Village Hall Committee

As we had mentioned previously, we had hoped to decorate the hall after the roof had been completed, but unfortunately due to illness this wasn't able to be done. It is planned that this will happen after the Pantomime and Easter.

However, we have been able to purchase new small tables. Thanks must go to Councillor Sally Bain for obtaining the grant so soon after our application.

We have been aware that the hall isn't always as warm as we would like it, and also, it seems as though the meter money does not seem to last that long. Our Treasurer, Sue Reardon, explained at a recent meeting that the meter had been altered but that was necessary because of the substantial loss from that source. After two quarters on the new rate we are only just breaking even. Our electricity bill is around £200 per quarter. That has caused us to investigate replacing the night storage heaters and to look at heat loss through the windows. Our Treasurer has obtained estimates to replace the windows, and reports that we are looking at a bill of about £2500 to do the job well. Any offers of donations/financial support would be gratefully received.

In the meantime, our thanks to Micky Morgan for his help when the hall pipes froze in January.

We welcome back the Thursday Kitchen starting on 12th February.

Thursday 26th February is a must for your diaries when Maurie and Gail Parsons have organised a race evening with a fish and chip supper. Booking is essential: 833475. Maurie and Gail will be giving the profit to support *The Golant Pill*.

Siobhan has spearheaded the regeneration of the Play Area on the Green. Supported by Estelle & Andrew van den Broek, Debbie Andrews and John East, she planned the buying and installation of the new equipment. Colin, who built their large catamaran which is moored out in the estuary, recently acquired a dilapidated *Mirror* dinghy. He has renovated the dinghy and plans to teach Megan how to sail during the summer months.

St Sampson Parish Council

At the January meeting PC Phil Dingle was able to report a welcome absence of crime in Golant, and the one burglary at Castledore had resulted in an arrest being made and many items of jewellery being recovered. Nevertheless, he encouraged us all to be vigilant and keep an eye out on neighbouring properties.

The possibility of an affordable home on Park and Constable was again discussed, and the Parish Council is anxious to ensure a sympathetic design and avoid setting a precedent which would lead to ribbon development. We are all aware of how important it is for young people to be able to live in the village, especially when they work here as well, but we also have a duty to respect the AONB nature of the village. The Parish Council is not, of course, the planning authority, and although we shall do our best to make what we believe to be the right decision for the village, it must be realised that, in the end, we are at the mercy of the planners. If some affordable housing goes ahead, and that was the majority view in the recent survey, then, as I have written before, we cannot guarantee absolutely that other less desirable development will not happen in the future.

During the recent spring tides the sewage system has smelt both at the top of the village and at the junction on Church Hill. I have written a strongly worded letter to the Head of Waste Water Services at South West Water, to the Chairman, and to Colin Breed MP.

The road by the Pill is now being re-laid, and I am sure the end result will be a considerable improvement, although boat-owners will find the kerb height somewhat daunting in places!

For the past two years we have kept the precept frozen, even though our expenses have continued to rise. Obviously we use some of the car park profits to subsidise costs – particularly the Parish Clerk's salary – but we must keep sufficient funds to re-surface the car park and replace the railings. Also, we feel that the best use of this surplus is to enable capital projects to proceed, and to this end we gave £1,000 towards the extra expenses incurred in the re-roofing of the Village Hall. We have already made a very substantial contribution to the playground, and we are now planning to buy a swing for tod-dlers (probably a further £2,500). We have also agreed to

buy new bunting for the Carnival as last year's rain left the original bunting looking very drab indeed.

We are asking for the Band D precept to rise from £13.99 to £14.60. I am sure we shall remain one of the four lowest precepts in Restormel, where the average precept last year was £26.12.

Finally, and most importantly, I am sad to report that Siobhan Harper wishes to resign as a councillor owing to the pressures of her work. Siobhan has master-minded the regeneration of the playground, and contributed great common sense and a warm understanding of the issues which face a small village. I thank her most sincerely for all she has done, and invite anyone interested in joining the Parish Council to contact the Parish Clerk, Barry Campbell-Taylor. Simon Funnell

News from St Sampson

Christmas was a very special time for large numbers at St Sampson. The Nine Lessons & Carols was great! My thanks to the choir for singing so beautifully, to Sheila Funnell for composing and arranging a number of items and, of course, the congregations who sang so lustily at the services. The flowers, which were truly stunning, drew many appreciative comments; many thanks to our flower arrangers. The Christingle service was very well attended; the collection of £60 was sent to the Children's Society.

The repairs to the tower have been boosted considerably by a grant of £25,000 from Sita, the waste disposal company. It is extremely generous of them. There is a slight snag: the rules laid down by H M Treasury mean that we have to give back 10% to Sita. Am I missing something?! The total of grants now stands at £45,500. We have two more requests in the pipeline though the results will be more modest, if successful.

As the estimates are a year old, we are now awaiting the builders to compile new prices. Work must start before the end of March.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 25th when the 6pm service will be taken by the Revd James Funnell, the brother of Simon. He has already been helping us as organist.

Mothering Sunday is on March 22nd. We hope that many families will come along to celebrate on that day.

John East has just finished essential repairs to the stepped wooden platform on which the altar stands in the north aisle. The whole structure merely stands on various piles of stones so a great deal of remedial work on the main structure was required. Thanks, again, John!

It is a great advantage if any gifts from taxpayers, no matter how small the amount, are 'gift aided'. This entails a very short declaration – name and address. We were able to claim back just over £2200 last year which has paid our insurance premium with a little over going to the Fabric fund.

We have reached the end of yet another financial year and the Parochial Church Council has acknowledged the marvellous work of our treasurer, Penny White, greatly assisted by Greg. What a team! The accounts are now in the hands of the auditor.

Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

Shrove Tuesday (Pancake Day) falls at the end of February this year. It was the day when foods such as butter and eggs were used up before Lent. Usually it was a light-hearted day with Pancake Races run in many an English village. My source writes that in Olney, Bucks, the 'prize' was a kiss from the Vicar!!

PANCAKES (makes about 8)

30z/75g plain flour ½ teaspoon salt 3 eggs ½ pint/275-300ml milk 10z/25g melted butter + extra for cooking

- 1. Sift the flour & salt into a large bowl & whisk in the eggs one by one. Add the milk a little at a time, beating thoroughly until the batter is free from lumps. Just before cooking, stir in the cooled, melted butter.
- 2. Use an 8"/20cm frying pan, and for each pancake grease it lightly with butter. Heat until the fat just begins to smoke. Pour about 3 tbsp of the batter (rough guide) into the centre of the pan and quickly tilt to & fro to spread the batter evenly. Cook over a high heat for about one minute until the pancake has just set.
- 3. Toss the pancake (or for the faint-hearted, turn it over carefully with a palette knife & spatula) and cook for about another minute until it is golden brown underneath. For the traditional pancake, squeeze fresh lemon juice over each, sprinkle with sugar and roll up.

For <u>Classic Crêpes Suzette</u>, fold each pancakes in half and then in half again to make a triangular shape. Arrange in a dish.

For the **sauce**:

5fl ozs/150ml orange juice, either fresh or from a carton

Zest of one medium orange

3thsp Grand Marnier, Cointreau or Brandy (optional, but not in the Dunley house!!) 20z/50g butter

- 1. Put all ingredients into a pan & heat together to reduce the liquid.
- 2. Pour over the pancakes, and before serving, heat in an oven or microwave. This is successful even when made the day before. *Paddy S.*


