

Book 5016 page 300 Nov. 13, 1962 Katherine A. Barnard sold the land and buildings to Harold F. and Mildred M. Hayes:



"The ditch or sewer between the lot and said land of Fitz is to be kept in repair, etc. by said Harold F. Hayes and said Mildred M. Hayes and said Fitz, their heirs and assigns as provided in the deeds hereinbefore recorded."

Book 2954 page 262 June 16, 1933 William H. Barnard sold the same property to Katherine A. Barnard.

Book 2489 page 500 July 21, 1921

Katie J. Fanning, a widow, sold the same property to William H. Barnard. "Being the same premises conveyed to William H. Ducey by F. W. Goodhue, adm., et als by two deeds dated May 14, 1907, and recorded with Essex, South District, Deeds, book 1870, pages 357 and 359,

and by Mary T. Kelley by deed dated June 8. 1917, and recorded Book 2366, Page 597. and inherited from him by the grantor herein as his sole heir at law."

Book 2366 page 597 June 8, 1917 Mary  $T_{\bullet}$  Kelley sold the same property to William  $H_{\bullet}$  Ducey $_{\bullet}$ 

Book 1870 page 357 May 14, 1907 \$4,800 Frank W. Goodhue, administrator with the will annexed of the estate not already administered of Sarah E. Collins, late of Salem, sold to William H. Ducey and Catharine J. Ducey the land and buildings at 38 Essex St.

Book 999 page 284 June 13, 1878 \$1,500 James Braden sold the land and dwelling house at 38 Essex St. to Sarah E. Collins wife of Edward A. Collins.

The old house on this property was moved off the site during the first weeks of August 1878. The house now known as 38 Essex Street was built shortly after. A building permit was issued on August 26, 1878 to Sarah E. Collins, whose residence was then 1 Orange St., in order to build a wooden dwelling house 24 X 32 at 38 Essex St. to be two and a half stories with a pitch roof.
