



When we moved from Yorkshire to *The Old Sawmills* in 1955, we obtained permits to allow us to walk along the railway line from Golant to *Sawmills*, *Bodmin Pill*.

I became so used to walking on the wooden sleepers that I could read a book en route. There were 18 sleepers to a length of rail, and where the rails met end to end, two sleepers had less space in between.

After a while, I could still read and manage 18 strides followed by a short step, without having to look, as the brain took over for me - I did have a few tumbles from time to time, though, and the hardcore between sleepers was most unforgiving!

When the tide was out, there were times when I would stop to watch otters playing on the shale beach, and at other times I was fascinated to see Okey Searle and a couple of other fishermen pulling in the salmon nets to reveal several huge salmon - they never gave me one, more's the pity!

The old priest who lived from time to time in the delightfully situated small wooden house near St Sampson's cave (which my younger brother and I explored on one occasion, lighting our way with a candle in a jam-jar) was seen rarely.

He did have young male friends there from time to time, and I remember being very shocked one sunny morning when I was passing quite early along the line to see a young man completely naked pottering around the hut. I averted my eyes ever afterwards; I was about 16 or 17 at the time and VERY innocent!

The Downs at that time were much clearer, as Elford Scantlebury had young heifers running up there along with my pony, Timmy.

It is pleasing to read that maintenance volunteers are doing such a grand job of work there.

## Honeysuckle

## A Miscellany of Floral Facts

- Honeysuckle is also called Woodbine, entwining itself so tightly that it can deform a tree trunk into a 'barley-sugar' shape.
- In Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream, Puck knew a secluded bank 'quite over-canopied with luscious woodbine'.
- Alternative country names, particularly in Devon, are Withywind and Goat's Leaf (probably because of the plant's ability to climb up into inaccessible places similar to a goat).
- Honeysuckle is the county flower of Warwickshire.
- In the Language of Flowers, Honeysuckle represents Affection, said to be because it 'clings' like a love-struck maid'!
- The 17th century physician Nicholas Culpeper, in his Complete Herbal, says that "The oil made by infusion of the flowers is accounted healing and warming, and good for the cramp and convulsion of the nerves".
- Other herbalists used the **Honeysuckle** flowers in potions to cure headaches, lung disease and asthma.

#### **GOLANT WILDLIFE**

It's been a good year for the Horse Flies! Everyone seems to have been well bitten this year, the writer especially so, and the resulting itchy inflamed lumps were far more irritating than the Mosquito bites received whilst on holiday abroad.

As with Mosquitoes, the female Horse Fly (*Chrysops Meigen*) needs to feed on blood before she can find a male to reproduce with, and she is not particular about what mammal she uses. The mouthparts are efficiently adapted to be able to bite through thick hair and hide which is why we can often be attacked through our clothing.

Unlike mosquitoes, which use a dagger-like proboscis to gently penetrate our flesh, Horse Flies slice and tear open our skin using sharp mouthparts, before sucking our

blood via a tube like tongue. Anticoagulant saliva ensures a smooth flow of blood, and at the same time initiates consequential pain and irritation that we feel; our skin reacts to the bite by



releasing histamines around the area of the wound to combat infection, and it is that effect which causes the irritation we feel.

Being especially susceptible and reactive to Horse Fly bites, I have experimented with deterrents and remedies.

I have found that standard insect repellents have little effect, consuming massive amounts of raw garlic deters everything but the Horse Fly, whacking the insect whilst it feeds adds to the problem as more of the insect's juices are forced into the wound; it's better to stroke the insect off with a sideways motion.

Not touching or scratching the wound makes a huge difference; resisting the desire to scratch reduces the irritation massively. Anti-histamine cream reduces the swelling and stops the itchiness.

The bite of the Horse Fly can transmit disease— Equine Anaemia in horses, and Loa Loa, a parasitic worm in humans, but the creature is not all bad; it's a very important wildflower pollinator!

It is astonishing how swiftly the insect population reacts to variations in the weather- we have had a damp spring followed by a warm spell and we are plagued with Horse Flies.

Do you remember the ladybird plague in the hot summer of 1976? They were so abundant that, at one point where I lived, it was impossible to walk without crushing several with each step.

House Martin visitors are low this year, and there is an inexplicable high mortality of young Swallows. Some young Herons are still in the nests, which, as they become vacant, are taken over by the Cattle Egrets.

#### **FOWEY ESTUARY NEWS**

#### Heronry at Penpoll is one of the largest in Cornwall

The Friends of the Foney Estuary have been monitoring the heronry at the mouth of Penpoll Creek since February this year, and now, after five visits to survey the site, we are able to submit our first Heronry Census result to the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO).

We have experienced all kinds of weather conditions, from the chilly airs of the spring to the warmer conditions of recent weeks, and with this we have seen fluctuations in the numbers of occupied nests, counting from 6 up to 15 on one visit.

Quite understandably the herons seemed to tuck down in the trees when it was windy and cold, out of our view. But on sunnier mornings we could see much more activity and also identified some immature, non-breeding birds 'hanging about' in a social group.

After several visits, revisions of sketch maps and deliberations over a cup of coffee on the hillside, we have made our year's best estimate for the site to be 13 'apparently occupied nests'; this is the unit which is used by the *BTO*. According to Stephen Jackson, our local *BTO* representative, this result means that this is one of the biggest heronries in Cornwall. This result has been submitted and will add to both local and national knowledge of the species.

Another observation, one also seen in other areas, is that Little Egrets use the same site; anecdotal evidence suggests that Little Egrets do breed in the same colonies as Grey Herons but a little later. We are keeping an eye on the heronry throughout the summer, to see if we can add any evidence to this, as there doesn't seem to be much information available on the subject.

Our thanks go to the landowners and Nigel and Alex Vincent of *Haye Farm* at St. Veep, who farm the land overlooking Penpoll from the north side; this proved to be a very good vantage point across into the nesting area, but far enough away not to disturb the birds.

We are hoping that this will be the first of many surveys of this heronry, and we may even expand our search for other sites in the estuary.




We hear that Simon recently won a prize for a 'hole in one' in a charity match at Lanhydrock Golf Course.

With the weather we have recently been enjoying, it is hard to imagine living anywhere else! Or even going on holiday abroad!! Fabulous. It almost makes up for the poor sailing seasons of the last few years? But let's enjoy it while we can, and get more time on the river at every opportunity. That is assuming, of course, that you haven't lost any of your sailing gear??

#### Police Update:

I am not allowed to share some of the information I receive via 'official channels,' but I can report a number of thefts up and down the coast from Looe down to Falmouth.

Boats, engines, trailers, tenders, even illegal fishing with nets across the river! You name it, it has gone missing, and we here in Golant haven't fully escaped the seasonal 'wave' of crime that seems to peak in the summer months. Locally, we have had reports of a lost outboard, some oars and a petrol can, although I understand that some of these have subsequently been found in a different location.

For those who know him, I have to report the imminent retirement of Sergeant Russ Hall, who has virtually single-handedly inspired and supported the various Boat Watch groups along the coast.

The good news is.....that he is returning as a *special* and will focus full time on marine crime and related matters. Russ was also responsible (along with others) in helping our local branch obtain additional funding to assist in replacing the stolen gear from the Boathut. (I hope you have noticed the new paint job??)

Incidentally, the long awaited court case from the theft and conviction last July is back on the court timetable and is scheduled for next month!! (And not before time I say!)

#### Fun in the Sun:

So with the better weather, enjoy it while you can and get out on the river. But remember to check that all of your equipment is marked up with some form of identification and that you make it difficult for someone to steal it! If in doubt, take a photo of anything suspicious!!

#### THE ST SAMPSON'S PARISH MAP PROJECT

In 1982 Sue Clifford and Angela King founded the *Common Ground* organisation with the avowed aims of 'celebrating the commonplace, the local, the vernacular and the distinctive.' *The National Apple Day* was one of their early successes, now taking place every year on or near 21<sup>st</sup> October. More recently, their **Parish Map** project has achieved nation-wide popularity.

The *Golant Heritage Group* is proposing a Parish Map for Golant, and we would like to know what makes this parish special for you?



Why do we need a Parish Map, you may ask. Doesn't the Ordnance Survey produce perfectly good maps of the area? Well yes, they do; accurately surveyed, they present the perfect bird's eye view, correct in every detail, almost timeless but inanimate.

What we have in mind is a map, not of the village, but from the village, a worm's-eye view perhaps; what it feels like to be part of it, moulded by the place, and we want your ideas and suggestions.

A Parish Map can take many forms. Essentially it is a community project combining the collective ideas of the inhabitants as to what makes the parish particular to themwhat scene, what location, what person, what event, makes their home especial to them? The 'map' does not have to be physically accurate; we can play with both the geographical scale and the time scale to encapsulate in one graphical representation the scenes, events and people that make the area special to us.

It doesn't have to be backward looking, but it should be particular to Golant, Torfrey, Tanhay, or the wider parish.



I start this report by expressing heartfelt thanks to Simon Funnell, Bruce Fletcher and Angela Forsyth who retired after many years service at the Annual Parish Meeting in May. Their combined wealth of experience and local knowledge has undoubtedly served the Parish extremely well over the years and has provided a solid foundation for continuity for the future.

And in that vein, it is encouraging and exciting to report an injection of new blood into the Parish Council in newly co-opted Councillors Judith Luddington, Peter Williams and Stuart Young. I would like to welcome them as fellow Councillors and thank them for the enthusiasm they have already shown for their roles alongside existing Councillors Fuge, Campbell-Taylor, Johns and Hunter.

We have a new Cornwall Councillor, David Hughes, who has attended our June and July meetings and is already proving himself to be a real asset. David sits on Cornwall Council's Planning and Standards Committees. He clearly has a wide knowledge of planning and procedural matters which have already proven to be very helpful to your Parish Councillors. We look forward to a long and productive working partnership with him.

And the final reigning in of change has been Councillor Hunter's election as Chairman with Stuart Young as Vice Chairman. It is proposed that your new Council will adopt a more teamed approach to the issues and challenges that face the Parish. You may be interested to know that Councillor Hughes has advised that, at present, only one public toilet earmarked for closure on the Fowey Peninsula has remained open and, even then, only as a result of the support of a private benefactor. Please bear in mind that the toilets were closed by Cornwall Council not by your Parish Council.

On a more positive note, the existing arrangements with the car park remain unchanged and the heat wave has boosted takings markedly. Let us hope for more hot sunny weather!

On planning, your Council has objected to an application for a proposed dwelling and garage adjacent to *Sea View* on *Gumms Lane*. There was support for permission for the construction of a garage at *3 River View Terrace*. Your Council has also resolved to conditionally support an application for permission to demolish and rebuild at *Riverbank Cottage* provided concerns relating to scale, design and disruption caused by works are addressed by the Planning Authority.

The next full meeting is on Tuesday 24 September 2013 at 7:15pm. Please do attend! Your new Chairman actively encourages reasonable public participation both before and during the meeting as this very much enlivens and enhances proceedings. And do enjoy your summer!



#### **UNCLE JOHN'S GARDEN PATCH**

#### Gardening Tips for August & September

At last, it feels as though we have had a taste of summer weather, albeit with some extreme temperatures, and it's been some brave an' hot! Now don't think that I'm complaining but, tidn't all beer an' skittles, an' where there's an upper there's always a downer. The up side is the lovely sunshine and hot weather, the down side is the need to constantly water and feed, because if you don't, then the plants will very soon let you know!

Don't mow the grass too tight and if it does turn brown, don't fret because it will green up again when the rains return. Watering is a necessity, and if the supply is limited then containers and hanging baskets will have to come first. Always water in the early morning or evening when the temperature has dropped, and with newly planted trees and shrubs make sure they are watered frequently. Perennials and summer bedding will survive with occasional watering, and if they start to wilt then don't worry; it's quite natural for plants to wilt in the hottest part of the day, because this is nature's way of reducing water loss, and even if they look dead, don't pull them up because there will probably be life underneath.

With vegetables, mulching will reduce evaporation and you will have to decide which will need the most water. Beans and courgettes will come first to keep them cropping regularly.

Show time is rapidly approaching and it's time to single out individual plants for a bit of special treatment. So why not enter something in the show? There is a variety of classes, and I'm sure that there is something for all ages. GOOD LUCK!!

#### Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

I made this Roularde in June for the first time for a lady's 80th birthday party. She said that when there were several desserts on the table, this always went quickly, and it proved to be true.

Vilma and I made it for one of our Thursday Kitchens— no wheat produce is used, so it is suitable for those on a gluten free diet.

#### **MERINGUE ROULARDE**

5 Egg Whites 275g (10oz) Caster Sugar 50g (2oz) Flaked Almonds 275g (10 fl oz) Whipping or Double Cream Strawberries

- 1. Pre-heat the oven to Gas Mark 4/180°C.
- 2. Grease a 33cm (13") x 23cm (9") Swiss Roll tin, and line with non-stick baking paper.
- 3. Whisk the egg whites and add the sugar a little at a time until very stiff.
- 4. Spread the mixture into the prepared tin and sprinkle the almonds over it.
- 5. Place the tin near the top of the oven and bake for 12 minutes. Then lower the oven to Gas Mark 3/150°C and bake for another 15 minutes until firm to the touch.
- 6. Remove from the oven and turn almond side down onto a sheet of non-stick paper (I use a silicone baking tray liner). Carefully remove the lining paper and allow to cool.
- 7. Whisk the cream until it stands in peaks. Spread over the meringue.
- 8. Slice the strawberries and arrange over the cream.
- 9. Roll from the long end fairly lightly and roll using the paper (or silicone liner), making sure you don't leave the paper in the roulard!
- 10. Place on a serving dish with the join underneath.


