I hope that you are taking plenty of pictures of our area for possible inclusion in a calendar if we are able to go ahead with that idea. I must admit that I haven't taken enough yet.

This paragraph is not begging for donations though, of course, they are always very helpful! I have had conversations with people who think that it costs a few pence to print The Golant Pill. When we printed the first issues using inkjet printers, Robert Dunley and Gillie ended up each time with bags each containing a dozen or more empty cartridges. We do not change cartridges very often with the laser printer, it prints both sides of each sheet and the quality is so superior to inkjet. The last issue cost £1 per copy!! That's why we vary the number of pages and the amount of photographs each time. We always plan some black only pages 'back to back' and use 'Grayscale' printing which uses less toner. We shop on the internet for the best prices for toner cartridges. The carnival issue will probably be more expensive because we shall have more photographs; this issue has less. It's a question of balance. We did obtain quotations from printers last year and over £1 per copy was quoted for black & white only. Our finances are still satisfactory partly because advertising rates were increased slightly- all the more reason to support our advertisers, a few of whom are new this time.

Jimmy Fisher has kindly lent us two old postcards and a photo of Golant Halt. We have printed one of his postcards on page 12. It was certainly a different village eighty years ago. I plan to use the other card and the photo in a future issue.

Let's hope the weather improves and we bathe in sunshine for much of the summer ahead.



Village Hall Committee Report

October 6th is a red letter day in the life of the village hall as this is the day when the builder is due to start the new roof, barring any unforeseen hold-ups with his work or the Bats deciding not to leave! We are grateful to our grant donors for giving us extra time to claim their grants.

Prior to our AGM in April, Robert Dunley had written to the committee asking us to consider various options for the future of the village hall, and he has made these proposals open for discussion in a letter to the Editor in this newsletter. Whatever the outcome of such a debate, the committee concluded we must proceed with the repair of the village hall roof.

At the AGM all the present committee members agreed to stand again, and the chair, Siobhan Harper, welcomed Robert Dunley as a new committee member. Siobhan thanked everyone for their support over the year especially those involved in fundraising in any way. Special mention was made of the Thursday Kitchen run by Vilma Dunley and Paddy Shelley, who have been so generous in their donations to the roof fund.

Mike Freemantle was thanked, too, for his hard work in promoting Carn to Cove. As we mentioned last time the numbers attending had been disappointing, but approx 50 people enjoyed the latest Kevin Tomlinson

show, so that was very heartening. We still need volunteers to house the artistes for some shows although this is not the case for the June 7th show 'Cornish Lads,' a celebration of the mining landscape of Cornwall.

The Secretary, Janet Gore, gave a resumé of use of the village hall, and Sue Reardon, the Treasurer, presented the accounts. Sue had expressed concerns over the return we were receiving on certain investments and since the AGM, independent advice has been sought.

Mary Skerrett has kindly offered some old photographs of Golant which led us to believe there are probably a lot of such pictures in drawers and cupboards in the village. Robert Dunley (tel: 832807) has kindly agreed to copy such digitally and store them. It is hoped to set up a data base in the future. Please let Robert know if Janet Gore you are willing to loan your pictures.

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APPLE UPDATE

I recently attended two seminars at Eden on Fruit Production and Marketing in Cornwall. The intention was to bring customers and large scale fruit growers together and I learned a lot from these 'heavyweights'. However, there was much of interest to owners of small orchard and several important conclusions emerged.

Firstly the demand in Cornwall for locally grown produce far outstrips the supply.

Secondly, several contributors confirmed that 'local' is more important than 'organic', and that a 'local' variety produced locally, ie. Cornish Gilliflower grown in Cornwall has a double 'cachet' for the consumer.

Thirdly, there are many ways of marketing small amounts of locally grown produce; for instance Geoff Ridpath, who operates an independent retail fruit and vegetable outlet at Trago Mills, will buy small quantities of local produce which he said sells extremely well. Nigel Haydock from the 15 Cornwall Restaurant at Watergate, Newquay, emphasised the problems he had in sourcing fresh local produce other than the traditional root and green vegetables; tastes are changing, visitors and second-home owners are more cosmopolitan in their tastes.

'Carbon footprint', the increase in world food prices, and climate change were all discussed and surprisingly could bring good news for Cornish growers, offering them better markets for both traditional and more novel produce. What is the relevance for Golant? Well, we have an ideal situation here for fruit growing and many of us have productive fruit trees in our gardens. Perhaps we should value our crops more highly. To do so we must first identify our trees; once identified each variety can be classified either as desert, culinary or a cider apple, its 'season' can be determined enabling us to store them more confidently, giving us a supply of fresh fruit throughout the winter. Surplus production can be sold and those of us with small parcels of land can consider replanting orchards, or growing other fruit for market.

Pam and I will be attending the Trelissick Apple Day again in October, so please let us have your apples for identification. We're a bit late for accurately dating the blossom now, but if you can, please make a note of when your trees blossomed.

Finally, it was a great pleasure for me, at the second of these seminars, to meet James Armstrong Evans and Mary Martin from St. Dominick near Cotehele. James and Mary have done so much to preserve and encourage the replanting of local varieties of apples, pears and cherries. Reading of their work in the Tamar Valley inspired me to research and record the fruit trees here in Golant. *Stuart Young*


The next event, Cornish Lads on 7th June, will, I am sure, be every bit as successful, so please phone your booking to me 816454 as soon as possible.

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Tern update and other village wildlife news

As yet, no Terns have been seen on our estuary, though sightings have been made around the Cornish coast, of Common, Little, Roseate and the rare Black Tern, but none have been seen in significant numbers. It is generally thought that the Tern's absence is caused by diminishing numbers of the their favourite food, the sand eel. Stocks of the sand eel in colder more northern waters are holding, and in those areas the Terns are returning and breeding.

The diminishing sand eel population creates problems for other species. Puffins, for example, have been observed, desperately, but unsuccessfully, trying to feed Pipefish to their young. The Pipefish population is increasing due to warming waters but most seabirds other than Gulls are rather conservative in choice of food.

Many of us have been thrilled to see a Red Kite above Golant. This bird, until very recently rare, has made a dramatic recovery after being reintroduced to the Chilterns and Wales. No breeding pairs have yet been seen, but it is hoped that this bird, which was unfairly persecuted to the point of extinction, will soon make a comeback in Cornwall.

Another flying creature to look out for is the Asian Hornet, which has spread from the East in recent years (climate change?) We saw our first in Golant in September last year and have seen more this spring. They look like an alarmingly large wasp, about the size of a dragonfly. We haven't sampled the sting yet, though we gather that it can be likened to being stabbed with a red-hot darning needle—

FOWEY ESTUARY NEWS June 08

The **Draft Marine Bill**, said to be the second most complex piece of legislation in modern times (second only to the Terrorism Act), has now been released by the Government for a 12 week consultation period which will allow for pre-legislative Parliamentary scrutiny.

The Bill establishes a whole raft of measures which will modernise the way in which the marine area is managed. It will introduce new marine protected areas, measures to manage fisheries more effectively and consolidate fragmented marine licensing under the new roof of the Marine Management Organisation (MMO). Through these measures, the Bill aims to improve the ability to make long term, strategic decisions about the future level of activity that can take place in the marine environment.

Developers will be able to look at the framework for marine planning, and decide whether approval for a new activity is more or less likely in any given area. The bill also proposes combining marine licensing such as the FEPA 1985 and the Coast Protection Act 1949 to deliver a more streamlined, cheaper and faster procedure for the approval of dumping or incineration at sea. Under the Bill a network of Marine Conservation Zones will be designated by 2012 and the MMO will be responsible for managing these sites by conservation orders similar to that of the European Marine Sites. Inshore fisheries management currently carried out by the 12 English Sea Fisheries Committees along with the Environment Agency will be done by the 'Inshore Fisheries and Conservation Authorities' (IFCAs) who will be given additional powers to deliver this function more effectively.

It has secured wide support from a range of coastal managers, industries and voluntary organisations, who want to see the legislation in place and making a difference. All small businesses will benefit from a more efficient licensing regime, from the certainty that marine planning will bring, and from increased leisure and recreational opportunities. The Draft Marine Bill will ensure clean healthy, safe, productive and biologically diverse oceans and seas, by putting in place better systems for delivering sustainable development of marine and coastal environments.

News from St Sampson

Carol White & Robert Dunley were elected as church-wardens at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting in April. They were duly sworn in by the Archdeacon of Cornwall at Padstow Parish Church. We are sure that Robert's expertise combined with Carol's experience with previous restoration projects will be immensely constructive. Everyone is most grateful to Greg White who has done sterling service as churchwarden for the past five years.

We are thrilled with the news that Restormel District Council has agreed to award a grant of £10,000 towards the repairs to the tower. The church has to match this amount and work must begin by April 2009. I am pleased to report that our share has already been raised by the generous support of various fund raising activities in recent years.

Inside the church there is rot in a section of the dais on which stands the English altar (north side) which will cost f_1000 to repair.

There are problems inside and outside the tower! Inside, a new support beam is needed for the floor above the ringing chamber. The floor above that (the deadening chamber) needs replacing and in the bell chamber the glass window needs to be replaced by slate louvres to allow more movement of air. The grant from Restormel together with our matched share will be able to pay for all this internal work.

It's a different matter outside, where there are serious problems with the pointing of the tower. The workmanship was of the highest standards but, unfortunately, experience has shown that the use of cement was *not* the wisest choice! Rainwater gets trapped behind the joints and can't evaporate. All the pointing needs to be removed and replaced by lime mortar. £20,000 will be needed for the outside including a scaffolding bill of £5000! Minor works include re-capping the outside roof of the porch and refixing guttering. We're looking at a further expenditure of £20,000.......

Meanwhile, applications for other grants have been submitted but, with the forthcoming 2012 Olympics squeezing more and more from those funds, we are not too hopeful.

We are planning to have working parties to clear the outside drainage channel on the north side and to remove the debris (from birds mainly) from the floors above the ringing chamber. Please see Robert Dunley or Carol White if you can help.

On May 17th, the Bishop of St German's led a service at Fowey. The combined choirs sang 'Come Holy Ghost', an anthem composed by Sheila Funnell. We were delighted that the Bishop confirmed Fiona Westaway and she was able to take her first communion at St Sampson's a week later. Carol White was granted another term of office as a Lay Assistant.

In 2006, as part of the Du Maurier Festival, readers and the choir enacted the story of "Tristan & Iseult' interspersed with music for voices and organ. Since then, the script by Simon Funnell has been available in church and has sold very well. It has now been set in A5 format. Copies are on sale @ £3.

The next fund raising event is the Hog Roast & Quiz (devised by Maurie & Gail Parsons). See details opposite.

The Churchyard

It was an inspired idea to include the churchyard as one of the 'Gorgeous Gardens.' Many visitors were very enthusiastic about the flowers and many were drawn into the church. It was a prime time for plants as the Double Lady's Smocks were at their best. A photographic display in the porch drew much comment and will be left in the church for a few weeks. The seeds are now setting and the biggest strim will have begun before this issue is published. The cut stalks are left lying on the ground for at least three days before raking up begins— the worst job of all!

In 2000, when Gillie & I began the Living Churchyard Project, we identified rare plants in the Memorial Garden – the Double Meadow Saxifrage. There is only one other known site in Cornwall. This year, much to our delight, some more of these plants flowered in the middle churchyard..



What a change in 80 years! No Cormorant Hotel, not many boats, changes in hedges, no Rowing Club building. What else can you spot?! Where was the photographer standing?



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
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Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

Saturday May 10th was a superb sunny and warm day, and so was the Sunday until about 3pm, when dark clouds began to gather overhead and a subsequent thunderstorm let us know that the British weather is unpredictable.

Notwithstanding, the Cream Teas served at the Open Gardens event went ahead, with 'Pimms' as an alternative in a successful venture!!

Here is our Rose Cottage scone recipe from that weekend:

BUTTERMILK SCONES (makes 10)

75g/2³/40z Butter at room temperature + extra for greasing 225g/90z Self-Raising Flour + extra for rolling out and dusting Pinch of salt
One large Egg, beaten
2 tbsp Buttermilk + extra for brushing
2tbsp Sugar (optional)
Clotted cream and jam for serving a Cream Tea

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to 220°C/425°F/Mark 7. Lightly grease a baking tray.
- 2. Sift flour and salt into a bowl. Rub in butter with the fingertips until it looks like fine breadcrumbs. Add the sugar if required.
- 3. Beat the egg and buttermilk in a small bowl and slowly add to the flour & batter mix using a palette knife. It should not be too sticky.
- 4. Tip onto a lightly floured surface and roll until at least 2.5cm thick.
- 5. Cut out the scones with a 5cm plain cutter. Do not twist, only tap the cutter; you lose the air necessary for rising if you don't.
- 6. Place on a baking tray and brush the scones with some extra buttermilk.
- 7. Bake on the top shelf of the oven for 10-12 minutes until golden brown.

NB If you find it difficult to buy buttermilk, let some of your own milk turn sour by adding a little lemon juice. This works quite well. *Paddy Shelley*
