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

Book 175 page 25 August 2, 1804 \$290 Richard and Betsy Savory sold a lot of land to Ebed Lewis, shipwright. "The same lot conveyed by deed of Anna Briggs on July 31, 1804."

Book 199 page 285 May 28, 1813 \$1,400 Ebed Lewis mortgaged his land and <u>dwelling</u> house to Edward Holyoke. "The same piece conveyed by Richard Savory."

Ebed Lewis was in deep financial difficulty. The land and dwelling house was sold at public auction to Richard Savory.

Richard Savory, cooper, sold the land and dwelling house to Joshua Raymond, cooper of Hopkinton, N.H.


Book 529 page 143 April 14, 1856 \$1,200

Book 541 page 39 Oct. 1856 Joshua and Hannah Raymond of Hopkinton, N.H. sold the land and dwelling house to Joseph Vincent and Albert Brown. "The same I purchased of Richard Savory."

Joseph Vincent, ropemaker, sold the land and dwelling house on Briggs St., along with two other parcels, to William B. Vincent.


William B. Vincent, merchant, sold the land and dwelling house to Ebenezer Seccomb, merchant.

Ebenezer Seccomb purchased a parcel of land from Anna Baldwin. "The piece hereby conveyed making in connection with the adjoining lot of said Seccomb a lot 70' in front and runs 79.9 on the two other sides."



Book 676 page 50 Sept. 29, 1864 \$3,000

Ebenezer Seccomb sold the land to Lucinda B. Howarth, wife of John Howarth. "Free from control of husband." Being part of the estate conveyed by Joseph Vincent and Anna Baldwin.



Book 719 page 24 Feb. 20, 1867 \$3,000

Book 877 page 257 March 20, 1873

Lucinda B. Howarth sold the land and dwelling house to Sylvester Brown. "The same conveyed to Lucinda B. Howarth by Ebenezer Seccomb."


Sylvester and Abby Brown, of Kennebunk Port Maine, sold the property to David Blaney, George Chamberlain and Sylvester S. Chamberlain trustees under the will of Jason Chamberlain. (Mr. Chamberlain died

on Oct. 13, 1872. In his will he bequeathed that \$3,500 be put in a trust to purchase a house in Salem. This is the house purchased by the trustees.)

Book 907 page 24 June 29, 1874 \$4,050 The trustees under the will of Jason Chamberlain, of Marblehead, sold the estate to Henry C. Perkins. "The same conveyed by deed of Sylvester Brown."

Book 1612 page 456 June 8, 1900 Alfred Stone, of Providence R.I., trustee under the will of Elizabeth A. Putnam sold a small parcel of land to Mary Perkins. (Mary was the only child of Henry C. Perkins. Mr. Perkins died on March 19, 1880.)



Book 5490 page 38 Nov. 7, 1967 Mary Pauline Perkins, of Marblehead, sold the land and buildings to Ronald J. and Betty C. Michaud. Two parcels:

1. the same conveyed to Henry C. Perkins by deed of David Blaney on June 29, 1874.

2. the same conveyed to Mary Perkins by Alfred Stone on June 8, 1900.

Book 6430 page 151 July 20, 1977

Betty C. Michaud sold the two parcels to Ronald J. Michaud. "The same conveyed to Ronald J. and Betty Michaud by deed of Mary Pauline Perkins."

Book 6506 page 705 August 18, 1978 \$45,000 Ronald J. Michaud sold the land and buildings to Robert E. Duerr. "The same two parcels conveyed by Betty C. Michaud."

Book 6732 page 001 August 29, 1980 \$64,000 Robert E. and Catherine C. Duerr sold the two parcels to Arthur Jackson Wheeler.

Reference to book and page are deed books at the Registry of Deeds. Probate numbers are cases at Probate Court. Both offices are located in the same building on Federal St. All maps in this report are not meant to be exact, just for illustration purposes.

DATE DOCUMENTATION

29 Briggs Street

"All of the incidental features of this simple two-story plus pitch roof, wooden house remain as they have probably been for many years and are a tribute to the carpenters who have kept it in repair and to the owners who paid for the maintenance. These features include a fence of round pickets and square posts, low acorn-topped posts strung with a chain to form a barrier along the brick sidewalk leading into the side entrance and a delicate trellis which is pointed like a Gothic arch and separates the back and front yards.

The house itself has a central entrance in the middle of the five-bay facade in the yard. The flat boards between the top of each second-story window and the eaves are usually a characteristic of houses built during the Federal period."

The first mention of a dwelling house on this land appears in the mortgage, April 4, 1808, to Edward Holyoke. The tax records never charge Mr. Lewis for a house in Ward 2. He is taxed for "part of a house \$600" in 1805 and "part of a house \$800" in 1806 both being in Ward 1. The deeds indicate that Ebed Lewis sold a house on Union St. in May of 1805.
