### The House History of 47 Summer Street

Research suggests that this house was built in 1838 for Henry Derby, a tailor.

Henry Derby purchased the land from Robert Brookhouse, a merchant, in October of 1838.1 Derby was a tailor, who by 1850 employed 3 men and 11 women, and produced approximately 5,000 woolen garments per year.<sup>2</sup> However, Derby did not keep the property long because he then sold it to Thomas Downing in 1840. Unlike the deed from Brookhouse to Henry Derby, this deed specifically mentions a dwelling-house, suggesting that this house was built as early as 1838.3

As described by a historical building survey form, "This house is predominantly in the Greek-revival style, although it does contain some elements of the Federal style as seen in the lightness of the gable front around the main entrance of the house. It containing a sidehall plan and gable end and is a common type of house of small New England towns in the 1830s-50s. Above the main entrance is a one-story, gabled roof rear ell and a three-faceted bay window that projects out of the second story. The remnants of a pilaster/architrave/cornice doorframe around the entrance include slim, fluted, Doric pilasters and part of a frieze. Sometime later, however, the cornice top was removed for the application of the bay window. The six-panel door has heavy molding in the style of the mid to late nineteenth century."4 The John S. Edwards House next-door at 49 Summer Street was built in a similar style a few years later.

The Downing family lived at this house for many years. Thomas Downing was a merchant who owned T.D. & Co, a dry goods store, located at 211 Essex Street. The individuals that formed the "& Co" portion of this business were J.W. Downing (Thomas' brother), Augustus J. Archer and John D. Hammond.<sup>5</sup> In the 1842 city directory, Thomas'

Ebenezer Putnam had many accomplishments before he moved into the house. He was nominated for mayor in the late 1840s, was a talented horticulturist, and even served as Postmaster for the Salem Post Office in the 1820s. 18 By 1874, one of their sons, Charles, had moved into the house, perhaps to take care of his elderly parents. Charles was both an engineer and land surveyor. 19 (page 155). Using his background as a civil engineer, he produced many works that related to Salem's city planning and rapid expansion in the late nineteenth century. (See advertisement enclosed). Eben Putnam passed away in 1875, and 1880 federal census recorded a servant by the name of Hannah Donahue living at this house with Elizabeth and Charles. 20

Elizabeth owned the house until 1897, when it became part of her estate. In October of 1899, the house was sold to Sarah Pickering.<sup>21</sup> Sarah, the widow of Thomas Pickering, moved in with her three children, Edith (age 33), Gertrude (age 31), and Arthur (age 22). Arthur worked in Boston, Edith worked for the Registry of Deeds<sup>22</sup> and Gertrude worked as a schoolteacher at the Bowditch School, a grammar school located on Flint Street.<sup>23</sup> Interestingly, all three of Sarah's children are listed as boarders at this residence.

Although Arthur eventually moved out of the house, both Edith and Gertrude would live in the house until the 1940s, well into their 70s. During this time, the name of Gedney Court, which borders the house on its northern side, was changed to its current name of Gedney Street in 1944 Additionally, a portion of Gedney Court, which immediately bordered the house on it's northern side, was discontinued according to a city ordinance dated September 29, 1944.<sup>24</sup> This portion of Gedney Court, which extended from Summer Street to Gedney Court Street, became a part of an enlarged Gedney Street.

The 1949 City Directory records new tenants living at this residence. Edith Pickering rented rooms to Wayne and Carrie Ramsdue. Judging by the age differences, Carrie (age 62), and Wayne (23), may have been a mother and son. Wayne worked as a technician at the Children's Hospital in Boston.<sup>25</sup>

The house has been home to many other individuals, many of whom lived there for only a few years at a time. Some of the house's occupants include Richard Hutchinson and

brother and the clerk at his store, John Williams Downing is listed at this residence,<sup>6</sup> while Thomas is listed at 20 Brown Street<sup>7</sup>. By 1851, the business had moved to 173 Essex Street, and Thomas' son, Thomas Warren Downing, also worked as a clerk at this business..<sup>8</sup>

While living in this house, John and his wife Sarah (Pomeroy) had two children, Anna/Annie W. (b.1844) and Alice Ropes <sup>9</sup> (b.1849). <sup>10</sup> Sadly, Anna died 9 months later, in September of 1845 of dysentery. John moved out of the house around 1854, and the house appears to have been unoccupied for a few years. John passed away on February 20, 1858.

In the mid-1820s, Salem began its shift from a merchant-based economy to one based on industrial output. Sea trade slowly diminished while the trading of goods by land increased, facilitated by construction of a railroad that ran through Salem and the subsequent establishment of railroad companies. The city's population increased, new factories and stores were built and a railroad station was constructed that facilitated the transportation of both goods and people to cities such as Boston, Marblehead, Ipswich, Maine, and even New Hampshire. One of the new railroad companies established during this time was the East Railroad Corporation, which was incorporated in 1836.<sup>11</sup>

The April of the year that John Downing died, his brother Thomas sold the house to David A. Neal. David Neal, an accomplished man in the Salem community, was very involved in Salem's new railroad depot. Previous to buying the house, he served as one of the Presidents of the East Railroad Corporation. The Essex County directory suggests that, even though David Neal owned the house, he purchased it for his daughter. Harriet C. Neal married Robert S. Rantoul in May of 1858 and they moved into this house in 1861. Robert was a lawyer, whose office was at 251 Essex Street.

In another series of quick transactions, the house was sold to Elizabeth Shepard in May 1865. <sup>16</sup> who quickly sold it to Elizabeth Appleton Putnam. in May of the next year. <sup>17</sup> She was the wife of Eben (Ebenezer) Putnam. Although he may have been retired by then,

his wife Theresa, as well as Lawrence Hutchinson, who was most likely their son. Richard worked as a shoe worker in 1964.<sup>26</sup>

When Edith Pickering died, the house was sold to Frank and Margaret Rizzotti,<sup>27</sup> and they purchased the house in July 1960. There is uncertainty in the passage of ownership, however, because in the deed recorded in Book 4689, page 42, the house is sold by Charles Bates, the executor of the will of Edith Pickering, to Frank and Margaret Rizzotti. However, in the mortgage that they received from Salem Savings Bank, Margaret and Frank stated that they received the house from Ethel J. Hayford. In May 1967, the Rizzottis later sold the property to Louis and Grace Spychalski.<sup>28</sup> Grace was Margaret's daughter, and the godmother of the current owner, Phil Marchand.

Frank and Margaret owned the house until May of 1967, when it was sold to the Spychalskis.<sup>29</sup> They lived here for about 10 years, then the house was sold to Margaret Marchand and Florence Femino.<sup>30</sup> In the 1970s, an addition was constructed off the back of the house. Eventually, Margaret (Peg) turned the house into a Bed & Breakfast, and it has been operating as such since (year).

After Peg's death in 2012, the house continued to operate as a Bed & Breakfast, but ownership of both the house and the business went to her husband, Frank Camarda, who put the property in both his name and that of his stepson, Philip Marchand in 2014.<sup>31</sup> Phil and his then-fiancé Jocelyn Croke took over running the B&B in 2012, and are still operating the business. In the spring of 2014, the gabled front of the house, especially the rear ell above the main entrance, was repaired and plastered because much of the wood in that area had rotted.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION \_\_\_\_ See continuation sheet.

Describe architectural features. Evaluate the characteristics of this building in terms of other buildings within the community.

This two-and-a-half-story, three-bay, sidehall-entry, gable-front house has a full pediment and a matchboard facade. A two-story wing projects from the north side and a one-story ell extends from the rear. Window frames on the facade have pediment-like caps and others are molded. Window sash are 6/6. The door frame at the recessed entrance has reeded, paneled pilasters, an Ionic architrave, and a cornice cap. The door is surrounded by a transom and full length sidelights. A Colonial Revival style addition to the south side is an oval oculus window. Inside, original marble fireplaces with grates survive.

Although 49 Summer Street has essentially the same form and many similar details as the adjacent dwelling at 47 Summer Street (Form No. 1141), the latter has much lighter proportions. This house has the much more-weighty details of the Greek Revival style in its full-fledged expression.

Discuss the history of the building. Explain its associations with local (or state history. Include uses of the building and the role(s) the owners/occupants played within the community.

This house was built in 1845 by John S. Edwards (1808-1888), housewright and master builder. Because of his trade, it is likely that Edwards designed and built the house himself. He purchased the house lot for \$500 and took out a building permit in March of 1846. Curbstones were laid in 1847. The 1851 Salem directory shows Edwards as the occupant of 49 Summer Street. The 1850 census shows Edwards and his wife, the former Charlotte Somes of Gloucester (married 1832), as residents. By the time of the 1880 census, a resident female servant was also listed at this address.

Edwards died in 1888, leaving to his wife all his "furniture, beds, bedding, clothing, linen, silverware, watch, clocks, stores and fuel in my dwelling house...all the personal property in said dwelling house, excepting bonds, stocks, bankbooks and money." At the time of his death, he also owned other houses, one at 22 High Street, and one half each of 18 Prescott Street and 20 Prescott Street.

In 1896, 49 Summer Street became the property of Edward W. Merrill. It was sold out of the Merrill family in 1933. Further information on owners of this house is available in a Historic Salem, Inc. research report by Barbara Wuertz and Joyce King.


