

Thomas J. Gifford, guardian of Mary Ann, Herby and George Gifford his minor children sold a lot of land to John T. Mooney. (Lot 2)








John T. Mooney sold a parcel of land to Lucy E. Wadleigh, wife of Curtis.



Frank Litwin and Jennie Litwin, husband and wife, sold Lot 2 to Paul P. and Claire Guy. "For our title see deed of Naumkeag Bank Co., Trustees May 10, 1966."



Book 6392 page 604 Sept. 7, 1977

Paul P. Guy conveyed his rights in Lot 2 to Claire Guy as consideration in a separation agreement.

Book 6515 page 94 Sept. 8, 1978 Claire H. Guy sold the land and building at 31 Buffum St. to Gareth and Geraldine Guarino. "For title see deed book 6392 page 604."

Reference to book and page are deed books at the Registry of Deeds. Probate numbers are cases at Probate Court. Both offices are located in the same building on Federal St. All maps in this report are not meant to be exact, just for illustration purposes.

DATE DOCUMENTATION

The first mention of a house on this land appears in the 1869 tax records:

31 Buffum St. "New house, unfinished" Curtis E. Wadleigh \$2,500

1870 tax: 31 Buffum - house valued at \$3,000; land valued at \$600 Occupants - Curtis Wadleigh age 30 George Rust " 69

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Curtis Elkins Wadleigh was born in Gilmanton, N.H. in 1840, but moved to Salem at an early age, residing here for more than half a century before his death November 25, 1913, at his home, 31 Buffum Street. He enlisted July 28, 1862 in Co. F., 23rd Massachusetts regiment, known as Whipple's Jewels and commanded by Capt. George M. Whipple of Salem. After his discharge he returned to Salem and established a household articles business in which partnerships changed several times, the last being E. Burnham and E. Mitchell. The firm was known as Wadleigh Company at his death. The garden of his estate on Buffum Street was one of the showplaces in the area. He was twice married, the second time to Miss Etta Rust of South Wolfeboro, N.H., who survived him. Two sons predeceased him. (Essex Lodge of Masons)

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Curtis Wadleigh willed all his estate, both real and personal, to his wife Etta R., at her decease several monetary bequests were to be made. The remainder was to be shared by Horace Rust, George Rust and Carrie Chase, the brothers and sisters of Etta. Mr. Wadleigh's real estate was listed as: house and shed 31 Buffum St., 8,100 sq. ft. of land \$4,700; 2/3 share of 55 Buffum St. \$1,666.67; 81 & 83 North St. \$8,000; 6 & 8 Harmony St. \$4,100; lot of land Granite St. \$400.

"About the begining of the (Civil) war, Mr. John D. Eaton had a tin shop near the bridge, the business was good and he induced others from his native New Hampshire to come to Northfields, including Mooney, Wadleigh, Morse, French, MacDuffy, Lamprey, Durgin and others, most of them starting out with the tin peddler's wagon fitted out with various kinds of tin-ware, given inexchange for all kinds of junk, paper, rags and old metal. It was not an uncommon thing to see ten or twenty wagons starting out of a morning in those days." (North Fields, by E.B. Symonds)
