





Reference to book and page are deed books at the Registry of Deeds. Probate numbers are cases at Probate Court. All maps in this report are for illustrative purposes and are not meant to be exact.

"This two-story, clapboard house with a pitch roof and rear ell, which extends beyond either side of the main house, faces the street. It has a handsome, body pedimented front entrance ith fluted pilasters on either side and an oblong row of lights over the door itself. The building has two chimneys. Fiske Kimball says it was built for John Dodge about 1794, but he believes the interior was probably altered somewhat in the early 1800's, perhaps by Lucius Bolles who bought it in 1808". (Salem Historic District Study Committee Investigation)

Since there were several men named John Dodge in the area it will take further research to find this John's accomplishments. Most probably this was the same John that died in 1812 leaving a wife, Sally, and six small children. His real estate at that time was a dwelling house and land on Barton Sq.

As shown in the chain of title, John Dodge sold the house at 4 Andover St. to Lucius Bolles on April 1, 1808. Mr. Lucius Bolles, the first minister of the First Baptist Church, was born in Ashford, Conn., September 25, 1779, graduated from Brown University 1801, and settled in Salem January 9, 1805. His connection with the church in Salem, as an active pastor, practically ceased in June, 1826, when his release from the pastoral office was requested and obtained of the church, by the Baptist Board of Foreign Missions, that he might become its corresponding secretary; though for eight years after, till August 6, 1834, he continued to be the senior pastor of the church, without discharging any of the duties of the office. He died in Boston January 5, 1844. (The History of Essex County by D. Hamilton Hurd.)

Lucius Bolles sold the property to Priscilla Dike on May 20, 1833. Priscilla was the wife of John Dike a prominent lumber and coal dealer. More importantly, she was the aunt of, the famed author, Nathaniel Hawthorne and it is more than likely Mr. Hawthorne made frequent visits to this house during his family's ownership.



Second. At the decease of my said husband, of give and bequeath to my executors herein named the sum of thour hundred Dollars, in brush, to pay over the same in equal shares to the persons who when the same is payable shall act as theasurers of the following societies, to be applied to the charitable uses and purposes of such societies; to wit, to the American Home Missionary Society One hundred dollars, to the American Board of bommissioners for Foreign Missions one hundred dollars, to the American Poard of Sommissioners for Foreign Missions one hundred dollars, to the American Board of Sommissioners for Foreign Missions one hundred dollars, to the Marican Board dollars, to the Marican Board dollars, to the Massachusetts Dible Bociety One hundred dollars.

Third. All of the pest, residue and remainder of my said estate of give and boqueath in equal shares to such of my nephews and nieces as may be living at the time of the decrase of my paid husband to have and to have the same to them and their heirs

and assignis forever. And I authorize my executors herein named, or the person who may administer my estate with this will annexed to sell and convey all or any portion of my real estate.

Gowth, I appoint Nathaniel b. Robbins and Richard be Manning of said Salem, executors of this my bast will and testament, and it is my will that no surelies be required on their official bonds.








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THE ABBOT HOUSE on Andover Street has changed hands often. A good "corner" chair and a Hepplewhite wall table grace the living-room, whose finely reeded cornice and window frames show the McIntire influence. The banjo clock fits its place of honor well. The house was built around 1800.



It has never been proven that McIntire designed the Abbot house, or that he carved the delicately reeded and festooned mantel in the living-room. It is obvious, however, that he inspired its design.
