There are a number of elements that go towards making a good 'village' pantomime. These include topical local and national issues, men dressed as women, allusions to local residents, audience participation as well as the casts' ability to forget their lines. Simon Funnell's fast moving, colourful and humorous production of 'Sleeping Beauty' by the *Golant Very Amateur Dramatic Society* had all of these in abundance.

With the audience involved from the first song (Oh no they didn't! Oh yes they did!) the plot stuck to the traditional story of Sleeping Beauty, but with the added features of both Ruth Varco as Joan the Banker (yes I said Banker!), who still wanted her annual bonus, and Mike Harris with David Johns as George and Ron, railway workers who only worked at night and made a lot of noise when sand blasting the bridge over the Pill. These latter two had a relationship with The Dragon, Graham (who could that be?).

Beauty's parents were Simon as King Richard of Golantia and a sensationally dressed and made up Greg White as Queen Judy (well there's a surprise). So good was Greg's costume, Simon now has 'dress envy'.

Barry Campbell-Taylor was the King's Butler but he spent some time trying to get the King to 'corpse'. Muddles, the servant, Lucien Campbell-Taylor, was bumblingly inefficient while Nelly the nurse-maid, Anne-Marie Downes, lusted after him, while at the same time being motherly towards Beauty.

Princess Beauty, Lucy Palmer, lived up to her name with a voice to match. Her duet with Fifi the French Maid, Fiona Westaway, who excited the male audience, was a joy. Beauty has to be woken by a kiss from a Handsome Prince, Harry, who had found Golantia with the aid of his father King Charles of Cornovia. Becky Downes and John Jenkin admirably filled these parts.

The Royal Banquet was to be provided by the two Royal Cooks, Paddy and Vilma playing themselves, as soon as they had dealt with the peasants at the Thursday Kitchen. Some of the funniest gaffes came from Vilma remembering when to say "exactly", "rubbish" or "duck fat".



Some of you have commented on the fact that the wires outside the village hall are still sheathed. Western Power was informed when the roof was finished but no action was taken. Chasing the company up in February I was told that they were unable to remove the shrouding as the conductor cable is too close to the building and the supply will be moved and renewed under EFQCR (Electricity, Safety, Quality and Continuity Regulations) in the near future. This is a rolling programme and we have not been forgotten. So watch this space!

It was good to see our new tables used for the first time at the Race Evening and to know that our drinks were secure. Also, thank you to Paddy Shelley for making new matching cloths for the trestle tables.

Since their return, the Thursday Kitchen has been well supported and as always Paddy and Vilma are producing lovely meals at such a reasonable cost. Already, they have given a donation of £100 towards the new windows.

Tom Bliss in *Tales of Time and Tide* proved a popular entertainer with some very interesting facts about various happenings at sea from the coordination of the first Lifeboat service by Sir William Hillary in 1824, the bravery of Grace Darling to the salvage efforts from MSC Napoli, all interspersed with his own musical compositions.

It has been agreed in principle to refurbish the toilets. The damp will

be dealt with and insulation installed, making them much more pleasant to use.

Our AGM is to be held on **Tuesday 28**th **April** at **7.30pm** followed by a committee meeting. Please do come and raise questions, offer suggestions and just listen to our plans for the future. New committee members would always be welcome but we promise there will be no pressure put on anyone attending.

Saturday 23rd May is the day of our Plant and Book Sale to be held in the Village Hall from 11.30am-1.30pm. This is a change of timing so that we can serve bread and soup lunches while you browse the books and plants.

The death of Diana Luck, following on so soon after the celebrations for her reaching the age of ninety last November, affected the emotions of a vast number of relatives and friends across the Duchy and beyond.

On the morning of February 26th, in a private service, her family laid her body to rest in the graveyard at St Sampson's Church. Diana's late husband, George, was a warden at the church for many years and Diana had worshipped there regularly for over 60 years. The service which followed in the afternoon was a true *Thanksgiving* for an extraordinary life. The church was packed to capacity with people covering every age range – a tribute in itself to Diana's amazing ability to communicate with everyone around her. It was a joyful occasion helped in part by her inspired choice of hymns which the congregation sang so enthusiastically!

The tributes from a nephew, Jonathan David, her daughter, Liz, and sons, Adam & Ben, conjured up a true picture of a very unique human being with both faults and strengths. Liz had collected over sixty adjectives which described her mother including: indomitable, funny, brave, inspiring, natural, spontaneous, outspoken, opinionated and tricky, energetic, gregarious, racy, extravagant, beautiful, elegant, steadfast, wayward, unpredictable, capricious and wilful.......

To the end, Diana was excited by '...Constant Change and the Joy of New- new people, new ideas, Channel 4 News, someone bursting into the kitchen...changing weather, changing moods, changing the garden...always changing with the ebb and flow of the tides...'

The untitled poem which follows was found after her death and was read by her grandson, Bevil, at the service. For many it conjures up a picture of a special lady '...who was so outrageously alive...' for everyone she met.

cies of birds, many having improbable names; Chimney year, we could organise a Toad Patrol to shepherd them Swift, Red Flanked Bluetail, Scarlet Bluefinch, Short Toed Lark, across safely. Ortholian Bunting, Woodchat Shrike, Sub-Alpine Warbler and the Scaup. From my parked car at Fowey I observed a Redwing. These over-wintering birds are normally only seen from a distance, in large flocks. The bird I saw, on its own and only 3 feet away, was stunningly beautiful; similar to a Thrush but with a paler breast and with dark bars rather than spots. Its other distinguishing features are russet patches under the wings and fabulous Cleopatra-like eye markings. There may still be a few birds which have not returned to Scandinavia, so keep a look out.

Several sightings were made in Golant, in early February, of a Swallow. As previously reported, many swallows stayed behind this winter, surviving on beach insects. Sadly though, all these birds are reported to have perished during the cold snap.

The recently published results of the RSPB Birdwatch survey made interesting reading. Fascinatingly, the Long Tailed Tit is being increasingly seen in gardens throughout the country. Is this a species adapting to take advantage of a new and easy food source? Many Golantians have also The webmaster can be contacted in any of the following ways: noticed a new boldness about these lovely creatures.

Did anyone else witness the Golant Toad migration? During the evening of Thursday 19th March, hundreds of toads crossed Water Lane, went downhill & then up Tinney's

driveway, presumably heading for the Pond there.



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St Sampson Parish Council

Unfortunately, I was unable to be at the March Parish Council Meeting as I had to attend a family funeral in Sussex on that day, but Cllr Fletcher most ably chaired this meeting and clearly proved that 'brevity is the soul of wit' by completing business in record time. I summarise both meetings below.

The eco-home at the Vineyard received planning permission in early February, and the Parish Council also agreed in principle to an affordable home on Park and Constable, although final approval would depend on the details of the plans, exact location and so on.

The playground needs to be further up-dated, and additional quotations are being obtained in the hope that we can purchase a child's swing and a modern see-saw. The Council is also researching various safe surfaces, as the maintenance costs associated with wood-chippings are very high. The post at the entrance to the green will be replaced shortly.

The Car Park Warden for 2009 will be Lucien Campbell -Taylor, and Mrs Judith Campbell-Taylor will provide cover when Lucien is unable to be on duty.

South West Water have re-laid the cover over the junction of the down-pipe on Church Hill, and action has been promised by their contractors on the acoustic cover for the pumping station.

Sue Reardon deserves heartfelt thanks as all her hard work has at last been rewarded: the Upper Downs Path has now been officially adopted as a footpath. This now gives Golant a most attractive circular walk, and we do encourage you to use it - do not be afraid to carry a pruning knife to help keep both paths clear! (Or is that against Health and Safety rules? Probably.)

From your County Councillor

It was a short-lived association with the Borough Council for me, but I learned a huge amount about what goes on at District level. I have to write this well in advance of the issue date, so at the time of writing Restormel in still in being, but on 1st April the new unitary council for Cornwall takes over.

I do want to let you know, however, that Restormel's offices will continue to operate for the time being just as they are, so anyone can call in the same way, either in person or by phone, as they would have in the past. We will see change over time, and you will be kept informed of what is going on.

I am writing this during the week of glorious weather, and thoughts are turning to spring; the daffodils and primroses are abundant. The buds on the trees are appearing, and I am reminded of the wonderful Foxglove Tree at the Fowey Library. It is always covered in beautiful lilac flowers in the spring whilst developing its huge fan-shaped leaves. Perhaps you will have noticed it if you are a regular user of the Library.

Which leads me on to say that the One Stop Shop in Fowey Library is up and running, and the staff are fully trained to help with problems or information about the new authority. It is well worth a visit to see the smart new set up. The very good news, and as a result of the siting of the One Stop here in Fowey, is that the Library will now be open Monday to Friday all day and Saturday until midday. The opening hours will be tried from 1st April until

September initially, and if it is found that there are sufficient visitors using the facility, these opening hours will be continued. It is the old adage 'Use it or lose it', and so hopefully more people will be encouraged to visit the library.

The Implementation Executive will continue to be the decision making Committee of the new Cornwall Council until the elections on 4th June, at which time the new 123 elected members of the Council will take over. So I am no longer your Borough Councillor, but I do remain a County Councillor until four days after the election. I shall stand for election on 4th June for the new Council, but am sure to find some stiff opposition.





Women's World Day of Prayer

This year's International and Interdenominational Women's World Day of Prayer was held at St Fimbarrus Church, Fowey on Friday 6th March. The new time of 10.30am enabled those with young children to attend for whom the afternoon involves collecting children from school etc. In all, 52 ladies attended the service.

It was the Christian women of Papua New Guinea who prepared this year's service and was entitled 'In Christ there are many members yet one body'.

As people arrived at the Church scenes of different aspects of life in Papua New Guinea were being shown on a screen. Papua New Guinea has been an independent state since 1975 but still remains part of the Commonwealth. It is situated north of Australia, has a population of 5.8 million and has 3 official languages: English, Pidgin and Motu. The beautiful warm tropical climate lush vegetation mean that many families are self sufficient. However, this idyll has been marred by inter tribal conflict.

The ladies of St Fimbarrus had prepared a table showing artefacts, fruit and vegetables and a flag from Papua New Guinea. It was good to see two handmade 'bilums'. A bilum is a brightly coloured, knitted bag which the women of Papua New Guinea use to carry their babies, transport wood or to hold vegetables etc. Its versatility is remarkable.

The service was led by Naomi de Grey-Warter and participants from Fowey and Golant were actively involved as welcomers, readers etc. The service was a mixture of prayers, readings and hymns uniting different denominations, the latter being such an important aspect of the Women's Day of Prayer service. Gwen and Maria's stories were particularly poignant. Both had seen terrible tribal conflicts (Gwen's was based on evidence told by a RC nun) but it was the women of Papua New Guinea who secured peace. Eight hundred women from different languages, traditions and church denominations united to risk their lives in visiting rebel forces in the bush. This became the first meeting of peace talks which, after eight years of unsuccessful attempts by the government to find solutions, finally led to peace.

Susie Leafe, well known to Parishioners in Fowey and who works for FLAME, which is Family Life and Marriage Education, had kindly agreed to be the speaker on this occasion.

Susie, in her address, acknowledged the help given to her by Di and Stuart Hayes who had lived in Papua New Guinea and given her an insight into that beautiful country

but had been troubled by these clashes. Susie showed a 'fighting stick' with a caraway claw at the end of this traditional weapon used in battle. Now, other more modern weapons are available. Susie encouraged us not to be judgemental explaining that in Western Societies there are often more subtle conflicts. She had experience of teaching in a girl's school where 'cliques' could be hurtful to others. Susie reminded us that everyone had skills whether it be in cooking, IT, being a giver or a server and it is important to use these skills in a positive way. Rejoice with a friend when they are feeling happy and be sensitive to their needs when they are saddened. Referring to the fighting stick, Susie reminded us that in Lent and leading up to Good Friday Jesus took up his fighting stick at the Passion but overcame it on Easter Sunday.

On a book mark given to all there is a quote from Romans 12 v 1-13:

"Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we who are many form one body and each member belongs to all the others."

Thank you to all who helped to organised and took part in the service. I am sure we will all remember Beth Gillespie singing so beautifully her solo of an original hymn Islands and mountains, sunshine and breeze', written by the women of Papua New Guinea especially for this service. Thank you, also, to Mike Teague who played the organ for us.

4 thsp chopped flat parsley
plain flour
salt & pepper to taste
oil for frying

Cook and mash potatoes.

Mix with egg, onion, parsley and salt and pepper. Form into flat circular patties and coat with flour. Fry in hot oil until golden brown- can be reheated in the oven

Makes 12 large or 30 small (the size seen at the lunch)

FOWEY ESTUARY NEWS

If you go down to the woods today.....

You'll find that we've been busy maintaining parts of the Hall Walk Wood (or Polruan Wood).

The Harbour Commissioners own and manage just over six hectares of woodland bordering the estuary from Pont Pill to Polruan.

This woodland is made up largely of overgrown hazel coppice with standards and there are some oaks at the estuary edge. A large area of the woods was once cleared and used as allotments, but now overgrown, these woods form an important part of the largely wooded setting of the harbour, and the footpath that runs within the woods is a valued and well used local asset.

We have been clearing some tree casualties of the winter weather and snowfall and pruning away growth from the pathways. We have also been maintaining the glimpses of the wonderful estuary views from the benches, which I'm sure, are well used!

Next time you're in Hall Walk Wood, perhaps take an alternative route and discover the nature trail and information that lies along the lower part of the path to Cairn Beach.

It was a lovely sight to see signs of spring along the pathways, the bright yellow of the lesser celandines and the delicate primroses bringing a splash of colour to the verges, and the wonderful golden tassels of hazel catkins opening to release their pollen to the wind.

Church Work

I would think that many of you will have now seen our Church clothed in orange plastic sheeting, covering the scaffolding on the Tower and East wall.

The reason for this is the consequences of a quinquennial inspection by Diocese architects, as is required by all Churches.

Our report found that many years ago, the Tower and East wall were re-pointed with 'modern' mortar, a hard product that cracks with age, and, in our case, allowed rainwater to permeate through the stone, causing internal damp.

Now we are acting to remove this mortar and replace it with a lime-based product which stretches and will not crack. This will ensure the long term protection of the building for future generations.

I would like to acknowledge the hard work of Churchwarden Carol White who has spent endless time and energy preparing bids for grants from various bodies to help towards the repairs, as well as negotiating with the architects and builders.

When visiting the Church please be aware that it is **a** building site and every care must be exercised.

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Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

Jacky Fletcher suggested this recipe. It can be made in advance & cooked when required. It is also suitable for freezing, which makes it a useful recipe over a busy Easter for family visiting, or for any unexpected guests.

SALMON & BROCCOLI LASAGNE (Serves 4)

225g (80z) Broccoli (trimmed) 4×175g (4×60z) Salmon Fillets 600ml (1pint) Skimmed Milk 115g (40z) Chestnut Mushrooms (sliced) 50g (20z) low fat Cheddar Cheese (grated) 225g (80z) no-cook Lasagne 2tsp Dijon Mustard
2tsp Vegetable Bouillon Stock Powder
2tbsp Cornflour
1tbsp chopped fresh Dill
1tbsp chopped fresh Parsley
Salt & freshly ground black pepper

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 190°C/375°F/Gas Mark 5.
- 2. Cook the broccoli in boiling salted water, drain and set aside.
- 3. Place the salmon in a saucepan with the milk & cook gently for 5-6 mins. Allow to cool, then, reserving the milk, lift the fish onto a plate & flake, removing all skin and bones.
- 4. Reheat the milk adding the mustard & stock powder to the saucepan. Add a little cold water to the cornflour & mix to a smooth paste. Add to the milk, stirring well to prevent any lumps forming.
- 5. Add the mushrooms & cheese and mix well. Simmer gently until the sauce is of a coating consistency. Adjust if necessary with a little extra milk or diluted cornflour. Stir in the herbs.
- 6. Place a thin layer of sauce in the bottom of an ovenproof dish. Cover with sheets of lasagne without overlapping. Add a layer of flaked fish & broccoli and continue layering, ending with the sauce.
- 7. Bake in the oven for 30-35 minutes until bubbling hot.
