This house was built in 1808-9 for Gideon Tucker, merchant; the architect was Samuel McIntyre.

The house was built on land bought by Gideon Tucker from the Grafton sisters in 1803 and from Moses Little in 1808 (185:57), as well as smaller parcels. Born in Salem on 7 Mar 1778, the son of John and Lydia (Jacobs) Tucker, Gideon attended Salem schools and then became a clerk in the merchant house of Joseph Peabody, an eminent merchant who later made Tucker a partner in his firm, which sold general merchandise. On 27 May 1804 Gideon Tucker married Martha Hardy Goodhue, daughter of US Senator Benjamin Goodhue of Salem and his wife Frances (Ritchie). Four years later construction of this house was begun.

During the War of 1812 Gideon Tucker was an aide to Major General Gideon Foster; he himself became a Major. He went into business on his own account, and continued to live here with his wife. He owned several ships and much property, including various stocks. His wife Martha (1787-1848) died on 23 April 1848, never having had children. He died in his 83d year on 18 Feb 1861, "a venerable man, of exact habits and strict integrity" (EIHC 4:132-3).

By his 1859 will he made bequests to his house-keepers, Susan Ellen Dodge, Agnes Danforth, and Dollie Jewett Hale; the rest of his estate he devised to his two surviving brothers and his nephews and nieces. At his death, his holdings were worth \$45,610.48; this, the "brick mansion house on Essex Street with barn and land under and adjoining, was valued at \$8000 (#55749).

On 1 July 1862 and subsequent dates, Gideon Tucker's various heirs granted their rights in the homestead on Essex Street to Dr George A Perkins, a Salem physician (640:102, etc). Dr Perkins owned the premises until 6 Sept 1869, when for \$13,700 he granted the same to Mrs Alice C Earle of Salem (783:22). On 15 Ap 1880 the two surviving heirs of Mrs Earle for \$9200 granted to George Chase, trustee under their mother's will, all their right to the land and buildings. In 1896 the premises were sold to the Father Mathew Catholic Total Abstinence Society, as their Club House. The Society remodelled the building to its present appearance in 1910; the original front porch and doorway were removed at that time, and are now to be seen on the back of the Essex Institute.

The property was eventually sold to Mr & Mrs Henry G Rice, and finally to the present owner, Mr Moses Alpers.

Valuation records show, for Gideon Tucker Esq, ward I: 1808, homestead, \$1800; 1809, house \$1600, new brick house \$1800; 1810, house \$3500.

Bentley wrote September 24, 1803 (III, 47): "This day the family house of Grafton, Essex Street just above Elm Street, was sold for 5000 dollars at Public Vendue." This was then an old house, which Colonel Benjamin Pickman had described in 1793 as "owned and occupied by three old maids, the Grafton's." Gideon Tucker, who bought it, contented himself at first with a new fence, as we see by the following bill:

This fence was replaced before the age of photography by one of cast iron.

The brick house still standing was not built at this time, for it does not appear in the list of brick houses standing in Salem in 1806 published in the *Salem Gazette* for February 4 of that year. The period of its erection and McIntire's responsibility for the plans and the carving is indicated by another bill, as follows:

Among the Tucker papers at the Institute is also a detail-drawing endorsed "Bacoll [sic] Sketch of Stucco Cornice in Western Room."

After being in the ownership of Rice, the house passed in 1896 to the Father Matthew Catholic Total Abstinence Society. The porch which formerly adorned the house was removed, and is preserved in the garden of the Essex Institute. We publish for the first time some interior veiws taken before the remodelling of 1896. The original stairway was then already gone, and today little of the old interior detail survives.

Archer or Franklin Building

Essex and Newbury Streets
Built 1809–1810; burned 1860
(Figures 295–300)

Two plan studies marked "Col Archer's Plan at Andrew's Corner" exist in McIntire's scrap-book, and the papers at the Essex Institute also include a bound set of drawings with the title "Plan of Franklin Building" added at some early date. McIntire's handwriting abounds on all the drawings and there is no doubt that this building is to be added to the list of his works.

The time occupied by the building of the block is fixed by three entries in Bentley's diary: June 21, 1809: "This week was taken down the Old Higginson House at the Corner of the Common... now sold to Col. Archer. The buildings are to be removed & New Brick Stores to be erected" (III, 442). August 9, 1809: "The foundations of the new Building corner




Figure 293. Gideon Tucker House. Porch. Preserved by the Essex Institute. Figure 294. Gideon Tucker House. Hall. Photograph before 1896.
