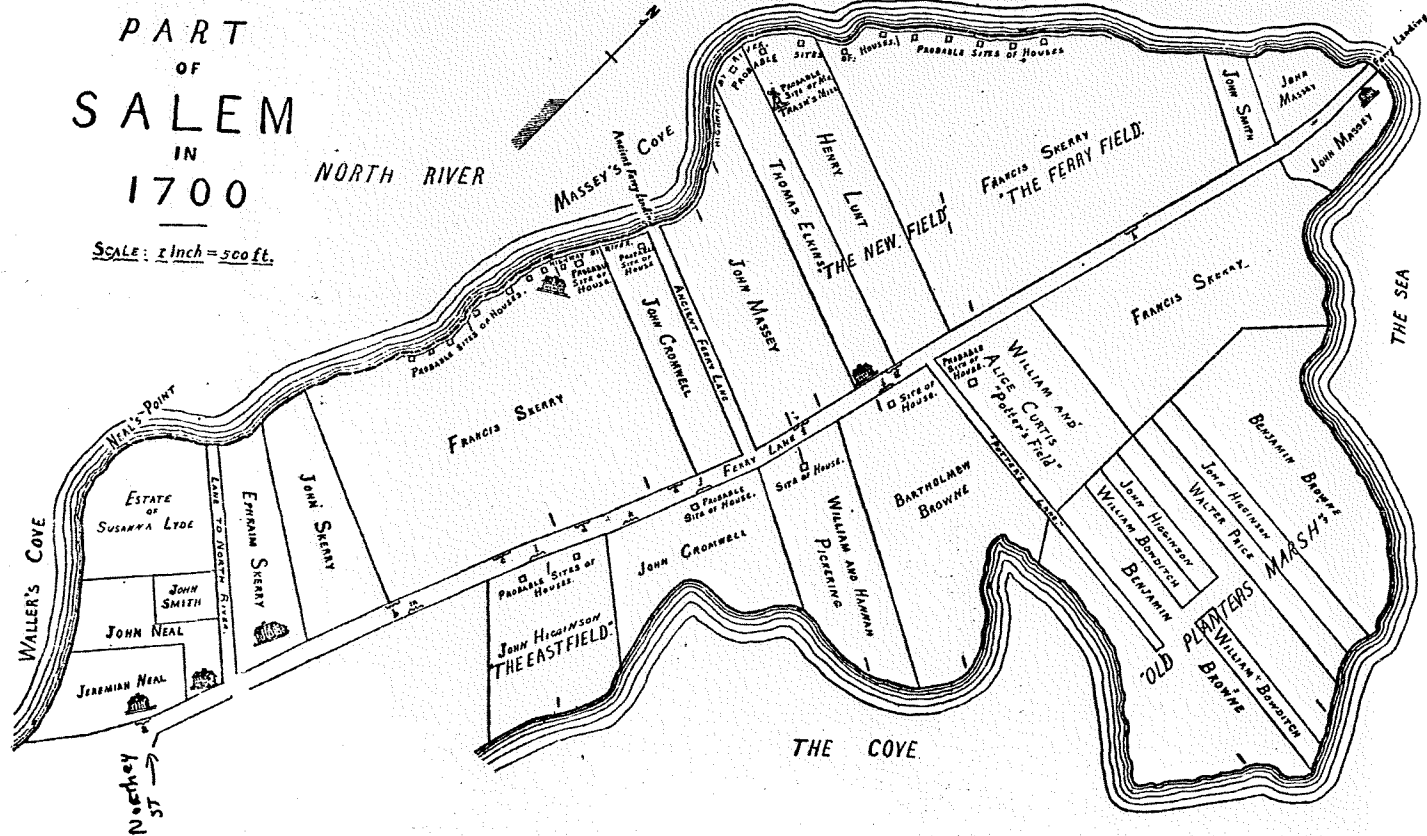

14 Northey Street

This house stands on a portion of land owned by the Neal family early in Salem's history:



Jeremiah Neal House. John Neal of Salem, yeoman, early owned all the land shown on the map southwest of Lemon street. Upon this part of the lot in 1670 he built a dwelling house, in which lived his son Jeremiah Neal, carpenter. John Neal died in 1672, having devised the house and this part of the lot to his son Jeremiah Neal. Jeremiah Neal died in 1722, possessed of the house and lot. In 1735, in the division of the estate, this was assigned to the deceased's son Jeremiah Neal, the house being then called "an ancient building," and valued at two pounds. The house was gone before 1749.

John Neal House. This lot was a part of the lot of John Neal, and in his will, dated May 3, 1672, and proved June 28, 1672, to his son Jeremiah Neal of Salem, carpenter, he devised this portion of his lot. Jeremiah Neal released the lot to his son John Neal of Salem, carpenter, for seven pounds, Nov. 10, 1693.* John Neal probably erected a house and barn thereon immediately, and conveyed house, barn, and land to his brother Jeremiah Neal of Salem, carpenter, for one hundred and fifty pounds, Nov. 18, 1702.† Jeremiah Neal, for one hundred and seventy pounds, conveyed the same estate to John Lemmon of Salem, mariner, April 25, 1749.‡

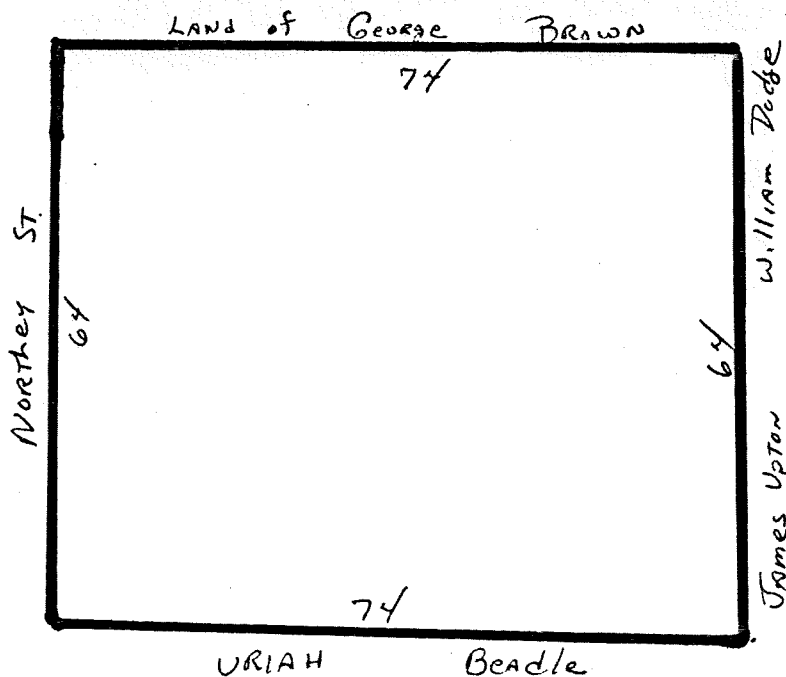
1804 - Moses Hale purchased a large strip of land from the Northey Family. This strip comprised a large portion of the east side of Northey St. (book 174 page 102)

1807 April 16 - Northey St. was laid out by an agreement between Abijah Northey, Moses Hale and Ezra Northey through land which had been in the Northey family for many years:

"Said Abijah, Moses and Ezra doth covenant and agree to lay out a street through their land bounding on Bridge street and the North River (commonly known by the name of Windmill point."

The street was to be 45 feet wide "always to be kept open without any obstruction. They also agreed to put fences on the street within 30 days. (book 181 page 165)

1839 - The heirs of Moses Hale conveyed a portion of the original lot to Jeremiah Hale, housewright. Mr. Hale then built this house and sold it to James Short, cooper, in Oct. Mr. Short immediately mortgaged the land and building thereon to Jeremiah Hale for the sum of \$600:



James Short was born, in Salem, on August 8, 1801. He married Lydia Ann Tucker, the daughter of Andrew and Martha Tucker, on April 22, 1824. The Shorts moved into their new house, then called #6 Northey (changed to #14 in 1896), immediately after its completion. James Short, cooper, is listed in the 1842 directory along with the first tenant on record, Charles Whitten.

(James Short age 59 is listed at the almshouse - Insane religion)

1860 Dec. 28 - The Salem Gazette reported the death of Captain James Short:

"At Anamaboo, West Coast of Africa, Nov. 8, Captain James Short of Salem, master of barque Warren White. He was interred on the 9th in the Missionary burial ground, and every respect paid to his remains."

(The "Warren White" was a 405 ton barque - built in Eastport, ME. in 1851.)

1862 - Mrs. Short had inherited property as an heir of her uncle Gideon Tucker, a prominent Salem merchant. In order for the heirs to clear the estate and sell the property, they need the signature of James Short. This required Lydia Short to take her case to Probate Court where James Short was then declared legally insane. The following document shows the extent of Mr. Short's illness.

Salem May 13th 1862

I received a copy of a petition of Lydia Ann Short of Salem in said county of Essex of some property that Mr Gidion Tucker held in his possession at his death I say I am the only heir of the property of the earth so Mr Tucker did not own the property at the time of his death therefore he had no right to will it away and I forbid the Tuckers or Salands selling any of the property of the earth as it belongs to me James Short although you call me insane do you pretend to say God Almighty is insane. You might as well as to say James Short is insane I am the true Son of God Father and Son together so I forbid any ones selling any of the property of the earth in the name of my Father I should like to have this read in all your courts in this United Hell Very Respectfully Yours
God Almighty
All limited to do wrong

I hereby certify that Mr James Short of Salem is an insane man.

1874 April 20 - James Short died at the age of 72y 8m 12d. The only notice of his death mentioned that the funeral would be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at 6 Northey St. Mr. Short was buried in the family lot on Holly Path in Harmony Grove Cemetery.

1884 March 11 - Mrs. Lydia Ann Short died at the age of 78y 5m 3d.

This brief obituary notice appeared in the local papers:

"Mrs. James Short, died suddenly from paralysis on Tuesday, was for many years Pres. of the Samaritan Soc. and no doubt that organization will be largely represented at her funeral."

1885 August 10 - The heirs of Lydia Short conveyed the land and building, at 6 Northey St., to John Melcher for the sum of \$2,000. (book 117 page 224).

1885 August 10 - John A. and Lydia A. Melcher sold the land and building to Lydia A. Woodbury, wife of Ezra L. Woodbury. This was the same property sold to James Short by Jeremiah Hale in 1839. (book 1177 page 225)

William Briggs was born in Salem, the son of William A. and Susan (Goodale) Briggs and was educated in the public schools here. Upon leaving school he entered the employ of Francis W. Tuttle, dry goods dealer, as a boy in the store and some years later was admitted to the firm, the name being changed to F. W. Tuttle & Co. This partnership lasted until the death of Mr. Tuttle in 1888. Mr. Briggs & S. Herbert Wilkins, an employee of the store thereupon organized under the name of Briggs & Wilkins, which continued until 1907, when it dissolved. Mr. Briggs continued as the sole proprietor for a number of years and then sold out to Almy, Bigelow & Washburn. He entered the employ of that firm as a clerk where he remained until he was taken ill. Mr. Briggs died on Oct. 31, 1933. (Salem Evening News)

1917 May 10 - Lydia A. Woodbury, wife of Ezra L., died. Her life was summarized in the Salem Evening News:

"A very wide circle of friends will be pained to learn of the sudden death, this morning, of Mrs. L. Annie Woodbury, wife of Assistant Clerk of Courts Ezra L. Woodbury. She had been poorly for several weeks, and was under the care of her physician. Last Sunday she would have gone to church, had the weather been pleasant, but became so ill Monday that she took to her bed. This morning, at 6 o'clock her daughter went to get her some warm drink, and when she returned she saw that her mother's condition had changed greatly, and she called her physician. Before he could reach her, Mrs. Woodbury passed away.

She was born in Salem, the daughter of the late Pemberton and Lydia Toppan (Hale) Hale, Dec. 5, 1849. She attended the public schools, and June 26, 1873, she was married to Mr. Woodbury. Their married life has always been ideal, and with their children devoted to them their home has been all that one could ask. Friends were ever welcome, and it was a delight to visit them on any occasion. Their greeting was sincere and deep.

Mrs. Woodbury was a person entirely forgetful of herself, in her desire to minister to others. Truly may it be said of her, "she looked well to the ways of her household, and her children arise up and call her blessed." Her gracious smile, her pleasant word, her kindly, sympathetic nature endeared her to a large circle of acquaintances who will greatly miss her. She had been a member of the Tabernacle church since 1869, and was always active in church work so long as health permitted. She leaves, besides her husband, a son, Ezra Ernest Woodbury of St. Louis, Mo.; three daughters, Miss Mary

Hale Woodbury, a teacher in the Springfield High School; Mrs. Ernest A. Comer and Miss Alice C. Woodbury of Salem; a grandson, Ezra Dawson Woodbury of St. Louis, and a brother, James F. Hale of Salem."

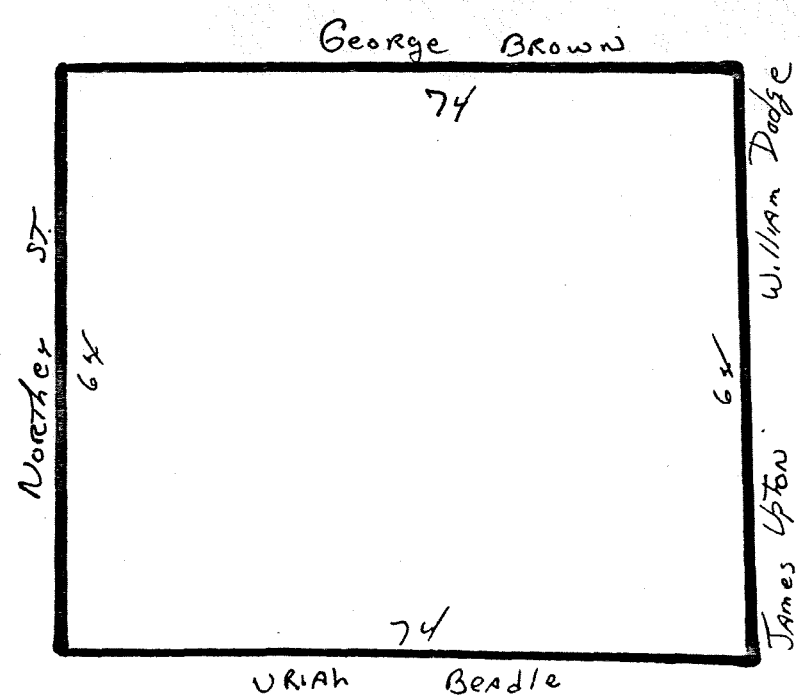

1972 June 4 - Thomas J. Morgan of 14 Northey St., died Sunday morning at the Salem hospital after a brief illness. He was the husband of Mary E. (Sweeney) Morgan and the son of the late William and Mary (Glynn) Morgan.

A native of Roscommon, Ireland, he resided the greater part of his life in Salem, where he was employed as a carpenter for the school system until his retirement.

He was a member of the Catholic Order of Forresters and the Holy Name Society of the Immaculate Conception Parish.

Besides his wife he leaves a son, the Rev. Thomas B. Morgan of St. Michael's Parish in Bedford; 3 daughters, Mrs. Nicola (Mary) Barletta of Rockport, Miss A. Ruth Morgan of Salem and Mrs. Pasquale (Dorothy) Starble of Grandby, Conn.; a brother, William Morgan of Ireland and a sister, Miss Mary Morgan of Alston, also 5 grandchildren.

1976 Dec. 6 - Mrs. Mary E. (Sweeney) Morgan, 73, of 14 Northey St., wife of the late Thomas J. Morgan, died in Salem hospital.

Born in Tubercurry, County Sligo, Ireland, she was the daughter of the late Thomas and Katherine (Ginty) Sweeney. Mrs. Morgan came to this country in the early 1920s and had been resident of Salem for more than 50 years. She was a communicant of the Immaculate Conception church.

Surviving her are three daughters, Mrs. Nicola A. (Mary T.) Barletta of Rockport, Mass., a member of the faculty of Hovey school in Gloucester, Miss A. Ruth Morgan of Salem, principal of the Endicott School, and Mrs. Pasquale (Dorothy K.) Starble of West Granby, Conn.; a son Rev. Thomas B. Morgan, pastor of Star of the Sea church, Salisbury, Mass.; five grandchildren; three brothers, Michael Sweeney of Fox Lake, Ill., John Sweeney of Cloonacool Sligo, Ireland, and Luke Sweeney of Lancashire, England; four sisters, Mrs. Evelyn Brennan of Ireland, Sister Nora Christopher Sweeney of Latoka, Figi Islands, Mrs. Beatrice McGee of London, England and Mrs. John (Kathleen) Broc of Collooney Sligo, Ireland; many nieces, nephews, and cousins.
