"to preserve Historic Sites, Buildings and objects, and to work for the education of the community in the true value of the same." The land on which this house stands was owned by the Williams family in the 1600's. Mary (Williams) Lambert had, as her share of the estate, the entire west and part of the east side of what is now called Mall St. Mrs. Lambert died in December 1795 at the age of 90. Her heirs sold the property to Joseph Lambert, who then transferred the title to Isaac Very (book 160 page 263).


On March 14, 1799 Isaac Very sold the land extending from the Morth River (since filled in, now Bridge St.) up to and including what is now 7 Mall St. to Daniel Abbott, ropemaker (book 166 page 74).

A ropewalk was built on this land and operated at various times by Daniel Abbott, Timothy Berry, Elias Duparr, Edward Tuttle, William Guilver and Thaddeus Gwinn. The walk remained until 1806 when Thaddeus Gwinn moved his ropewalk to the area of March St. and sold the land to John Fairfield (appendix A). (James Duncan Phillips describes a ropewalk in <u>Salem and the Indies</u> as: "a building as long as the longest rope desired, and for long cables this meant something like two hundred and eighty yards (740'); thus a ropewalk was a conspicuous object in the landscape. They also had to be straight. In the earlier days they had been shorter, but increased with the size of ships.")

Mr. Fairfield then proceeded to lay out a street through the land and for a short time it was called Fairfield St. The first mention of a <u>dwelling house</u> on this land appears on March 15, 1810 when John Fairfield mortgaged several parcels of land to John Gardner, one of which is described as: "A strip of land with three dwelling houses thereon which land I bought of Thaddeus Gwinn." (17 Mall St. is one of the three.) (book 189 page 188)

Mr. Fairfield also obtained several mortgages from the Essex Bank and on March 16, 1816 he signed over all rights to and in this property to the bank (book 189 page 220). The bank kept the land and buildings for several years before selling. The title since the bank's ownership is as follows:

Book 221 page 110 May 14, 1819 \$350 The Essex Bank sold the land and building to Peter Barras, retailer. Mr. Barras then mortgaged the same to Joseph Chipman Ward for \$200:



Also the privilege of a passage 7 feet lying between house and house next south. Also the right to using the pump by the street between the houses sold to Joseph Jaques (#15) and Francis H. Boardman (#13). The same I purchased of the present director of the Essex Bank.

Book 251 page 91 Oct. 25, 1828

Elizabeth Harris the only child and sole heir of Peter Barras, deceased, sold the land and dwelling house to Jacob Lendall.

Book 328 page 30 Nov. 9, 1841 \$515

Jacob Lendall, cabinet maker, mortgaged the property to George Wheatland and several others. "The same estate conveyed by Elizabeth Harris recorded in book 251 page 91."

Book 340 page 208 during 1843

George Wheatland took over the property and purchased the other outstanding mortgages held by Pond in book 307 page 169, Lamson in book 309 page 30 and Groves in book 340 page 209.

Book 361 page 80 Nov. 21, 1845 George Wheatland sold all his rights to and in the property to Nathaniel Jackson.

Book 454 page 220 Dec. 29, 1851 \$1,200 Nathaniel Jackson sold the "messuage" on Mall St. to Joseph B. Morris. The same estate conveyed to George Wheatland by deeds of Jacob Lendall and by deeds recorded in book 307 page 169, book 309 page 30, book 340 page 209. "The land and building as now fenced in and occupied."

Book 454 page 217 Dec. 29, 1851 \$1,100 Joseph B. Morris mortgaged the property to Nathaniel Jackson. "The same estate this day conveyed by Jackson." Book 702 page 176 April 23, 1866 John Nichols administrator of the estate of Nathaniel Jackson sold the land and building to Andrew Jackson and Ellen L. Arvedson, wife of George. "The same conveyed by mortgage recorded in book 454 page 217 which has become foreclosed."

Book 702 page 275 April 23, 1866 Andrew and Elizabeth Jackson and George and Ellen L. Arvedson sold the real estate to William P. Wood. The same conveyed by John H. Nichols adm. of the estate of Nathaniel Jackson.

Book 1554 page 570 August 16, 1898 Warren C. Wood, of N.Y., sold the land and building to Lucy E. Colson "Being part of the estate of my father William P. Wood."

Book 1649 page 429 Sept. 3, 1901 Lucy E. Colson, widow, sold the land and building to Ebenezer Ames. The same premises conveyed by Warren C. Wood on Aug. 16, 1898.

Book 2520 page 345 July 24, 1922 Ernest and Nellie Barton sold the land and building to Charles S.

Johnston. The same premises conveyed by Lucy E. Colson to Ebenezer Ames on Sept. 3, 1901. Ebenezer Ames died in July 1903 leaving only next of kin and heirs Nancy E. Ames, widow, now deceased and Nellie Barton daughter.

Book 2527 page 576 Sept. 26, 1922 Charels S. and Theresa N. Johnston sold the land and building to Nettie L. Smith and Grace A.S. Lutts. The same conveyed by Nellie Barton on July 24, 1922.


Book 2564 page 580 August 9, 1923

Nettie L. Smith and Grace A.S. Lutts sold the land and building to William Odell. "Meaning to convey the premises conveyed by deed recorded in book 2527 page 576."

Book 2667 page 69 Dec. 24, 1925 Mary J. Odell sold to Catherine M. Richard. "For title see will of my husband William F. Odell. Also deed to my husband recorded in book 2564 page 580."

Book 3018 page 42 Nov. 24, 1934 Salem 5¢ Savings Bank holder of a mortgage from Catherine Richard on Nov. 20, 1929, by power conveyed to Salem 5¢ Savings Bank will be sold at public auction.

Book 3216 page 138 May 2, 1940 Salem 5¢ Savings Bank sold to Margaret Colbert the land and building:



Book 3241 page 225 Dec. 5, 1940 William H. Colbert and Margaret T., in her own right, sold the land and building to Alice M. Hogan and Ruth Hogan.

Book 3932 page 213 Oct. 17, 1952

Ruth M. Hogan and Alice M. Green, formerly Alice M. Hogan sold the land building to Rose M. Girard. Rose M. Girard, being a straw, then conveyed the land and building to John F. and Alice M. Greene.








PLAN OF LAND IN SALEM MASS SHOWING LOT OWNED BY -
