




Book 1572 Fage 268 Jennie M. Emmerton, widow of George K. Emmerton, of Salem, sold to S. Alice Osborne, widow of Theodore M. Osborne, of Salem, land and dwelling house thereon: (boundary lines are the same) the premises are identical notwithstanding slight differences in measurements with a portion of the premises conveyed to me by Warren H. Beaman et al May 24, 1884, Book 1132 Fage 88. To wit with the portion fronting on Carpenter St. and extending by straight side lines back to the Shreve Estate.


Reserving for my own use and possession during my life the eastern chamber on the second story of said house, the eastern bed chamber of the same story and also the eastern bedroom, being under the aforesaid chamber, with the right to a third part of the room in the cellar and out buildings and yard and common privileges in both stairways.

Book 237 Page 225 Dec. 24, 1824 \$1,000 Benjamin Blanchard, of Salem, trader sold to Zervia Worcester, land and dwelling house and all other buildings thereon: (same description) being the same premises which the late Deacon Thomas Hartshorn, deceased, purchased of Benjamin A. Dix on April 29, 1808 Book 182 Page 292 and which the heirs and devises of the said Hartshorn sold and conveyed to said Benjamin by divers deeds.

Book 234 rage 196 Feb. 9, 1824 \$200 Daniel Winslow, of Portland, Maine, victualler sold to Benjamin Blanchard, of Salem,*two undivided ninth parts formerly estate of Thomas Hartshorn bequeathed to Sallv the wife of Joseph Smith then conveyed to Daniel Dec. 1823. Book 234 Fage 90.

Book 234 Fage 90 Dec. 23, 1823 \$200 Joseph Smith, of Fortland Maine, ropemaker and Sally Smith wife of said Joseph sold to Daniel Winslow, of Fortland, Maine, butcher all rights in estate of Thomas Hartshorn. Sally being one of surviving children of Nathaniel Hartshorn.

Book 182 Page 291 April 9, 1808 \$1,300 Benjamin A. Dix, of Salem, housewright sold to Thomas Hartshorn, of Salem, gentleman, land and dwelling house and other buildings.



Book 170 Page 90 Ebenezer Shillaber, of Salem, merchant sold to August 18, 1800 Benjamin A. Dix, of Salem, housewright, a lot of not recorded land (same description) until Jan. 7, 1802

^{*} The remaining seven ninth parts were not included in the deed research. I feel the chain of title can be seen without them but it might be of interest to complete this transaction in the future.

Note: It is my opinion that this house was built in 1801 by Benjamin Dix, housewright. The deed research, supplied by the present owner, Christopher L. D. Hagger, shows Benjamin Dix as purchasing a lot of land (no buildings) in 1800 and selling the land with a dwelling house in 1808. This gap of 8 years necessitated a check of the tax records for these years. The first mention, in these records, of Benjamin Dix paying tax in ward 4 for a house and land was in 1801. I feel, from this evidence, 1801 is the proper date for this house.

The only question on this property is the fact that on McIntyre's map of 1851, Mr. Worcester's house is shown abutting the street, the 1874 atlas shows the house set back from the street, as it is now (1978). It is quite probable Mr. Worcester had the house moved back during this time.
