As Mr. Jesse Kenney was passing in East St. upon a Carriage, being apprehensive of its overturning he leaped from it and broke his leg at the ancle in such a manner as to require an immediate amputation. He has a wife and 3 children, and married a Mascoll. Mr. Pierce called upon me to draw up a subscription for the relief of Jessa Kenney. The subscription for Mr. Kenney succeeds well and will collect him several hundred dollars.

Information on Jesse Kenney from Vital Statistics

Josse Kenney came from Middleton, married Hannah Mascoll in Salem in 1793.

Bentley says they had 3 children: 2 births listed are a son Jesse in 1794 and

a daughter Hannah in 1795

Josse Kenney died are 41 in Jan 1805 Not convelsions! His widow married again

Jesse Kenney died age 41 in Jan. 1805 "of convulsions". His widow married again and his son Jesse was lost at sea when he was 21.

More information from Bentley's Diaries

- Vol. 1 p. 364 June 1 1791 A Tan House has been raised upon Turner's Lane leading to the water on the East side by Mr. Tinney and Co. (note by S.L.D. could Bentley have mistakenly heard "Kenney" as "Tinney"?)
- Vol. 2 p. 174 March 1796 The tanning business which was lately extremely lucrative has ---- become dull so that a new tan yard is now for sale.

 ---- when I came to town there was but one Tan yard ---- now there are eight only in the eastern part of town.
- Vol. 3 p. 139 Feb. 3, 1805 Hannah Kenny and children death of her husband.

SUMMARY

The succession of deeds show the location of 37 Turner St. to have been a "piece of land" in 1791 when Jesse Kenney and Jonathan Archer Jr. bought it.

Tax records verify this. (Archer's "house and shop" were not on Turner St.) Jesse Kenney was married in 1793, and his valuation in the tax lists for that year list "part house". It is a reasonable assumption that he built a house for his bride that same year, probably right beside the tan yard; perhaps the back part of the building at 37 Turner was used in his tanning business. Jesse Kenney suffered the accident in which he lost his foot in 1801. That same year he sold his business and house to Nathaniel Andrew; probably because he could no longer work as a tanner. With the money collected for him by Bentley, and the money from his sale he built a small house on Derby St. in 1804 but lived only a year longer.

My date for the building at 37 Turner St. is 1793 based on the above research.
