6 Palfrey Court Probably built for John Hurley, merchant 1873

The house at 6 Palfrey Court faces its gable end to the street. This three storied wooden frame building has a centrally placed doorway on the southern front and a porch on each floor located on the gable side of the house which faces away from the street.

Prior to this house being erected, no evidence from the Salem maps of 1700, 1780 or 1851 show any structure located on the site. The land that the house is built on was part of a parcel owned by the Palfrey family in the first half of the 17th century.

Indeed, the cove located on the other side of Derby street was, in the 17th century, known as Palfrey's Cove.¹ Reference is made by chroniclers that the cove was so named because, "...one Palfrey made fish there."² Another reference is mentioned later, "The Palfray estate was east of the Custom house, now Palfray Court".³

By the last quarter of the 18th century, the land near and around 6 Palfrey Court was owned by the heirs of Warwick Palfrey. The present day house was undoubtedly built on land that belonged to descendants of Peter Palfrey, a leader among the earliest settlers of Salem. Bentley mentions the Palfrey's in connection with the Derby Street area and at one point refers disparagingly to the "rookeries" that belonged to Palfrey.⁴

The family still owned owned land on both sides of Derby Street in 1750 because in February of that year; "Warwick Palfrey-Merchant-along with others sold land for a wharf to Richard Derby." This entry is listed in the Essex County Registry of Deeds, Book 96/Leaf 214.⁵

Although Derby court (as Palfrey Court was originally called) was not laid out by the city of Salem until around 1800, many of the existing streets near it were being used as pathways and cartways very early in Salem's settlement. Part of Orange Street was laid out at least as early as the 1670s and by 1671 an additional area was added as a space to turn carts and wagons in.⁶ Derby Street was laid out about 1767 as New street and was known as Derby street as early as 1774. Prior to that time, part of the current Derby Street was an ancient highway along the water's edge provided for in the laying out of the town eight feet wide.⁷

The earliest deed used in the research for this residence and dated October 30, 1867, cites the street as a reference in the following entry; "WESTERLY seventy one feet to Palfray Court (so called), thence running...". Indeed, the very next deed cites a separate compass reckoning for the street after the boundaries of the property are enumerated in the deed. "The WESTERLY portion of the above described premises viz: a strip of land twenty feet wide, adjacent to land late of Ropes aforesaid, and leading

from Derby St. to the NORTHERLY line of the said premises being laid out as a Court or way, and known as Palfray Court, the above described premises are conveyed subject to the right of passage over said Palfray Court, of the owners and occupants of the several estates lying NORTHERLY of the same."8

The Salem city map of 1851 shows that the property was owned by T. Sanborn and that the space now occupied by 6 Palfrey Ct. was an undeveloped lot. This gentleman was Theophilus Sanborn who, along with family members Franklin and George Sanborn, owned T.S. & Co. a wood and coal merchant whose business address was 115 Derby St.⁹ Theophilus and George lived on 5 Becket St. while Franklin lived near their place of business at 100 Derby St.¹⁰ This is near the point on Derby St. which, at that part of the 19th century, was where Palfrey Court was started.

Theophilus along with Franklin and George also owned a number of ships during the last quarter of the 19th century. Some of the vessels which were owned by these three Sanborn family members were the *Boxer*, the *Washinton*, the *Cavalier* and the *Palestine*.¹¹

In the Fall of 1867, John Hurley bought 6/7 of the land on Palfray (sic) court from the Sanborn family. Six months later, he purchased the other 1/7 part of the parcel along with Michael Hurley from Lynn from James Emerton of Salem who was acting as a guardian of Elizabeth M. Sanborn, a minor child of Osgood Sanborn of Salem, deceased.¹²

The evidence clearly suggests that 6 Palfrey Court was built in 1873. A mortgage deed from June of that year states that there are two dwelling houses along with "all the other buildings thereon." This is further corroborated by the tax records of the city of Salem. By May 1, 1874, John Hurley is listed as having a, "House, Rear Palfrey Ct." 14

John Hurley in 1874 was taxed on a number of properties within the city limits of Salem. According to the tax records, he owned property at the following locations;

Mr. Hurley had an aggregage value on his Real Estate of \$32,700.00 and his taxes on these properties were \$539.55.15

The Salem directories for the 1870s do not make it clear whether this John Hurley was John F. Hurley, a one time mayor of Salem. If this was indeed Mayor Hurley, he certainly was a notable character. Roger A. Poor remembers that, "Of course everybody

knew John, with his white sideburns and his tall silk hat, tilted at an angle. Wasn't he the man who promised to clean 'barnacles' out of city hall? Now he had appointed a friend of his, Eddie Knight, as city marshal. Eddie was reported to be very lenient with the drunks who were collected every night. So, at one Fourth of July parade, the Now and Thens put in a float, depicting Eddie receiving bail money from the gang. John was mad, hopping mad, and he said so very vigorously, but I can't recall what action he took." 16

Another remembrance from 'Salem in the Nineties' states, "Less useful to the city, but more dramatic...he was destined to make quite a blotch on the story of the city. A small wiry man, with black mutton-chop whiskers and alert restless eyes, can be seen making his way up Washington Street from the direction of the depot, where in the old Hawley House basement at the corner of Norman Street, John F. Hurley kept a pawnbroker's shop. There was no concealment under a polite 'Collateral Loan Company' sign. Three gold balls swayed in the breeze, and the crude words, 'Pawn Broker' betrayed the scandalous profession of the owner. The more cultured and descreet hurried around the corner with averted eyes. It was not considered respectable for Salem to have a pawnshop.

Now, though John F. was a small spare man, he made the best of it by wearing boots with high heels, and a tall silk hat. A Prince Albert coat that had seen better days, striped trousers, white shirt with a bat winged collar, and a silk string of a black cross tie that was too long to tie well, completed the picture. No, not quite, for a diamond (or such it passed for) the size of a nickel was imbedded in his shirt front, the silk hat was on at an angle over one ear, and a long black cigar pointed skyward from the corner of his mouth. John sauntered over to the platform above the tunnel, stuck his thumbs in his armpits, rested his elbows on the iron fence, drew one heel up on the lowest rail, tilted his cigar at a new angle and waited for admirers to congregate. John F. was gotten up as a sort of caricature of any one of a dozen gentlemen of the city. The outfit was pretty nearly respectable, but in cleanliness it left something to be desired. John, however, had ambitions, and when it was bruited about that he would run for Mayor, the respectable portion of the old city shuddered and when he was elected, hung its head in shame.

After a very blatant campaign, everybody said John F. can't be elected,— it is impossible, but as election day waned there were grave forebodings, and with enough returns in to dispel doubts, he prepared to celebrate. A parade was organized at the corner of Norman Street by the famous pawnshop. A noisy band went on before then came John in an open barouch, standing up waving his hat and saluting left and right, then an express wagon full of red fire and Roman candles, which were handed out to the crowds, and then followed a howling, screaming, cheering mob of hoodlums filling the street for a block or more behind. Round and round the town they went till all were tired out and it is to be hoped woke up next morning to realize what a silly thing the election of John F. was. It represented, as so many of our elections do, the triumph of mob hysteria over plain common sense. Men whom the voters will not trust for a moment with their own affairs, they witlessly elect to public offices of vast importance.

And yet John F. was not all bad, by any means. Biased and prejuced he was, also a spendthrift of public money as far as his friends were concerned, but he never sold the public contracts for his own benefit, as do more accomplished politicians of today. John

was honest according to his lights, albeit they might be a little dim at times. He truly and honestly loved the city, and was inordinately proud of it and its history. He wanted her welfare, and listened to every appeal put to him squarely and plainly, but quick temper or a slight reflection on one of his prejudices might start him off on a wrong tack. It must not be forgotten that years after, he signed the petition for the rebuilding commission after the great fire of 1914, when the appointment of that commission meant the elimination of himself as chief magistrate, and he knew it. He recognized that the job was too big for him, and rather than have the city suffer, he signed away his rights."¹⁷

While both the Sanborn's and John Hurley owned and paid taxed on the property, they are not listed in any directory as having lived in the house. It seemed to be a rental property from the point of its initial construction.

In 1877, John sold the property at 6 Palfrey Ct. to Michael Hurley who sold part of it eleven years later to Sarah Phalan. The rest of the piece was sold in June of 1890 to Bridget A. Hurley who, on the same date, sold the property to David and Joanna Curtin.

Not quite twenty years later, Johanna Curtin sold the property to Telesfor Stramski in January of 1910. Ten years later Mr. Stramski sold it to Antony Potorski who sold it in 1920 to St. Joseph's Polish roman Catholic Society.

Over 29 years later, St. Joseph's sold it to Boleslaw Staniewicz who, within the same month, received a mortgage deed from Dorothy Clark of Marblehead. Members of the Staniewicz family lived in the house until December 18, 1973 when they sold it to Mary Kuchun of Peabody for the consideration of \$1.00 with Aniela Staniewicz retaining a life estate in the premises.

On January 27, 1987, 6 Palfrey Court was officially made into Palfrey Court Condominium with the current owners purchasing the property on June 22, 1994.
