this time! At the morning service on December 30th, Kay Taylor and her younger son, Hugh, were welcomed into the Church by receiving Holy Baptism and were supported by a large group of family and friends. It really was an uplifting way to end 2012! A lively party followed in the village hall- a fitting way to celebrate a special occasion with family & friends.

A few people have asked why the crib was not taken down together with the tree, candelabra and so on. The arrival of the three kings is not celebrated until *Epiphany* (January 6th); the figures of the kings are not placed in the crib until that day. Traditionally the crib is dismantled at *Candlemas* (February 2nd).

The current Electoral Roll will be annulled in this quarter; this happens in all C of E churches every six years. All people in our parish who are on the present list will be contacted and invited to appear on the new roll. Please be sure to return the form promptly!



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#### **UNCLE JOHN'S GARDEN PATCH**

#### Gardening Tips For February & March

The Waswailing experience on New Years Day was well attended, and those present entered into the spirit of the occasion (helped no doubt by the liberal consumption of fine mulled cider supplied by the owners of the orchards we visited). This resulted in us making enough noise to frighten any evil spirits back to England, where they no doubt came from!! So, all being well, this year's crop should be a brave brammer.

I don't know about you, but I am getting just a mite tired of getting wet. I despair of ever being able to get any ground turned over without it clagging up the shovel, and this leads nicely into the second part of growing onions.

Onions require ground that has been dug deeply and given a good dressing of compost for many seasons. They are one of the very few crops that can be grown on the same site year after year, and not seem to suffer for it. Get a good tilth, and put the rows about 18 inches apart, with the onions about 6 inches between in the rows. Keep the soil around the onions firm because they don't like their roots being disturbed. The onion has an amazing root system, and for its size it is one of the deepest rooted vegetables, so don't hoe too close; better to hand weed. Keep well watered and give plenty of food as they are a hungry crop.

Time to get the seed potatoes set out in trays to sprout, making sure they are well away from any frosts. Egg trays are ideal to set them out in, sitting with their eyes facing upwards so they can put out their cheens. Make sure they are placed in good light, not sunlight, so the cheens are not long and spindly.

Try also a few earlies grown in a large tub or dustbin set up in the greenhouse, for a first digging of potatoes before any grown outside.

#### Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

Another winter month is nearly here, and now the evenings should be getting lighter. We still have some winter left before the better weather starts.

Here is a recipe for a Valentine's Day dinner, either as a starter for four people or a bigger portion main course size for two.

Alastair and Anita, who are friends of Vilma & Robert, and great supporters of all activities in Golant, have sent this recipe.

#### **SEA TROUT BALLOTINE**

#### **Ingredients**

2x200g/7oz Sea Trout Fillets (skin removed)

About 50g/20z finely chopped mixed fresh Herbs such as Parsley, Tarragon & Mint, or even Oregano, Coriander & Basil (not all of them, but a selection of your choice)

2 Gelatine Leaves, soaked in cold water till soft, then drained

Seasoning

#### Method

- 1. Place the trout fillets skinned side up and head to tail, side by side on a tray. Lightly season.
- 2. Press the herbs onto each fillet.
- 3. Pressed the squeezed out gelatine onto one of the fillets, then place the other fillet on top so that both are still head to tail.
- 4. Roll the combined fillets up.
- 5. Using cling film, roll the fillets into a tight sausage shape and twist the ends to seal tightly.
- 6. Poach gently in a pan of boiling water for 15 minutes, then drain and leave to chill overnight.
- 7. Remove the cling film from the ballotine, cut into thickish slices, and serve.

As a starter, all that is needed is some thinly sliced bread and butter and a slice of lemon. As a main course, small potatoes and a salad or asparagus make a good accompaniment.

Cook's tip: Fillets should be fairly thin or you will find them very difficult to roll up!

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
