42 CHESTNUT STREET SALEM, MASSACHUSETTS

Built for Miss Maria Ropes 1858

Chestnut Street has been called one of the most outstanding streets in the United States because of its beauty and its place in the history of Salem and the early years of this country. During the seventeenth century the land between Broad Street and what is now Essex Street included a large lot belonging to John Pickering and land known as Thomas Maule's Meeting House Field.(1) Mr. Thomas Maule purchased the northern section of his lot from Mr. Benjamin Gerrish on January 22, 1683/4 and the southern section from the estate of Mrs. Elizabeth Spooner on November 1, 1687.(2) In 1688 Mr. Maule erected a meeting house for Quakers on the northwestern corner of the lot. This Quaker Meeting House faced current day Essex Street and was in use until a new building was built across the street in 1718. Even until 1780, this area was relatively rural with many open fields crisscrossed by major roads leading to Marblehead, Swampscott, and "Ye Broadfield" to the southwest.(3).

The lower end of Chestnut Street, between Summer Street and Cambridge Street, is somewhat older than the upper part toward Flint Street. The street began as a lane running from Summer to what is now Cambridge Street which ran through from Essex to what is now Broad Street where the Burying Hill is. Chestnut Street along the present line of the street from Summer to Flint Street was laid out by the town with a width of forty feet on October 26, 1796 through land owned by fifteen families. John Pickering, who lived in the present Pickering House and who owned land abutting the new street on the south side, offered to give land to provide forty more feet to the width of the new street, and Pickering Dodge, for \$400 paid by the town, guaranteed to satisfy all other owners of land required to provide the additional width.

Squabbles among the land owners about the street's width resulted in the construction of a wall by John Pickering and Pickering Dodge to divide the uncooperative landowners land from the new street. When the Captain Phillips House, 17 Chestnut Street, was being built each workman was instructed to carry away a stone at the end of each day until the wall disappeared. The final layout of the street with a width of eighty feet was completed on December 10, 1804. Why the street was named Chestnut is unknown since the first owners planted elm and Lombardy poplar trees. The poplar trees were blown

down in a storm in 1815.(4) The land over which the street ran consisted of fields with apple trees scattered about, and, to the south, was owned by John Pickering and other owners. Other than a shop where Tater Moses had sold candy and egg pop for three cents a glass and a lumber yard where Hamilton Hall now stands, it is doubtful that there were any other buildings on the street except for a two and a half story gambrel-roof house on the corner of Chestnut and Flint Streets. There was a lane that ran from Chestnut to Essex Street at about the location of No.42 which was known as Mullet's Court. It was named for George Mullet the blind town crier who lived in a wooden house on the court.(5)

By the first quarter of the nineteenth century many of the present houses on Chestnut Street had been built. The land on which No.42 was built was purchased by Miss Maria Ropes from Joseph Hodges on May 22, 1857.(6) Maria was born June 2, 1802, died December 18, 1878. No record of her marrying could be found. She is buried in the Harmony Grove Cemetery and was a member of the illustrious Ropes family. Her father was Captain Joseph Ropes, merchant, commander of the privateer America in the war of 1812. Her mother was Sara Burchmore who died in 1842 while her father died in 1850. She had a sister Sarah.(7)

In order to make her odd shaped lot, which she purchased from Joseph Hodges, rectangular and buildable, she and her future neighbor on her left, the Reverend James W. Thompson, sold to each other separate triangles of land for one dollar each. Maria sold about 220 square feet of hers bordering Chestnut Street to Thompson who sold to her about 195 square feet which would become the northeasterly corner of her property. (8)

Maria's house at number 42 was designed by Foster and Emerton and constructed in 1858. It is interesting that this land originally known as Mullet's Court which connected to Essex Street saw the construction of a wooden Gothic Revival church building on Essex Street, also built in 1858 and designed by Foster and Emerton. This church was replaced by the present Grace Church in 1926.(9)

Upon the death of Maria Ropes, the house was sold to Margaret Hanson in 1879.(10) One finds many interrelationships in dealing with Chestnut Street houses. Margaret Hanson was married to J. Adams Hanson, but was sister to Gamaliel Hodges. Gamaliel Hodges would be the grandson of the Gamaliel Hodges who originally bought the land in 1845 from Isiah Burrill.(11) When Margaret C. Hanson died in 1878 she left an estate of over \$100,000, a very large sum in those days. Most of her estate was in railroad stocks. She left her house to her two daughters Elizabeth H. Hanson and Bertha P. Hanson. (12) Bertha sold her share to Elizabeth H. in 1891.(13)

Elizabeth H. Hanson married Charles H. Smith and the two owned the house. They sold it to Anna Maria Wheatland, (or Ann Marie Wheatland, one runs into both spellings), of Rangely, Maine, as the deed says, in 1917.(14) This is another prominent name, the same as Ann Marie Wheatland, widow of Stephen G. Wheatland, former mayor of Salem, who built the large house at 30 Chestnut Street in 1896. Trustees under the Will of 1917 included Richard Wheatland and Stephen Wheatland, all prominent Salem people. The house was sold to Helen O. Coxe, wife of Charles S. Coxe for \$1 in 1928 on the death of Anna Marie Wheatland.(15) The property of Helen O. Coxe was left to her two unmarried children in 1945.(16) They in turn sold it back to their father for \$1 each.(17) Upon his death, it was sold to Sylvia B. Benson and her husband Ralph B. Lawson in 1961.(18)

Upon the death of Sylvia B. Lawson, the property was bought fro \$72,000 by Holly Mulvihill in 1979.(19) It was sold again in 1982 for \$160,000 to James C. Ayer of Marblehead.(20) The owners at the time of this research are Andrew and Nan Greer who purchased the property in 1996(21)
