History of the property:

The house currently bearing the address 396 Essex Street was built between 1875 and 1880 on a site that was part of the much larger seventeenth-century lot of Edward Flint. Several houses have been cited on this tract since Flint's day; the present house is one of many Italianate-style buildings built in the McIntire Historic District during the third and fourth quarters of the nineteenth century.

Essex Street has served as Salem's principal thoroughfare from its earliest settlement. It was the entry and exit route from Salem's peninsula, leading south to Boston, north to Ipswich, and beyond. Until its formal designation as Essex Street in 1796, it was alternatively referred to as the "highway", "great street", "broad street", and "main street". Because of its location, the former buildings situated on or near the present plot of 396 Essex Street most likely functioned in both residential and commercial capacities. The present house has also served simultaneously as a residence and a commercial/professional office in the past, consequently it is commonly known as "Dr. Gaffney's House".

In 1679 Edward Flint sold a parcel of his property fronting the "Main Street" to the Needham family, who built some sort of structure and retained the property until the mid-eighteenth century. Adjacent to the Needham property, Salem's Society of Friends built their second meeting house in 1716; the Quaker Cemetary which was located behind this structure still graces Essex Street and serves as the western boundary of 396 Essex Street.

After the Revolutionary War, the plot adjoining the Quaker Cemetary was the site of the "mansion" of Mr. Robert Cowan

according to Oliver Thayer's reminiscences. Thayer recollects that even though Cowan was "of English extraction", he was a revolutionary war hero who settled down in Salem to manufacture lead pencils and a new brand of carriage varnish made with "gum copal". The Cowan house appears to have been a relatively large Federal structure in the outlines of the 1851 and 1874 Atlases of Salem, and it was enlarged with rear additions over the years.

The Cowan "Mansion" passed into the large Osgood family in the first half of the nineteenth century, and as late as 1874 Mrs. Elizabeth Osgood, a widow, was in residence with fellow widow Mary Ward. After Mrs. Osgood's death, the property passed to her children Caroline and Robert Osgood, who took down the Cowan house and built the present structure (and carriage house) between 1875 and 1881. Neither of the Osgoods resided at the new 396 Essex Street; it was leased to a succession of boarders (two at a time) between 1881 and 1889, when Robert Osgood conveyed the property to Boston jeweler Benjamin Shreve.⁵

Benjamin Shreve, founder of Boston's Shreve, Crump & Low, had many properties in Salem in the later nineteenth century and was looking for an investment, not a residence. He made a small profit when he turned over 396 Essex Street to Dr. Henry J. Gaffney and his wife Catherine within a month. By this time, Essex Street was commonly referred to as "Doctors' Row", and Dr. Gaffney fit into this streetscape perfectly, with an office on the first floor, and daily office hours from "2:00 - 3:00 and 7:00 - 8:00 pm."

Dr. and Mrs. Gaffney owned and occupied 396 Essex Street until 1911, when they sold the property to Edward E. Pauling of Salem, a merchant specializing in pianos and player pianos (see attached).8 Mr. Pauling lived upstairs and maintained his salesroom downstairs in the house which his advertisement refers to as "formerly the Dr. Gaffney House" for nearly a half-century, after which his widow conveyed the property to Joseph and Tekla Rostkowski of Salem in 1960.9 Joseph Rostkowski transferred the property to his children,

asjoint tenants, after his wife's death a decade later. 10 Sixteen years later the "Gaffney House Condominium" was formed, and 396 Essex Street entered a new phase of its history. 11
