


21 Lemon Street

"Lemon street was one of the ancient highways laid out from the main street running through the town to the water. It was called a lane or highway y^t leads down to y^e North river in 1670; Skerry's lane, 1693; the way leading to the North river, 1727; the way leading from the ferry lane to y^e north river, 1744; Smith's lane, 1800; Water street, 1819; and Lemon street, 1843." (Essex Antiquarian, vol. 8, pg. 152)


The lot on which this house stands was a small portion of land owned by John Neal, and was devised by him in his will dated May 3, 1672, to his son Jeremiah Neal of Salem. Jeremiah conveyed the lot to Francis Nichols of Salem, on June 10, 1673. Mr. Nichols conveyed it to William Godsoe of Salem, on July 31. 1683. Apparently Mr. Godsoe immediately conveyed the lot to Capt. George Curwen of Salem, merchant; and Capt. Curwen died possessed of it in 1685. In the settlement of his estate it was assigned to his daughter Susanna Curwen, who married Edward Lyde of Boston in 1694, and died, childless, before October, 1696. Her heirs were her brother, Hon. Jonathan Curwen, her sisters, Abigail Russell and Hannah Brown, and her nephews, Samuel and Sheriff George Curwen. George died in 1696, leaving a son, Bartholmew Curwen. Jonathan Curwen, Abigail Russell, Hannah Brown, Samuel Curwen and Bartholmew Curwen were the owners of this lot in 1700. (Essex Antiquarian, vol. 8, pg. 156)



During the 1750's and 1760's David Northey, a member of the Quaker faith, purchased this property and the land adjoining. Friend Northey operated a windmill which was located at the foot of Northey St. In 1790, after the death of David Northey, a plan of his estate was drawn. The lots marked #1 were assigned to his son Ezra. Those marked #2 were assigned to his son Abijah:




On May 20, 1810 Ezra Northey sold a parcel of <u>land</u> to Samuel Sawyer, teamster, for the sum of \$510. (book 190 page 61) On the same day Samuel Sawyer obtained a mortgage from the said Ezra Northey for the property described as land and buildings thereon for \$510. (book 190 page 61)



Since the first mention of a <u>building</u> is in the mortgage, but not noted in the deed (both made on the same day) it must be assumed that by some prior agreement Samuel Sawyer was allowed to start the building of his house before a registered transaction was made.

The year 1810 is also the time that Samuel Sawyer first appears on the tax rolls in Ward 2. Mr. Sawyer was then 29 years old having been married for $5\frac{1}{2}$ years to Polly Lyttlefield of Kennebunk.

A few years later Samuel Sawyer purchased the adjoining lots from Abijah Northey:



Evidently Samuel Sawyer needed cash on Dec. 20, 1826, for on this date he sold all his property to Thomas Perkins Pingree, a prominent Salem merchant, for the sum of \$1,500. "Being all the land which I purchased of Ezra Northey by deed May 26, 1810, book 190 page 61; of Abijah Northey Oct. 4, 1819, book 222 page 32; and from Abijah Northey on April 5, 1826, book 240 page 159. Saving that the north line is a little shortened by land taken therefrom to widen Together with all buildings now standing thereon said street. with all the erections, betterments, improvements and privileges on part of premises under a mortgage to Ezra Northey for \$300."

The Sawyers continued to live in the house under the ownership of Mr. Pingree until Samuel's death which occurred in 1840. probate (#24910) of the estate mentions that "Mary, about 50 years of age, has been lame from gout for 3 years and has 1 child at home in her family." (inventory appendix A)

Mr. Pingree transferred the title of the property back to Mary Sawyer, widow of Samuel, on Feb. 17, 1840. "The same estate conveyed to me by Samuel Sawyer on Dec. 20, 1826." (book 325 page 14)

According to the Salem directories and the tax records this house, then numbered 15 Lemon St., was occupied by Widow Mary Sawyer plus two other families:

1844 - Thomas Laskey, Dudly Phipps

1845 - Dudly Phipps

1847 - Edward Rea. Christopher Dotey 1848 - Edward Rea, Edward H. Rea

The federal census for the year 1850 gives a clear insight as to the occupants:

The Salem Street books (listing males only) show the tenants of #15 Lemon St.:

Mary Sawyer died in Jan. 1856. Her probate (#52785) names the administrator of the estate as Asa Sawyer of Readsborough, Vt.


Elizabeth Perkins a daughter was the only heir listed. (inventory appendix B)

The tax records for 1856 verify the death of Mrs. Sawyer:

On July 9, 1860 Asa A. Ward of Lynn sold to Bernard McShane "the land and dwelling house being a portion of the estate which Samuel Sawyer conveyed to Thomas Pingree on Dec. 20, 1826."

The street books verify the change in ownership to Mr. McShane

Bernard McShane died on March 9, 1881. In his probate (#66422) his heirs were listed as: Widow Mary A., son James McShane and daughter Sarah B. Roberts the wife of Otis.

Real estate - #15 Lemon St. \$1,500 (both Mary and Sarah died before the probate case was finalized)

On June 26, 1888 James McShane. as guardian of James H. Roberts, the minor child of Otis B. and Sarah Roberts and in his own right sold "the same estate conveyed to Barnard McShane by deed of Asa A. Ward on July 9. 1860 book 609 page 296" to Jane McKliget for a total of \$1,750. (book 1226 page 345)

The 1889 tax records indicate the change:

15 Lemon St.

Owner - Jane McEliget house \$1.000; land \$900; barn \$100 Occupants - Daniel McEliget, fruit dealer age 35 John J. " 26

In 1895 Lemon St. was renumbered and #21 was assigned to this house for the first time. In August of 1895 Jane McKliget (signed with an X) sold the parcel of land where #17-19 now stand to her daughter Lizzie A. McKliget. (book 1453 page 552)

Jane McEliget died on Feb. 5, 1900. Her obituary appeared in the Salem News:


"Mrs. Jane, widow of James McEliget, died at her home 21 Lemon St. this morning. She was 71 years of age, and leaves a son and three daughters. (Funeral on Wednesday forenoon at 9:30 o'clock at her late residence and solemn high mass at the Church of the Immaculate

Conception at 10 o'clock. The burial at St. Mary's Cemetery."



On August 10, 1901 William Felton, licensed by the probate court in order to partition the real estate of Mary J. Nugent, Lizzie Plummer, Julia McEliget. Daniel F. McEliget and Margaret J. Tangley sold at public auction to Lizzie Plummer for \$1,100 the land and buildings:




On June 25, 1907 Lizzie A. Plummer, of Salem for \$1 and other valuable consideration, sold to Annie Collier, wife of Louis, the land and buildings. "Meaning to convey the same estate conveyed to my mother Jane McKliget by deed of James McShane June 26, 1888." "See deed of Jane McKliget to me August 24, 1895. Also deed of William S. Felton to me August 10, 1901":

On June 29, 1917 Arthur S. Ford, holder of a mortgage from Louis Collier and Annie his wife in her right, by power conferred by said mortgage for \$1,600 sold to Emma E. Waitt, of Ipswich. the land and buildings. "The same premises conveyed to said Annie Collier by deed of Lizzie A. Plummer on June 25, 1907." (book 2370 page 46)

On March 9, 1920 Emma E. Waitt, of Ipswich, sold to Alfred and Eugene Theriault the land and buildings. "Being part of the premises conveyed to me by foreclosure deed of Arthur S. Ford on June 29, 1917."

On July 13, 1920 Alfred and Eugene Theriault sold the same property to Philippe Dumais of Beverly. (book 2453 page 255)

On May 2, 1924 an agreement was made between Philippe Dumais and John and Katherine Dziembowski (the owners of #17-19) to create a right of way. Each party allowed a 3.5 X 9l foot strip for this purpose. (see appendix C)

On March 26, 1949 a straw deed was drawn, using Dorothy Clark, to allow the title of the property to include Elmira Dumais, wife of Philippe. (book 3655 page 535)

On August 25, 1966 Philippe and Elmira Dumais sold the land and buildings to Adelard J. Dumas and his wife Alvina M. Dumas. "Reserving however to ourselves a life estate during our natural lives. Being the same premises conveyed to us by deed of Dorothy Clark on March 26. 1949." (book 5390 page 549)

On June 14, 1968 Alvina M. Dumas, widow of Adelard J.. of Danvers sold to Ronald A. L'Heureaux and Mary his wife "the same premises conveyed to myself and my late husband Adelard J. Dumas by deed of Philippe Dumais et ux. (book 5536 page 446)

On May 1, 1973 Roland A. L'Heureaux and wife Mary sold to Donald Koleman and Laurence C. Post Jr. for the sum of \$23,000 the same premises conveyed to us by deed of Alvina Dumas. (book 5970 page 112)

On July 8, 1976 Donald Koleman and Laurence C. Post Jr., Trustees of Laurence Realty Trust sold the same property to James Lafkas and his wife Georgia. (book 6257 page 733)

On Dec. 6, 1979 James and Georgia Lafkas sold the property to Robert Bramble, Trustee of Cook Realty Trust. For title see deed July 8, 1976. (book 6660 page 232)

On Jan. 28, 1982 Robert C. Bramble of Cook Realty Trust sold for the sum of \$60,000 to Edward D. and Canice C. Mc Glynn, husband and wife, of 21 Lemon St., the same premises conveyed by deed of James and Georgia Lafkas on Dec. 6, 1979. (book 6904 page 436)

Reference to book and page are deed books at the Registry of Deeds. Probate numbers are cases at Probate Court. Both offices are located in the same building on Federal St. All maps in this report are not meant to be exact, just for illustration purposes.

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
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


Plan of Land in Salem Mass showing Right of Wax by agreement DZIEMBOWSKI & DUMAIS Shay & Leary CIVIL Engineers

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
