



"to preserve Historic Sites, Buildings and objects, and to work for the education of the community in the true value of the same." High street was called a lane or highway in 1664; Highway to Marblehead in 1713; Highway that leads to the southfield, 1714; Highway leading to the South mills, 1765; Way leading from almshouse to south mills, 1767; Road from almshouse to Marblehead 1784; Daniel's lane, 1790; Great road leading to Marblehead, 1788; Road from factory house to Marblehead, 1791; Road from almshouse or duck factory to Marblehead 1793; and High street, 1801. This house stands on a portion of what was called the Col.
Bartholomew Gedney land.

1801 July 31 - Isaac Needham sold a parcel of land to William Fabens, mariner, for the sum of \$600:

William Fabens was born in Salem in 1759, the son of James and Sarah (Henderson) Fabens. He married Rebecca Gray, of Saco, Me. in 1781. Mr. Fabens was a grocer in later life whose store was on High St. near Margin St. It was said that the rum Mr. Fabens sold was so much diluted he was obliged to cut it with an axe in very cold weather and sold it by weight. From his great size he was called "King Fabens" a name by which he was always known. One story passed down was "that Johnny Geer, a neighbor, was a black man with a very large under lip about which the boys used to tease him asking him to let them sit on

it which annoyed him so much that he reported his grievance to Mr. Fabens, who told him not to mind what the boys said but Johnny replied "now Massa Fabens put it to yourself, suppose the boys should say to you hello Massa Fabens let me slide down hill on your belly, what would you say?"

This house is also listed as a "building partly of brick" in the Salem Gazette Feb. 4, 1806.

1828 April 10 - William Fabens died. In his probate (#9184)
Benjamin Fabens was named as administrator of the estate. (Inventory appendix A)

The successive generations carried on trade between Salem and Cayenne established by William Fabens about 1816: Benjamin Fabens about 1825, Charles H. Fabens about 1850, Charles E. and Benjamin H. Fabens about 1869. The last named removed the business to Boston in 1877.

The house remained in the Fabens family for many years. Some tenants can be found in the tax lists:

1865 July 19 - The estate was sold by the Fabens family to the Salem Leg Co., E.B.Peirson, president (physician) and J.H. Webb treasurer. (book 687 page 89)

That valuable estate situated No.22 High street consisting of a three-story Dwelling house, with the land under and adjoining, recently occupied by the Salem Leg Co. The House is in good order, and contains 16 finished rooms. The land measures 42 ft. 6 in. on High street by 70 ft. deep, extending through to Gedney Ct. where it measures 47 ft., affording ample room for another house, or for a barn or stable, as may be desired.

This estate is well located, and is admirably adapted for a boarding house.

# Terms easy."

### 1888 June 16 Salem Observer:

"The estate #22 High street, consisting of the large three story Dwelling House, containing 28 finished rooms, arranged for four families.

The land measures about 60 ft. on High street and runs back lll.5 ft. to Gedney court. On said court is a good frame stable which can be sold separately or with the High street estate, as parties may desire. Terms \$200 at the time of sale."

1888 June 20 - John L. Stanley, of Gloucester, trustee of the will of John S. Edwards sold for the sum of \$4,200.25 to Patrick F. Buckley the same premises described in deed book 893 page 232 from John H. Bell. (book 1226 page 477)



1906 Nov. 26 - Julia Buckley trustee of the will of Patrick F. Buckley sold the land and building to Charles T. Buckley. (book 1856 page 433)

1909 Nov. 30 - Charles T. Buckley sold the land and building to Max Lemkin. "Meaning to convey part of the land conveyed to me by deed of Julia Buckley, trustee under the will of Patrick F. Buckley." (book 1999 page 24)



1910 March 22 - Max Lemkin sold the land and building to Israel Lapin. (book 2007 page 225) On the same day Israel Lapin obtained a mortgage from Max Lemkin for the sum of \$2,500. This mortgage was foreclosed and the title transferred to Santo De Francesco.

1924 Oct. 20 - Santo and Candelara De Francesco sold half the property to Giovanni Falzone. The other half was sold to Guliano Napoli. (book 2614 page 382)

1935 Sept. 23 - Guliano Napoli sold his half share to Maria DiStasio. (book 3073 page 317)

1957 July 12 - Maria DiStasio, formerly Maria Falzone, and Emilo DiStasio transferred the property to Stephen Salvo and Carmelina Salvo. (book 5296 page 536)

1966 June 30 - Carmelina Salvo sold to Elmer H. and Eleanor C. Warner. "By this conveyance the said Carmelina Salvo hereby relinquishes any and all rights that she may have underlease between Maria DeStasio and Emilo DiStasio to Stephen Salvo and Carmelina DiStasio. (book 5374 page 431)

1968 Sept. 12 - Elmer H. Warner and Eleanor C. Warner sold to James A. Jackson the same premises conveyed by Carmelina Salvo on June 30, 1966." (book 5557 page 291)

1970 Jan. 30 - James A. Jackson sold to James H. Lee the same property conveyed by deed of Elmer H. Warner et ux on Sept. 12, 1968. (book 5664 page 480)

1971 Oct. 14 - James H. Lee, trustee of J & J Realty Trust sold the property to James H. Lee and Jay Alden Turner. (book 5860 page 32)

1972 Oct. 31 - James H. Lee and Jay Alden Turner, trustees of Lee and Turner Realty Trust, sold to Robert Bramble the same property conveyed in deed 5860 page 32. (book 5919 page 797)

1973 Aug. 27 - Robert C. Bramble sold the property for the sum of \$76,000, to Adrienne Bouchard and Erik R. Brown. (book 6007 page 599)

1974 Jan. 14 - Erik R. Brown and Adrienne L. Bouchard sold to Erik R. and Anne Brown the land and building at 22-24 High St. (book 6040 page 457)

1978 Jan. 26 - Erik R. Brown and Anne Brown sold the property to Adriaan W. ter Meulen for the sum of \$91,500. (book 6439 page 674)

1981 May 15 - Adriaan W. ter Meulen of Boxford sold the property to Gary H. Palardy and John J. Bates for the sum of \$54,041.62 subject to a mortgage for \$70,950.38. (book 6819 page 243)
