

It being a lot set off to said William Bott from the Hathorne estate.

## Essex Institute Records of the Salem Fire June 25, 1914

The present #24 was at that time #8 Hathorne St.

A list of property owners who lost property in the fire, listed by street included the following:

Ropes Memorial Trust: 7 residences 1-29 Orno Sq., 6 residences 2-24 Orno Sq., 2 apt. houses 7 and  $7\frac{1}{2}$ , 9 and  $9\frac{1}{2}$  Hathorno St., also apts. at 8 Hathorno (val. land \$300, bldg. \$1000)

Inspite of the above seeming "loss" of "8 Hathorne St. the Directory of 1914 lists tenants Henderson and Farrin. In 1915 the same tenants were listed as living at #8, so it seems quite certain that #8 was not burned. Maps showing the extent of the fire show that the corner of Hathorne St. and Tathorne Place was not burned, but property right by it was. "8 probably sustained considerable scarching.

#### SUMMARY

Goodhue purchased the land on Hathorne St. In 1826, a year and a half later, he sold the land with a dwellinghouse on it to his son James B. Goodhue. James was married to Eliza Putham in 1823. The tax records show him as being assessed only for "I poll" until 1824 when he then was assessed for a house. The following years he continued to be assessed for more or less the same valuation, after an initial increase. (Probably in 1824 the house was not quite complete, but by 1825 the value reached the figure it remained at.) Architecturally, this handsome house has the square Faderal-type facade, but the high foundation is typical of the 1820 period. Because this area was swept by the Salem Fire I spent considerable effort escentaining that the original hands was not lestrojed, and mother old home moved to the spot. James Goodhue's second house on Vatlorus St. was nearer Broad St. and now gone. That house with its larger assessment doesn't fit the Price and valuation of the house,

now number 24 which I think was the first house built on Hathorne St. and which was in existence in 1824.
