Villagers get their wish

t has been a worrying time for some of the youngsters in the village. Last Monday work was due to begin on the refurbishment of their Play Area on the village green, but the appalling weather meant that the contractors were unable to start on time. The children felt down in the mouth. All they could use were the existing slide & see saw. However, the workmen arrived on Thursday and worked into Saturday, and by Monday the concrete was cured sufficiently. There was a rush to try the new equipment: a balance beam, jelly board, swinging log, stepping logs, tyre crossing, treadmill and stilts.

Four year old Maddy-Rose Hunter said, "Everything's my favourite. It's brilliant!"

Her brother, Joe, went straight to the tyres "...they're more fun to play on than the old swing."

The oldest boy, Jack Elworthy, had different opinions. For him the jelly board is great because "...you can wrestle on it..." Another added, "It wobbles your legs!"

Having had a play, all the children joined their mothers and set about carrying a huge pile of bags filled with wood chippings to the Play Area. Some then helped to empty them under some of the equipment whilst others grabbed rakes and brushes to level it all out.

For three years a group led by Siobhan Harper, Estelle van den Broeke & Debbie Andrews with their treasurer, John East, have been raising money to refurbish the Play Area. In recent weeks, much preparatory work on the site has been carried out by Andrew van den Broeke.

Fund raising events (such as Christmas Fayre stalls, Ian Major's Boat Jumble), various donations including one from Marilyn Wellman when she was mayor, grants and a gift of £2000 from the Parish Council have finally reached the target of £5250. The Parish Council's generous contribution was in response to the wishes of villagers who, when asked in a questionnaire how the money raised from charging for the car park should be spent, highlighted the repair to the roof of the Village Hall and the refurbishment of the Play Area as the major priorities.

Tinney's Lane Resurfaced

After years of deterioration to a state where the surface was dangerous for pedestrians and difficult to drive on, the village end of Tinney's Lane was resurfaced between the 4th and 7th June 2007.

The two track lane from Cowshit Lane to Orchard Lodge had been laid many years ago – believed to be at least 40. Over recent years it had become damaged by wear and water. Potholes had appeared making walking and driving along it quite hazardous – particularly at night when it is not illuminated.

Because the lane is a Bridleway, Cornwall County Council has some jurisdiction although nobody has any idea who actually has any ownership. Cornwall CC was informed of the plans to resurface and raised no objections.

Contractors H. L. Crocker started by tearing up all remaining concrete on Monday 4th and removing it out of the village. They then replaced the concrete tracks and filled the central section with chippings to aid drainage. The whole project took until Thursday 7th and a great improvement has been noticed for pedestrians, drivers and drainage.

It was recommended that the lane was not used for a few days to allow the concrete to dry out properly and so on Sunday 10th June an opening ceremony was held, attended by Alistair and Viviane Barr, Maurie and Gail Parsons, Lynette and Paul Chasteneuf, Dorothy Rickwood and Gwenda Towell with Martin.



Lynette was honoured with the cutting of the tape, and Alistair provided champagne and crisps.



Indeed, Sue Reardon, Chair of St Sampson's Parish Council, who was held up, jumped out of her car and took part in the festivities. She said that she believed the resurfacing to be a great improvement for all users, and was pleased that it had been achieved without cost to the Parish, Borough or County.

A Highways Agency representative was heard to say, "I've never heard of Golant, let alone Tinney's Lane!"

Viviane then ceremoniously drove her car down the lane while Gwenda made sure that Paradise Cottage was safe. Both said the surface was so much better and safer for all.

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Village Hall Committee Report

Following the success of the Plant and Book Sale held at the end of May it has been decided to do it again next year- same weekend, same time, same place. I understand that those who show at the Chelsea Flower Show start their preparations 18 months in advance so while we may have a little less time we are asking those who enjoy growing from seed and from cuttings etc to remember next year's Golant Plant and Book Sale. Not that we have illusions of grandeur!!

The "Midsummer Fun Day" in June shared between the Village hall and St Sampson's Church was a lovely day in spite of the heavy rain in the evening. The Village Hall Committee were pleased to work with the Church team to produce a total of £734.41p which was divided equally between the two giving £367.20p to each. Another good sum raised towards the roof. We have been busy applying for grants and, hopefully, will get some positive results.

The presence of Bats is turning out to be more of a problem than originally thought. We have a nursery roost of Brown Long-eared Bats and Pipistrelles. In order to get a DEFRA licence, which will allow us to make repairs to the roof without disturbance to the bats, inspections need to be done at regular intervals over a year. This will identify whether it is a summer or winter roost. Not only will this delay the project but could cost as much as £2000!! We are also looking into "Bat Flaps" which the owner of a private residence in the village has installed into his new roof.

We have recently lost our cleaner due to ill health and so the committee have decided to do it themselves on a rota basis. Most hirers of the hall are good at leaving the hall clean and tidy and we thank them for that consideration.

The village hall committee will be providing some games at the Carnival in the afternoon such as the treasure hunt board, duck game, beat the buzzer and the rat and the drainpipe challenge etc. Also, we shall be selling off the books left over from the book sale at bargain prices so we can start again for the next sale. There is a small selection of up-to-date paper backs for sale in the village hall for 50p each. Please bring your recent books in and

leave on the piano where there is a box for your dona-

For those of you who planted sunflowers for the competition to be measured on Wednesday 15th August, please contact Janet Gore tel: 01726 832425. Prizes will be given at the Carnival.

There have been some thefts from boats recently: tools were stolen from one boat, an anchor and chain from another and a dinghy was also taken. It is very important that such incidents are reported to the Police. Unless they have a record of these crimes they assume that nothing happens in Golant and do not patrol this area.

GOLANT QUAY USERS ASSOCIATION

We now have further information on the proposed railway bridge works from Network Rail.

They intend to replace the bridge deck, carry out piling and scour protection and repaint the steelwork. They propose to bring most of the bulk materials in by rail from Fowey Docks and utilise the Canoe Club land (owned by Network Rail) for parking and a welfare wagon! (I will leave you to ponder on what type of welfare that might be.)

The current plan is to start work on 7th January 2008 and for the works to take 6 weeks. For the duration of this time the navigable channel under the bridge will be closed and arrangements are in hand to formalise this.

This Association is in discussion with Network Rail to minimise the disruption and we will be notifying all our members officially once the final details are established.

HOWEVER ANYONE WHO IS A MEMBER WHO PLANS TO USE THE PILL THIS WINTER SHOULD TAKE THIS AS AN EARLY WARNING OF THE INTENDED BRIDGE CLOSURE AS YOU WILL NOT BE ABLE TO GET YOUR BOAT IN OR OUT.

As part of our regular maintenance activities we have cleaned the Slip of dangerous algae growth and propose to commence repairs to the Quay itself, where the need for grouting and repairs to the road surface are evident.

Scandal at a Funeral

The 1777 funeral of the Mousehole fishwife Dolly Pentreath, wrongly supposed to have been the last person to speak Cornish, was a rather scandalous affair. Eight local fishermen were chosen to carry her coffin up the long steep hill from Mousehole to the church at Paul. It was a hot day, and halfway up the bearers set the coffin down on the road and refused to go farther until they had 'wet the other eye'. One member was sent back to the village for a bottle of gin, and only after this was drunk did the procession proceed. You will find no mention of this is in any history book!

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DEER TICKS WARNING UPDATE

Gillie's brother David Manners, who has a great deal of parasitology knowledge, has provided this valuable information following the warning in the last edition of 'The Golant Pill' by Sue Reardon about ticks and the growing number of Roe Deer seen around the village.

He emailed to say: "Sheep and deer ticks in the UK are the same species-Ixodes ricinus- the 'Castor Bean Tick', which will use not only sheep AND deer but also dogs, cats and humans among its hosts. Size is not an identifying factor as they are usually the size of pinheads when they attach. They have a habit of lurking on grasses and undergrowth and attach themselves to any mammal that passes; once they have embedded their mouthparts, they feed on blood until swollen and that is often when they are found. Obviously it is important to remove them properly. Don't simply pull them and definitely do not use the so-called surgical spirit or fag-end or hot match head methods! There is available from vets a really good gadget, which is a small plastic hook-like instrument which you insert between the skin and the tick body, then rotate between thumb and finger. This will 'unscrew' them, thus removing the complete mouthpart, which is designed with barbs to remain firmly attached. If you leave the mouthpart behind, this is what usually leads to infection problems etc. The site of attachment should be monitored following removal, and if any signs of inflammation or redness or itching persist or develop, then seek medical advice."

News from St Sampson

I mentioned in a previous article that there had been ingress of water in the tower and adjoining walls during some bad storms a few weeks ago. Water was pouring down walls and dripping on to electrical circuitry. The whole building has been inspected and a report is pending. What we do know is that there are problems with wooden support beams in the roof of the tower. We have no idea yet of what money will be needed to repair the faults. The architect, who was seeing the church for the first time, was impressed that such a small community as ours has managed to bring the building up to such a high standard of repair.

Storms had also shown up leaks in many of the windows. Only one set of windows had lead trays at their base which is the standard method to avoid leaks. An experienced craftsman and his very capable young female assistant have been at work recently. Many of the windows now have been fitted with trays, four windows have been removed to carry out remedial work (the lead had buckled in the face of the storms), various broken glass has been replaced and some damage on the external east wall and a drainage gully have been repaired with lime mortar.

In the last issue I reported the death of Marion Gregory who was such a great supporter of the church for many years. Not long ago, she had an altar frontal chest especially designed and made for St Sampson's Church. It is on castors and can be seen in front of the organ. Her husband, Alan, has placed a brass plaque on the chest to record her devotion and generosity.

Two new guides for visitors have been written. Simon Funnell has written a 'Five Minute Guide' which has been extremely well received. A laminated copy is available at the back of the church. An historical guide by John Jenkin will go on sale very soon.

At the recent wedding of Chris and Kaye Taylor, the new toilet was much appreciated by young and old. Please note that it is routinely opened for services.

Visitors may like to know that we have a selection of unique cards & postcards, tea-towels and very popular pottery on sale at very reasonable prices. The church is open every day.

DUCK DAY

Unfortunately Duck Day on Sunday 15th July also had just the weather for ducks! Perhaps we should have known that it would be bad weather because it was St Swithin's Day but I reckon that this area had the forty days of rain prior to Sunday so hope that we won't get another forty days to follow.

Duck Day, which is organised by the Golant Firework Team, is dependant on the tide so the fun started just after 5 o'clock with three games for the children. All of the games had been made some years ago by Phil Reardon, and his aim of entertaining the children of the village still works.

Maurie, the Prat in the Hat (this time a peaked cap with a duck on top), was there to run proceedings. We had Ding-a-Duck where you have to try to pass a small metal hoop around a metal outline of a duck, and if the hoop touches the duck an adapted doorbell sounds. This was very popular but by the end of the day the doorbell had made such a noise because nobody achieved the complete circuit, that those who were near-by could happily have thrown it into The Pill.

An easier game was Hoop-a-Duck. This is like hoop-la but Phil had made a post with a duck on top. Each entrant had five hoops to try to throw one over from about three feet to win a prize. A lot of prizes were given out at this.

The last game was Hook-a-Duck. We had a number of rubber ducks with hooks in their heads and the idea is to hook them with a fishing rod device. Ducks with an 'O' on their bottoms were the winners.

At about 5.30 the two races started with heats and finals of Uphill Duck Racing. Phil had made some wooden ducks on bases to which are attached lines about 15 yards long that join to a spindle. Each entrant had to wind the line on to the spindle as fast as they could, but they have to do this with their backs to the ducks and the line passing through their legs. There are some very competitive people who like to do this. The Final was won by Andrew Van Den Broek.

Finally we had the Duck Racing in the Pill, which is always the highlight of the day. A number of heats were held and ducks were squirted down the Pill by water pistols. Again the competitive spirit was in evidence and the Final was won by Hugh Elworthy.

Auntie Paddy's Recipe Corner

We are now into the holiday season and it's still raining! How about an afternoon in the kitchen when the children can do some baking? Here is a good versatile recipe to try.

CHOCOLATE BISCUITS

100gm/40z butter or margarine
50gm/20z castor sugar
100gm/40z plain flour
A few drops of vanilla essence
1 heaped tablespoon of cocoa

- 1. Cream the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy, then add the vanilla essence.
- 2. Sieve the flour and cocoa together and add to the creamed ingredients. Fold in gently until the mixture comes together and leaves the side of the bowl.
- 3. Roll into walnut-sized balls and place on a greased and floured baking tray. (Allow space for the biscuits to spread.) Using a floured fork, flatten the balls to half their depth.
- 4. Bake in a moderately hot oven (Gas Mark 5/375°F/190°C) for 12-15 minutes. Allow to cool.
- 5. When cold, sandwich the biscuits together with vanilla butter icing.

Vanilla Butter Icing

50gm/2oz butter 100gm/4oz icing sugar A few drops of vanilla essence

Use the butter at 'room temperature', not straight from the fridge! Cream the butter lightly and then add the sieved icing sugar, gradually adding the vanilla essence. Beat this until it is soft and can be spread on the biscuits.

Alternatives

<u>Chocolate Chip Biscuits</u>: Replace the cocoa with 25gm/1oz flour and add 50gm/2oz Chocolate chips.

<u>Cherry Biscuits</u>: Replace the cocoa with 25gm/1oz flour & add 5gm/2oz chopped glacé cherries.
