

It is estimated that the roof will take 2-3 weeks to do, after which the committee plan to clean up, decorate etc. This is a golden opportunity to have a sort out, too. John Kaczanow, who is a bat licensed person, has to be on hand when the ridge tiles are removed, so there has to be dovetailing with the builder on this, plus scaffolding to be erected.

A warm welcome awaits you all in the Village Hall on Thursday lunchtimes during September. During the closure in October going into November, the Thursday Kitchen will take place in the Church where soup and puddings will be served. If you have not been before, please do come and sample the gastronomic delights produced by Paddy & Vilma. They serve three courses plus fresh coffee all for $\pounds 5$, and there is a chance to meet fellow villagers as well.

As you can see with a project of this type we are dependent on many outside influences so by the next issue of this magazine all should be in place. We very much hope that the *Christmas Fayre* will go ahead on 29th November and the *Meet & Greet* sometime in December. WILDLIFE IN GOLANT

Sadly, we have no reports of Tern sightings in Golant so far. The raucous and argumentative Black Headed Gulls, which have appeared in plenty, are not quite the same as the graceful and acrobatic Terns. Watch this space though...

When we left our old home in St Veep, we sadly left behind a thriving colony of House Martins, which we were always delighted to see when they returned each spring. We thought that summer evenings would never be the same without their gay chattering in the sky above. So, we were thrilled when a pair took up residence here last summer. They moved into an artificial nest, built under the eaves of our new home in Golant, having been evicted, rather late in the season, from St Sampson's Terrace by roofing contractors.

The artificial nest had, as far as we were aware, never been used before. But the Martins moved in quite happily and raised two broods last summer, returning this year to successfully utilise the same nest.

Coincidentally, the British Trust for Ornithology has been conducting an investigation of the apparent increase of artificial nest usage by Martins and we were pleased to be able to add our experience to the statistics. Martins seem to be latching on to the fact that by utilising existing or artificial nests they can gain up to two weeks in the nesting season and increase the chances of rearing a second or, in a good year, a third brood.

Anyone with even a slight interest in birds will enjoy the BTO website (www.bto.org), which contains masses

of fascinating information, pictures and birdsong recordings. Also, if you are about to travel, key in your destination and date of travel, and a list will be provided of all the birds you may expect to see in that area.

Paying too much for heating oil?

Anyone who has had to fill up their central heating tank recently and then read the bill may well have needed a cold wet towel wrapped around their head rather than warm radiators. We cannot escape rising energy prices but perhaps there is a way we can ease the pain. Are there any readers interested in setting up a fuel co-op to buy fuel at more competitive prices?

This is something that we have done in our Cambridgeshire home village for a number of years. It's very easy and works like this. Whenever someone needs oil the organiser rings round the members to see how much oil they want and then puts a single order into the company who deliver in a single tanker run. Each family still gets its own invoice from the company and pays direct. There is no commitment from members to buy a guaranteed amount but they are expected to use the co-op rather than do their own thing once they have joined. So for a few minutes on the phone we are able to order big quantities and secure discounted prices. (Oil prices get a lot cheaper once you start talking in terms of more than 10000 litres). Securing the deal with the supplier takes a bit of time to get the best price but they are usually very keen as they cut delivery costs, simplify their processes and keep a slice of the market.

Is this something that families in Golant would like to investigate? If you are interested then we need contact details, and some idea of the amount of fuel you use in a

In spite of the bad weather only one boat had its canopy torn loose, and that was promptly re-secured before too much rain damage was done to the craft.

There was vandalism to the Pay and Display machine which Boat Watch reported but fortunately the vandals were not successful in breaking open the money box. Apparently this was one of many machines broken into in the area around that time.

We hope that this very low level of incidents will continue for the rest of the summer. Robert Gore

The bridge works continue. Apparently the bridge is finished, but now they are working on the reinforcements to the abutment to the north side. John Jenkin and Maurie Parsons are just two of the volunteers who man the National Coastwatch Station on the top of the cliffs at Polruan. Recently I visited John on watch, and was fascinated and reassured by what I saw. The station, though quite small in size, is extremely well equipped. There are a number of radios monitoring a selection of channels, a superb radar, and a range of optics (note the one on the tripod in the picture above and the handle by John's left ear is attached to a monocular telescope!) The computer is linked to the weather equipment outside.

All boats whose names can be read are logged when they leave or enter Fowey Harbour. Even serious walkers on the cliff walk in front of the station are noted. This information has already proved invaluable in past emergencies. I have found it very useful to go online to www.polruan-rci.org.uk to see the latest weather in graphic detail. It's now a 'favorite' on our computer!

News from St Sampson

A comprehensive application to obtain a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund has been prepared and submitted and other grant agencies are being approached. Meanwhile, we acknowledge two more generous gifts towards the repairs from villagers who were unable to be at recent fund raising events. We have received two more donations for the scheme to make a level, safe path to the lower churchyard including a further f_{100} from Vilma & Paddy- profits from the Thursday Kitchen.

The tower door at the west end has been beautifully restored. Until a few weeks ago it was a sorry sight with rotten wood on the face and both hinges rusty and broken. The door is not something that most people see unless they are going to use the toilet! Do go and have a look. The original frame was in perfect order and it has been faced with oak and fitted so as to be more weatherproof than before.

The Harvest Festival will be held on September 28th at 9.15am and the Harvest Supper on September 29th at 7pm in the village hall (no tickets will be available at the door). Frankly, for a country church our displays of harvest produce around the building have been very poor. On Saturday, September 27th, between 10am-Noon, we ask for a huge number of people of all ages to turn up for 'Bring & Decorate'. In other words, we ask you to bring fresh fruit, vegetables, flowers, tins & packets and place it anywhere inside the building. If you just drop your gift off, someone will put it in place for you. Most important of all, we will auction the produce at the Harvest Supper where we hope to raise money for Euro Aid. Penny White's sister-in-law, Lorraine Cooper, works tirelessly for this charity and has been to some Eastern European countries to put the help directly where it is needed. We plan to put a photographic display in church soon to give everyone an idea what this excellent organisation does with our monies.

The Historical Guide to the church, written a few months ago by John Jenkin, has almost sold its first edition (80 copies). Since its publication, the Bishop's Chair has been dismantled and its panels used to improve the reading desk and lectern. These changes have been noted in the new edition. The guide, as well as John's Visitors Guide to Golant and Simon Funnell's narration of Tristan \mathfrak{C} Iseult are on sale in the church (all at f(3)).

For a year or so there has been a basket in the church for gifts of food to be given to Stak, the organisation run by all denominations of churches in St Austell to help feed the homeless. Thanks to everyone who has given in this way. The basket will now be removed because Asda &Tesco have collection bins for your gifts to Stak.

In early summer a swallow started to build a nest on the light in the middle of the porch which spelt danger for anyone passing below! She was persuaded to make her nest on the outer wall, raised one brood successfully and is now sitting on another clutch of eggs. The bead curtain hanging in front of the main door, though not the most aesthetic piece of décor, has certainly prevented any birds becoming trapped inside the church.

The Churchyard

Whilst the seeds of the double lady's smocks were setting, I strimmed most of the seedheads of sorrel and plantains which are too plentiful. The proper first strim of the season took place at the end of May/early June with delays caused by the frequent spells of rain. All the plant debris was raked up after allowing a few days for the seeds to fall. Since then a further strimming and raking have taken place.

The middle area has been covered with the vellow flowers of hawkweed and a few cat's-ears. Most attractive have been the graves with a profusion of reflexed stonecrop, with dense heads of striking yellow flowers about 9" (20cms) high and, also, the English stonecrop with white flowers and flushed pink upper leaves which are low growing.

Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

At the June Hog Roast and Quiz held at Bellscat, the ladies were very generous with the great variety of salads and puds, and for once, the weather was kind to us.

Fiona Westaway's recipe for Banoffee Pie was a real winner, and she has kindly let us print it here for everyone to try. It has a delicious layer of thick caramel on a biscuit base, topped with bananas and cream.

The Ultimate Banoffee Pie (Serves 8-10)

<u>For the Base</u> 100g / 40z butter, melted 250g/90z digestive biscuits <u>To make the base</u>: Crush the biscuits until they resemble fine crumbs then tip into a bowl. Stir in the melted butter. Press the mixture into the base of a 20cm/8" loosebottomed lined cake tin. * Chill the base.

To make the filling: Place the butter & sugar

dissolves. Add the condensed milk & bring

gently to a simmer, stirring continuously, to make the caramel. As soon as it thickens,

(approx 5 minutes of simmering) remove from the heat. Take care not to let it burn

at this stage. Spread the filling over the biscuit base, cool, & then leave to chill for at

least one hour, until firm.

in a non-stick saucepan over a low heat,

stirring until the butter melts & the sugar

<u>For the Caramel</u> 125g/ 50z butter 125g/ 50z dark brown soft sugar 397g can Carnation Condensed Milk

<u>For the Topping</u> 4 small bananas 284ml carton double cream, lightly whipped Grated chocolate for dusting

<u>To serve</u>: Remove the pie from the tin & place on a serving plate. Slice the bananas; fold half of them into the softly whipped cream & spoon over the toffee base. Decorate with the remaining bananas & dust liberally with the chocolate.

* Fiona uses a larger cake tin with the same base and topping, but with 1½ times the filling ingredients....this makes a deeper pie!!
