



NOTES:

17 HUBON STREET

Hubon Street was laid out around 1865 by Henry G. Hubon. It was called Beverly street until the 1870's when it took on the nane of Hubon. The first mention of a house on this lot does not appear until 1872. A careful check of permits to build or move, for this time period, has shed very little information. It is possible that this was one of the many buildings that were on Mr. Hubon's Washington St. lot prior to his building a block of stores next to City Hall. Among the buildings on that land, also called Jeffery Court, were a paint shop, coffin warehouse, carpenter shop and saddler shop. Mr. Hubon could have moved one or several buildings in order to make room for his new building, but until additional information comes to light this will remain a mystery.

The estates 15 & 17 Hubon, near Bridge street consisting of two dwelling houses and land under and adjoining. No. 15 is a one story cottage contains 4 rooms, and is convenient for a small family; the land measuring 45 feet front and contains about 920 sq. ft.

No. 17 is a one and a half story cottage, contains 5 rooms and pantry and is very convenient; the land measures 45 feet front and contains about 2100 sq. ft.

Both houses are supplied with Wenham Water and are well drained. Also two building lots opposite side of street.

1880 Federal Census 17 Hubon Street Bridget Bennet age 43, keeping house, born Ireland Nellie Bennet age 8, at school; born Mass.

The Salem Evening News July 5, 1912

"Henry Grant Hubon, one of the oldest citizens of Salem, died at his home, 8 Margin street, this forenoon, in his 90th year. He had been in poor health for a long time.

Mr. Hubon was born in Salem, Nov. 8, 1822 and was the third of the nine children of the late Henry and Frances (Dwyer) Hubon. He was educated in the old East school, kept in the building on the site of Koen's proposed theatre on Washington street, at the famous private school kept by the late Samuel H. Archer, near the First Baptist church, and at the Salem High school, being a member of the eighth class to enter the last named institution. Of his 30 classmates in the Salem High school class of 1834, he was the last survivor.

Upon leaving school, he entered the hat store of the late Major Stephen Osborne, on the corner of Essex and Central street, remaining some time, and then joining the ship Exchange, Capt. Thorndike Proctor. In her, he made a voyage to the East Indies, China, Manila, Java, Macao, Singapore and Batavia, Isle of Wight, Antwarp, Cadiz and returned to Boston, with a cargo of salt. He was gone two years, and while in China and Java was very sick, his recovery being despaired of in both countries.

After arriving home, he learned the cooper's trade and on attaining his majority, he went to China, where he was in the employ of Burgess & Son of Boston, coopering for six years. His next venture was to the gold fields of California, going out to the Eldorado of the west by way of the Isthumus Panama. The voyage up the Pacific was made in the ship Eliza Ann, Capt. Samuel Curwen of Salem, the passage to San Francisco occupying 42 days, from that city he went to the mines, where he worked at carpentering. While in San Francisco, he saw the city burned three times, before he started for New England.

He came down to Panama as quartermaster of the steamer

Tennessee, reached Salem after an absence of two years, and
this concluded his travels about the world.

He then went to work for his father, who was a well-known cabinet maker and also manufactured coffins, and who buried the dead, the latter being under the supervision of a superintendent of burials, instead of directly by the undertakers, as is now done.

On the death of his father, he succeeded to the business carried it on for many years, finally disposing of it to Allen & Spring. Mr. Hubon built the Hubon block, developing the property from almost nothing. Many years ago he retired but up to within a comparatively short time used to take short walks about the city.

Mr. Hubon married Miss Lydia Ann Clark, June 27, 1857,
daughter of Col. Julius Denning Clark of Rutland, Vt. and their
married life was ideal until the death of Mrs. Hubon May 19,
1911. Both were beautiful singers and were members for years
of the Universalist church choir and also of the church. Eight
children were born of the union, but only three, Mrs. Robert E.
Hill, Miss Anna G. Hubon and William P. Hubon are living, and
there are four grandchildren."
