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

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#### **GOLANT BIRDLIFE**

The Estuary has had a rather exciting visitor recently; reliable sightings have been made of a *Little Auk* feeding in and around the Pill. This is a small bird, the size of a starling. It is black above and white below with dark under wings showing in flight. It has a black stubby bill, a short neck and tail and flies with very fast whirring wingbeats low over the sea. Generally they winter in the extreme North Atlantic, but autumn gales can send the small crustaceans that they eat to depths beyond their reach. Starvation, tide and high winds drive the birds to range for food outside of their usual areas. Small numbers visit the waters around the UK returning to the Arctic to breed in early spring. Sightings in Cornwall are rare, and only one other Auk has been reported this season.

I was a little sceptical about the sighting until David Parry the Wildlife Artist, confirmed that he also had seen the bird. David remembered that last year, a Harbour Commissioner reported a dead Auk being found. David assured him that the bird couldn't possibly be a Little Auk and that he must be mistaken. The next morning, left on his doorstep was the evidence, in the form of the lifeless corpse of a Little Auk. Nothing is certain nowadays!

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Other recent visitors include Redstarts, Firecrests and the strikingly coloured Shell Ducks.

I really appreciate sighting reports from others and I can, if we are confident in our identification, include the information on my reports to the British Trust for Orni-thology.

<u>Tip</u>- Nigella seeds on the Bird Table encourage some interesting, normally very shy, species.

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#### St Sampson Parish Council

The Parish Council has met three times since the last edition of *The Pill*, and there have been several planning issues to be decided. As I wrote in the last edition, the council is anxious to support a small scheme of self-build affordable housing, and we are looking forward to receiving detailed proposals for our consideration.

The Parish Council has given the Village Hall  $\pounds$ 1,000 towards the roof, which we trust will help cope with the extra costs involved, and we also plan to increase the playground equipment once we can identify a suitable supplier.

I wrote to Colin Breed MP about a month ago regarding the sewage, as the down pipe by River House still smells, as also do the RBC units. He forwarded my missive to the chairman of SWW, but as yet there has been no response. I have also asked SWW to replace the present temporary (and disintegrating) acoustic cover over the pumps by the Gallery with a permanent cover, and to trim the area behind the pumping station.

Several of us in the village have badgered Highways to come and clear leaves on Church Hill and Water Lane. As I write this, I can report that Church Hill has been very well cleared, and I hope that work is about to start on Water Lane. Another area that has caused concern is the parking area on the Green, but I believe I have negotiated a satisfactory outcome with the houses whose building works have caused the disruption. We plan to scrape the area, and put down hard-core once the various building works are completed and winter is past!

As many of you will know, there has been a move to transfer some local assets back to town and parish councils from Restormel, prior to the formation of One Cornwall. We have put forward a Business Plan for the car park, stressing its importance for the economy of the village (and many thanks to Richard Strode for much hard work), and

#### GOLANT BOAT OWNERS' ASSOCIATION (BOATWATCH)

A dinghy and a pair of oars (from another craft) were stolen recently but, fortunately, were found at Fowey.

A number of boats and equipment are retrieved each year by the Harbour Authority which have no names or means of identification. Many dinghies, for example, are not named. We ask all owners of boats of all sizes to mark them in some way. The sticky mooring labels are very helpful but not all people use them.

The Annual General Meeting has just taken place attended by a good turnout of members. In view of the problems experienced this year, ties between the Police, Harbour Office & GBOA have been strengthened further. All those who pay for mooring fees are to be invited to submit serial numbers of equipment and such information will be used by the police. Other systems are being set up to speed up communication. The possible purchase & use of CCTV cameras is to be investigated; the technological advance of these systems has leapt forward in recent years yet the prices have lowered substantially. Laurie Price, a member of the Safety Team, spoke about CCTV & the prevention of theft from the boats.

The new Team Leader, Sergeant John Capp & PC Phil Dingle are hopeful that a boat may become available soon for official police patrols in the estuary. Matt Hodson brought members up to date with harbour matters.

Suzanne Edwards, having completed five years of service as Secretary, resigned from her post. Robert Gore, for health reasons, resigned too. Both will be sorely missed for their skills and dedication.

The evening finished on a disappointing note; the pasties didn't arrive in time. They had been left at the CD Rowing Club and were delivered eventually at 10pm!

#### FOWEY ESTUARY NEWS

Laying up for winter often means lots of jobs to do but please remember to carry out any maintenance work in an environmentally friendly way.

When cleaning off old antifouling, prevent dust or scrapings leaching into the estuary or being dispersed by the wind, please collect scrapings and disperse of them as solid waste. Please remember to look after your own health when removing or applying anti-fouling and wear suitable protective equipment.

When antifouling has been re-applied, empty paint tins and used brushes may be disposed of at the hazardous waste facilities provided by the Harbour Commissioners.

Please do not allow the residues of cleaning products and other harmful liquids to enter the estuary. There are an increasing number of environmentally friendly cleaning products available and these should be used wherever possible.

A receptacle for waste oil and oily bilge water is available at Berrills Yard, and for disposal of larger quantities a facility is provided at Brazen Island by arrangement with the Harbour Office. Old batteries may also be disposed of at Berrills Yard or Brazen Island. Out of date pyrotechnics may be disposed of via the Harbour Office.

Further environmental guidance for boat users can be obtained from the Harbour Office. You can also find out about the Royal Yachting Association (RYA) initiative 'The Green Blue'; the Harbour Commissioners support this project which encourages boat users to think about their impact on the environment.

#### News from St Sampson

Holding the *Thursday Kitchen* in the church whilst the roof of the village hall was repaired proved to be very successful and enjoyable. Paddy & Vilma skilfully selected recipes which made the management of plates and cutlery easy. I don't recall a single spillage! The little kitchen area helped and, of course, the heating system proved its worth when the weather turned chilly.

The service on Remembrance Day was especially poignant. A good sized congregation filed out to the war memorial where the names of the villagers who died in the two world wars were read out by Graham Vivian. The service in church included *Now that the guns have stopped,* movingly and beautifully sung by Karen Hamnett, followed by the well-known *Benedictus,* both by Karl Jenkins, who had given his personal permission for the works to be adapted for our small choir.

Sadly, Karin Lloyd has had to resign from the choir because of continued ill-health. Karen was a founder member of the choir, the St Sampson Singers, formed about nineteen years ago by Alison Schwab who lived at *Hybedore*. I am pleased to say that David Johns & David Jenkinson have joined the choir and hope to sing with us whenever time allows.

We have been awarded a grant of  $\pm 5000$  by the Cornwall Historic Churches Trust for the tower project. The trust's members who came to view our case were especially impressed by the way the various problems with the fabric of the building have been approached in the last decade. We have not been after 'quick fixes'. All remedial work will have a long term effect—we hope! Actually, our award from the Trust was especially generous because of our planning methods; many thanks to them. Grants towards the project total  $\pm 18,000$  against a target of  $\pm 50,000$ ; two other applications are pending.

A cheque for  $\pm 350$  has been sent to Harvest for the Hungry as a result of the auction at the Harvest Supper.

The Christmas services are listed opposite. The candlelit carol service on Christmas Eve is usually attended by a full congregation (some arrive very early to get a good seat!) and wine is served afterwards. Many people then go down to sing carols around the village. This is done for the sheer enjoyment of singing & listening to the seasonal music; a collection is not taken. Please join them!

#### The Churchyard

The path in the lower churchyard has been laid and 99% of people are delighted with the result. Richard Berriman (Mobile 0787 0569030) showed his expertise with his digger, taking the turf off for use around the graves before fashioning the path. Meanwhile, John Kift & Alan Barker fitted a new granite step and then helped to lay all the turf. Pebbles were then spread along the whole path. It will not remain as such: grass seed has been sown (it may germinate!) and, in the spring, the path will be top dressed. The finished path will be well drained with a safe grip underfoot but will merge in with the surrounding grass. The little camellia by the steps with dainty pink flowers is called *Sparkling Burgundy*, a popular and reliable early variety. It has certainly gained the attention of everyone and reminds us that spring is not that far around the corner! There is a smaller specimen behind the box hedge around the Internment of Ashes area. *Elizabeth de Rothschild*, by the porch, is enormous again and the mass of buds promises a spectacular display in the New Year. *Mike Harris*

#### FERN DAYS

Since our last issue, we have had two interesting responses to our extract from John Jenkin's book on the history of *St Sampson's School Golant*, regarding the local children **carrying ferns** in October 1877 & 1878:-

\* The following letter came from Graham Hooper:

'Local (Golant) people will probably know much more about cider-making than the writer, but the following are extracts from a perpetual almanac in his possession. The punctuation etc, are all from the original. Words in italics are by the writer:"

<u>23rd September</u> Get home with thy brakes, *(bracken)* ere all summer be gone for tethered-up cattle to lie down upon.

Tusser- Five Hundred Points of Good Husbandry' 1573

<u>3rd October</u> If you gather not by hand (which is Tedious) Lay a truss of Straw *(or bracken?)* beneath the Tree and over that a blanket, discreetly shaking them down, not too many at a time, but often carrying them where they are to sweat: which should be on dry boarded floors, by no means on earth unless Straw *(or bracken?)* lie under. By ten or fourteen days they will have done sweating; but the greener they are when gathered, let them lie in longer. Cook– *The Making of Cider' 1678*

\* <u>Stuart Young</u> emailed The Golant Pill with the following:

"In your last issue you mentioned the collection of bracken and the possibility that it might be used for storing apples or other soft fruit. In Mary Wright's book 'Cornish Treats' (Alison Hodge, Penzance, 1986) she mentions that bracken was used to transport soft fruit from the orchards around Calstock and St Dominick to markets and jam factories. She also mentions that ferns were used to line baskets for collecting the Kea plums from the Cowling's Creek area on the Fal, and often the fruit was shaken directly into the boats and baskets from the overhanging trees. She notes that straw was not used for this purpose as it imparted a musty flavour to the fruit.

As Golant also produced soft fruits then it might have had the same use here."


Meanwhile, we found the following extract from the *West Briton* of October 22nd 1866, quoted by John Fenwick in his book 'The Parish of St Sampson', published in 1986:

"The patch of moor known as Golant Downs gave the (Raihvay) Company a good deal of trouble. It is claimed by the "inhabitants or the poor" of Golant, who exercise grazing rights over it and once a year upon an appointed day cut the fern for firing, each party carrying away their share upon their backs, as neither animals or carts are allowed to be used for that purpose. Hitherto the land has never been broken up, but proposals to that effect have recently been made. We believe Mr Rashleigh claims to be the owner of the fee. In consequence of so many rights being exercised over this piece of ground the Company had to serve notices upon everybody whose claims can be ascertained."

So, were the ferns used for cattle bedding, collecting, transporting & storing cider apples, or for 'firing' (presumably fuel)? Any other ideas?

### Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

Sue Strode suggested this recipe to me as a quick and easy way of making meringues.

#### MICROWAVE MERINGUES (makes about 2 dozen!)

1 Egg White 9 oz/250g Icing Sugar

- 1. Whisk the egg white and then fold the icing sugar into it to make a very stiff mix.
- 2. Using a teaspoon, shape into small balls and place well apart on a plate or shallow dish on which you have put a layer of greaseproof paper or baking parchment. (I only put 3 on to cook at a time, as they do spread considerably).
- 3. Cook at full power for 11/2 minutes. (If you have the silicon bun tins these can be used, and there would be no need to use the paper).

These meringues are ideal for using in any sweet where you break them up, such as Eton Mess, a combination of whipped double cream, strawberries and meringue.

Alternatively, pipe or spread them with cream and arrange fruit on top.
